1 EOA's Position: The Executive Office on Aging (EOA), an attached agency to the Department

2 of Health, supports the intent of HB 1487, relating to Senior Medicare Patrol (SMP) Hawaii.

3 Fiscal Implications: This measure appropriates \$229,680 for SFY 2023 and the same sum for

4 SFY 2024 for one full-time equivalent (1.0 FTE) Program Specialist III position, one full-time

5 equivalent (1.0 FTE) Program Specialist IV position, and one full-time equivalent (1.0 FTE)

6 Program Specialist V position within the EOA for SMP Hawaii. The sums appropriated shall be

7 expended by the EOA.

8 **Purpose and Justification:** The purpose of this bill is to appropriate funds to EOA for three (3)

9 full-time permanent positions for the SMP Hawaii program. These positions will strengthen and

10 increase SMP's ability to ensure timely, reliable, and accurate services are provided to kupuna,

- 11 their families, and caregivers in need. SMP Hawaii's mission is to provide a "help net" to
- educate, assist, and refer residents to the proper authorities, and be a reliable source for accurate

information and responsive assistance with Medicare, Medicaid, and other health-related scams,
fraud, or abuse. SMP receives inquiries from the statewide Help Line and interactive website,
provides 1:1 counseling and referrals, and conducts community outreach to underserved groups
and communities to expand access and assistance. SMP Hawaii, it's volunteers and partners,
will continue to educate, advocate, and help to protect our precious kupuna.
In addition, SMP Hawaii has established a network of partnerships across the finance,

technology, legal, and retail industries to be able to triage non-health related fraud cases to the
proper authority to provide further assistance, in a timely manner. These cases include gift card
and charity schemes, romance, caregiver, and imposter scams and ransomware that tricks older
adults into giving away their personal information and money.

11 According to the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services 8/22/22, National Vital Statistics Report, Hawaii ranks number one nationwide in longevity at 80.7 years of age, and this 12 population of those aged 65 and over is projected to continue to grow as the baby boomer 13 generation becomes eligible for Medicare. Annually, Medicare loses an estimated 70 billion 14 dollars to fraudulent claims. Criminals steal an average \$34,200 per victim. Hawaii reports over 15 \$17,000,000 lost to online scams. Losses are expected to exceed \$53 million per year by 2035. 16 As a community we have all experienced the rise in scam behaviors on our phones, social 17 media accounts, emails and even the television ads that harangue us with enticing offers that are 18 "too good to be true!" Our shorelines no longer protect us from the barrage of scams that 19 inundate us due to our growing reliance on the internet and social media in our daily lives. 20 21 As Hawaii's aging population grows, so has the incidence of scams that target this vulnerable 22 group. The frequency and complexity of scams have grown significantly as scam artists know that Hawaii's people are very giving and trusting of others by nature and the potential for harm 23 to this targeted group continues to rise disproportionally. 24

Hawaii SMP was established in 1997, and for twenty-five years, EOA has operated this
 program with two temporary full-time staff who recruit, train, and retain a cohort of volunteers

statewide. The passing of this bill to establish three (3) critically needed permanent full-time
positions will allow for the needed expansion of EOA's capacity to meet the demands for timely,
accurate, and reliable services to kupuna, their family members and caregivers in need.

Failure to secure general funding to increase staffing will continue to limit our ability to grow and expand the safety net to safeguard against victimization, to contribute toward the preservation of the Medicare program, and could jeopardize EOA's mission "To optimize the health, safety and independence of Hawaii's older adults and people with disabilities. We support kupuna and their caregivers through planning, development, advocacy, and coordination of policies, programs, and services."

10 It takes our entire state to protect our kupuna.

11 Recommendation: EOA supports the intent of this measure provided that its enactment does not 12 reduce or replace priorities with the Administration's budget request.

I'm a 5 year member of the Policy Advisory Board on Elder Affairs (PABEA), which provides community input to the DOH-Executive Office on Aging, monitors EOA and more. PABEA supports this measure to appropriate funds for additional positions to meet the demands for assistance caused by increased reports on fraud, healthcare billing errors and abuse. It is not only our vulnerable seniors that are affected by fraud but also their families and caregivers.

Residents with incorrect or false claims could be better served if SMP Hawaii had adequate staffing. More cases of suspected fraud or abuse could be resolved, with Medicare/Medicaid cost savings, recoveries or avoidance resulting. With only two full-time staff members for the past 25 years, we are grateful that SMP Hawaii has managed to-date, but it is really at a tipping point since the Baby Boomers, the largest population of our country, entered their "golden years" in 2011 here in Hawaii. This population will only increase through the next two decades. Scams on the phone and via email and social media have also risen. Now is the time to act to genuinely help our kupuna, those most vulnerable to fraudsters.

The Hawaii Senior Medicare Patrol (SMP) is a federally funded, volunteer-based program that is administered by the Hawaii State Department of Health, Executive Office on Aging. SMP Hawaii empowers and assists Medicare beneficiaries, their families, and caregivers to prevent, detect, and report health care fraud, errors and abuse through outreach, counseling and education.

I work as a Program Coordinator in a non-profit organization, Project Dana, providing social support services to older adults and caregivers. SMP Hawaii is a great community partner. SMP staff and volunteers have provided valuable educational presentations on current scams and frauds targeting older adults, what older can do to protect themselves, how to detect and report, how to navigate Medicare, and community resources available for caregivers. Older adults and caregivers are vulnerable and targeted by scammers and persons committing fraud and abuse. Participants in our program have been targeted by scammers and fraud. However, with the education and skills they learned from SMP Hawaii, they quickly realized the situation they were in and was able to leave the situation without becoming a victim. They also took actions after to prevent the situation from happening again. SMP staff and volunteers helped them become more vigilant, guided them on what they can do, as well as educate others around them.

Our state's older adult population, Medicare beneficiaries, and their caregivers who will need this program's services will only increase in the future. Persons who commit healthcare fraud, errors, and abuse use technology that increases an older adult's vulnerability and complicates detection and prevention. SMP Hawaii provides services that keeps older adults and caregivers updated with current information on scams, frauds, and abuse and what to do for prevention and reporting.

I strongly support HB1487, relating to the Senior Medicare Patrol, which would provide SMP Hawaii with additional staff to sustain the program and meet the growing needs of our older adult population. I urge the committee to pass HB1487.

My name is Wanda Anae-Onishi of Waikele, Oahu. I am testifying as a private citizen in support of HB1487. The Senior Medicare Patrol Program (SMP Hawaii) in the Executive Office on Aging (EOA) educates Medicare beneficiaries on how to prevent Medicare fraud. Their partnership with the Kupuna Alert Partners, which includes the State Attorney General's Office and the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs, broadens their outreach to educate the public on various scams.

The bill requests appropriations to fund three permanent staff positions. The EOA received the first SMP federal grant in 1997 and employed two temporary staff. While the number of scams has increased and more identities, income, and assets have been stolen, SMP Hawaii's staff continues to be two temporary positions doing the work of five people. Additional staff will provide more support to prevent and report the increasing number of scams that affect vulnerable citizens.

I strongly urge you to support HB1487, Relating to the Senior Medicare Patrol Program, to sustain this important program that helps Hawaii residents identify scams and take corrective measures after they've been scammed to protect them from future thefts. Mahalo for this opportunity to testify.

My name is Keali'i Lopez and I am the State Director for AARP Hawai'i. AARP is a nonpartisan, social mission organization that advocates for individuals age 50 and older. We have a membership of nearly 38 million nationwide and nearly 140,000 in Hawaii. We advocate at the state and federal level for the issues that matter most to older adults and their families.

AARP supports H.B. 1487 which appropriates funds for additional positions within the State's Senior Medicare Patrol Program (SMP) to meet the rising demand for assistance caused by increased reports of health fraud, medical billing errors, and abuse.

SMP plays a vital role in advocating, educating, and protecting Hawaii's most vulnerable population. There are rising numbers of health-related scams and frauds targeting people especially older adults with Medicare coverage. Identity theft, gift cards, COVID test kits/vaccines/cures, durable medical equipment, genetic testing are common tactics that scammers use to defraud unknowing victims. Medicare loses \$70 billion of taxpayer dollars to false claims every year. There are approximately 279,000 Medicare beneficiaries in Hawai'i and the number continues to increase as the state's population ages. Additional SMP staff and volunteer support will be needed to meet the demand for outreach and counseling to kupuna.

Support for HB1487, Relating to the Senior Medicare Patrol Program

Senior Medicare Patrol (SMP) Hawaii is a federally-funded, volunteer-based program administered by the Hawaii State Department of Health, Executive Office of Aging protecting Hawaii's kupuna and their families from Medicare fraud, errors, and abuse. Today, 1 in 5 Hawaii residents are age 65 and older and 295,405 are enrolled in Medicare. By 2030 more than 1 in 3 residents will be 65 and older and in 2037 more than 500,000 residents will be eligible for Medicare. Every year scammers prey on this vulnerable group not only on Medicare but identity theft, gift card scams, government imposters, just to name a few. SMP Hawaii offers free education, counseling, referrals, exhibits, and community presentations to help kupuna avoid fraud and scams.

I recently became a SMP Hawaii volunteer. Both SMP Hawaii staff members have helped guide me as I trained to become a volunteer. I soon began to notice that there were many other administrative duties requiring their attention in addition to coordinating exhibits and community outreach. Some examples are 1) Working on one case can take a few days to more than a year to resolve. In 2022, there were 633 kupuna who called SMP Hawaii seeking help. 2) Being part of a national program requires data entries into SIRS (SMP Information and Reporting System) and making sure our federal grant requirements are followed. 3) Healthcare fraud like many other types of fraud often evolves leading to a constant need to be reviewed and discussed with the Volunteer Team.

I live on Hawaii Island and community outreach can be challenging with the distance between communities as far as 77 miles apart. Add the rest of the state all being managed by only two full-time staff members. With the anticipated increase in the kupuna population, it is vital that more help is needed.

Therefore, I strongly support HB1487, relating to the Senior Medicare Patrol Program, which would provide SMP Hawaii with critical and important funding for three program specialist positions to expand outreach and counseling to kupuna. I urge the Committee to pass HB1487. Thank you for your consideration.
