Subject: House Bill (HB) 146 Relating to the State Fire Council (SFC) Program

I am Kazuo Todd, Chair of the Hawaii State Fire Council (SFC). The SFC supports HB 146, which proposes to revise the Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS) §132-16 to add representatives from the Hawaii State Aircraft Rescue Fire Fighting (ARFF) Unit and the Department of Land and Natural Resources (DLNR), Division of Forestry and Wildlife (DOFAW) to the SFC.

The SFC was established by the Hawaii State (State) Legislature in 1979 to replace the State Fire Marshal's office. It is currently comprised of the four county Fire Chiefs and administratively attached to the State Department of Labor and Industrial Relations (DLIR).

In accordance with HRS §132, the SFC's primary mission is to develop and support a comprehensive fire service emergency management network for the protection of life, property, and the environment for the State. Through the collaborative and unified efforts of each county Fire Chief, the SFC promotes the standardization of fire service reporting, training, sharing of technology, resources, and best management practices. The SFC may advise and assist the county fire departments where appropriate; prescribe standard procedures and forms related to inspections, investigations, and reporting of fires; and advise the Governor and State Legislature on issues relating to fire prevention and protection and life safety.

The Hawaii State ARFF Unit and DLNR's DOFAW communicate and collaborate with the county fire departments on a regular basis during emergency incidents and non-emergency administrative matters. The two agencies provide specialty expertise and equipment in emergent and non-emergent environments which the county fire

departments do not possess due to training, funding, or mission requirements. The Hawaii State ARFF Unit and DLNR's DOFAW could provide unique perspectives to facilitate accomplishment of the SFC's functions as described in HRS §132. The potential results are greater insight into Hawaii's fire risk and improvements relating to the protection of persons and property against fire. The existing SFC membership believes the addition of representation from the ARFF and DLNR's DOFAW will improve the SFC's capability to fulfill its mission. The SFC urges the committee's approval of HB 146.

In consideration of HOUSE BILL 146 RELATING TO THE STATE FIRE COUNCIL

House Bill 146 proposes to add to the membership of the State Fire Council, and to the membership of advisory committees that the Council may appoint, representatives from the Hawaii State Aircraft Rescue Fire Fighting Unit and the Division of Forestry and Wildlife of the Department of Land and Natural Resources (Department) to reflect all non-federal fire-fighting agencies in the State. **The Department supports this measure.**

The Department's Division of Forestry and Wildlife is the primary responder for wildfires on 26% of the land area in Hawaii and has approximately 150 staff trained to respond. The Division has agreements with federal and county agencies for jointly responding to fire events and works closely on fire response across the state. Becoming a member of the State Fire Council would provide another opportunity for the Division to engage with county fire departments on fire issues that affect natural resources and public safety.
