HB 1396 HD1 - RELATING TO CESSPOOLS

Chair Belatti, Vice Chair Takenouchi, and Members of the Committee:

The University of Hawai'i Sea Grant College Program (Hawai'i Sea Grant) and UH Water Resources Research Center support HB 1396 HD1.

This bill would create an innovative pilot program within the Department of Health Environmental Management Division that provides funding for wastewater planning and management specific to cesspool conversion via connection to sewer or other centralized systems. This program would incentivize county-level action and promote partnerships and information sharing between the state and county wastewater management programs. Importantly, the bill not only provides planning support but also includes stakeholder outreach and implementation funding. Implementation of this measure could allow for the connection of existing cesspools to sewer or other centralized systems that would not have occurred otherwise, and would likely alleviate financial hardships on those selected to participate in the pilot programs within each county.

In support of House Bill 1396 House Draft 1 RELATING TO CESSPOOLS

House Bill 1396 House Draft 1 establishes and appropriates funds for a pilot program within the environmental management division of the department of health to work with each county to identify a priority area to expand the county sewage system or other centralized treatment system to connect individual properties in the priority area and reduce or eliminate cesspools in the identified area. The Hawai'i Climate Change Mitigation and Adaptation Commission (Commission) <u>supports</u> this measure.

The Hawai'i Climate Change Mitigation and Adaptation Commission consists of a multijurisdictional effort between 20 different departments, committees, and counties. Removal of cesspools for all properties within the Sea Level Rise Exposure Area (SLR-XA), is imperative to the health of nearshore waters and for members of the public accessing coastal resources. Removal may not be achievable by 2050 as directed by state law without viable alternatives for replacement. The Commission's 2022 update to the *Sea Level Rise Vulnerability and Adaptation Report* Recommended Action 6.1.1 directs the state to sponsor research and development efforts to expand affordable and actionable conversion options for shoreline property owners. 6.1.1 also counsels that options should account for SLR-XA projections of coastal erosion, associated land loss, and potential failure of onsite sewage treatment systems resulting from sea level rise.

Cesspools on the shoreline and in the coastal zone will be an increasing source of nonpoint source pollution as groundwater rises and coastal erosion accelerates. Recommended Action 6.4 counsels that the state should expand policy directives beyond the existing income tax credits and requirement for removal by 2050. Specifically, policy must address existing cesspools in the coastal zone in relation to enforcement of existing laws and regulations.

Aloha Chair Belatti, Vice Chair Takenouchi, and Members of the Committee:

My name is Lyndsey Garcia, Director of Advocacy, testifying on behalf of the Hawai'i Association of REALTORS[®] ("HAR"), the voice of real estate in Hawai'i and its over 11,000 members. HAR **strongly supports** House Bill 1396, HD1, which establishes and appropriates funds for a pilot program within the environmental management division of the department of health to work with each county to identify a priority area to expand the county sewage system or other centralized treatment system to connect individual properties in the priority area and reduce or eliminate cesspools in the identified area. Effective 6/30/3000.

Hawai'i Association of REALTORS[®] supports the goal of protecting our drinking water, streams, ground water, and ocean resources. We recognize that cesspool conversion is important to preserve our environment. There are approximately 83,000 cesspools divided into three priorities¹ across the state (48,596 on Hawai'i Island; 14,300 on Kauai; 11,038 on Maui; 1,400 on Molokai; and 7,491 on O'ahu) with only 27 years to meet the state's mandate to convert all cesspools to a Director of Health approved wastewater system. To convert 83,000 cesspools by 2050, at least 3,000 cesspools would need to be converted per year. It is crucial that we properly plan and find ways to assist communities and homeowners as resources and manpower are limited, especially on the neighbor islands.

Affordability and financial planning are key. The Cesspool Conversion Working Group conducted an affordability analysis² for homeowners. Based on the analysis, 97% of homeowners would be financially burdened by cesspool conversion costs. Equally concerning, even with a \$10,000 rebate 82% of homeowners would still be financially burdened. Costs will vary greatly depending on resources, labor, permitting delays, property terrain, and other variables. Most homeowners will not be able to afford to do this alone.

Aloha, Chair Au Bellati, Vice-Chair Takenouchi and Members of the Committee:

On behalf of the non-profit WAI: Wastewater Alternatives & Innovations, I am writing in **support of HB1396 HD1.** This bill will establish a pilot program within the Dept. Of Health (DOH) to work with each county to identify a priority area to expand the county sewage system or create a decentralized treatment system to connect individual properties in the priority area and reduce or eliminate cesspools in the identified area. The bill will also appropriate funds to DOH to provide planning grants to each county for a pilot cesspool conversion project. Instead of converting cesspools one by one, the state will need to do more decentralized, cluster systems that can convert hundreds in a community, and this bill will provide needed funds to do that.

Hawaii has more than 83,000 cesspools across the state, discharging 52 million gallons of raw sewage each day into Hawaii's waters. That's similar to a massive sewage spill every day! The people of Hawaii need this law to make sure their wastewater systems aren't polluting the groundwater or nearby surface waters. As a member of the State's Cesspool Conversion Working Group over the last four years, we believe that this kind of pilot project for decentralized systems will be more efficient and affordable in the long run.

WAI is an environmental non-profit dedicated to protecting our drinking water, groundwater and near-shore ecosystems by reducing sewage pollution from cesspools and failing septic systems. Our goal is to help find more innovative, affordable, and eco-friendly solutions to wastewater management. Better sanitation systems reduce sewage pollution and make properties more valuable, while also protecting public health and valuable natural resources like groundwater, streams, coral reefs and coastal areas.

Hawaii is struggling with serious sewage pollution problems, and the state has a mandate to make sure all cesspools are converted in the next three decades. WAI is working with innovative sanitation companies from across the country and around the world to introduce more efficient and affordable alternatives for wastewater management. This bill will provide the necessary planning and funding to create the kind of community-scale pilot projects to convert hundreds of cesspools across the state. Mahalo for your leadership on this issue and support of this bill.



The Hawai'i Reef and Ocean Coalition (HIROC) is a group of scientists, educators, filmmakers and environmental advocates who have been working since 2017 to protect Hawaii's coral reefs and ocean.

The Hawai'i Reef and Ocean Coalition STRONGLY SUPPORTS HB1396!

Hawaii has a public health problem with water pollution from cesspools. We have over 80,000 cesspools that discharge about 50 million gallons of raw sewage into our groundwater every day! Sea level rise will exacerbate the public health problems as it will cause some more cesspools to overflow onto the surface. The recent report of the cesspool conversion working group recommended that we upgrade the cesspools that cause the most pollution by 2030. A good way to eliminate some cesspools that are near to existing or planned central sewer systems is by extending those sewer systems, connecting those homes, and filling in the cesspools.

This bill would provide \$10 million funding for pilot programs within DOH, working with each county to eliminate cesspools by identifying a priority area to connect cesspool properties to expanded county or other centralized sewer systems.

This bill would help improve public health water quality by improving Statecounty coordination and planning and preparation to expand sewers to eliminate some cesspools.
