University of Hawaii system to include a corrective action plan in its respective report to the legislature, should it not meet its

benchmark. Repeals the separate benchmark for the department of education that requires thirty per cent of food served in public

schools to consist of locally sourced products by 2030.

Appropriates funds for the establishment of a farm-to-state liaison within the office of the governor. Effective 6/30/3000. (HD1)

Department's Position:

The Hawaii State Department of Education (Department) respectfully opposes this measure. The Department supports the overall concept of HB 247, HD1, but finds that the percentage increases in local agricultural products in the given timeline are unattainable.

We support a reasonable, gradual increase in the rate of local products purchased by the Department that takes into account economic feasibility. If we are unable to procure an item at an acceptable price point it would increase the difficulty of meeting the required percentages. In addition, the Department finds that the current local supply is unable to meet the needs of the school meal program. The Department will continue to work with food suppliers, which includes local farmers, to build capacity and guarantees of delivery.


Thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony in support of **H.B. 247**, which would align the "farm to state" benchmarks passed into law in 2021 with the farm to school goal of 30 percent local by 2030 ("30 by 30"), expand the "30 by 30" goal to match the benchmarks of the other state departments, expand reporting requirements, and establish a "farm to state liaison" position within the office of the governor.

Hawai'i Appleseed is one of several organizations that has been working with SFSB for over a decade on a wide variety of initiatives to help more children access nutritious food at school. We understand that the 30 by 30 farm to school goal will not only help local farmers, but will also improve the quality of school meals and drive higher school meal participation rates. Adequate nutrition is essential for children's health, learning, and long-term development. Unfortunately, for too many families in Hawai'i, school breakfast and lunch are the only balanced, nutritious meals they get in a day.

We have included a graphic that shows how this bill aligns the farm to state benchmarks with the 30 by 30 goal. We think this alignment will be a productive way to streamline the efforts across multiple agencies.

While we agree that the centralized kitchen model currently proposed by HIDOE could be a constructive component of a farm to school plan, we want to emphasize that farm to school (even more than other institutional food purchasing initiatives) requires much more planning and coordination than just centralizing purchasing and production. Getting the ingredients from farm to central kitchen is just the first step. Getting the ingredients from the central kitchen to schools, then into recipes, onto students' plates, and finally into bellies will require much more planning and coordination within HIDOE. We are therefore highly supportive of the bill's inclusion of a farm to state liaison position in the office of the governor. This position will provide critical support for aligning the metrics of the various state departments, standing up systems for data collection, and providing support to ensure benchmarks are met. We also appreciate the inclusion of a "corrective action plan" clause.

Thank you for considering these comments in your deliberation of H.B. 247. We understand that this is not a silver bullet solution, but we do think that—combined with some other reforms the legislature is considering this session—it will go a long way toward improving the way we deliver school meals to Hawai'i's public school children. Our child nutrition programs are one of the best safety nets available to ensure Hawai'i children have access to the nutrition they need in order to learn and grow. We sincerely believe that this legislation will help us achieve this outcome.

Ulupono Initiative supports HB 247 HD1, Relating to Agriculture.

Dear Chair Gabbard, Chair Kidani, Chair Kim, and Members of the Committees:

My name is Micah Munekata, and I am the Director of Government Affairs at Ulupono Initiative. We are a Hawaiʻi-focused impact investment firm that strives to improve the quality of life throughout the islands by helping our communities become more resilient and self-sufficient through locally produced food, renewable energy and clean transportation choices, and better management of freshwater resources.

Ulupono <u>supports</u> HB 247 HD1, which increases the percentages of local agricultural products that certain departments are required to purchase by certain deadlines; expands annual reporting requirements to include the total spending by certain market channels; requires each relevant state department and the University of Hawai'i system to include a corrective action plan in its respective report to the legislature, should it not meet its benchmark; repeals the separate benchmark for the Department of Education that requires thirty per cent of food served in public schools to consist of locally sourced products by 2030; and, appropriates funds for the establishment of a farm to state liaison within the Office of the Governor.

Ulupono supports the efforts to increase locally produced food into state institutional meal programs. This bill seeks to clarify benchmarks and expand Act 176, SLH 2021, reporting requirements, while also creating dedicated coordination resources in the Office of the Governor.

The Hawai'i Department of Education (DOE) constitutes the majority of meals served across all state departments and agencies, producing approximately 120,000 meals per day with a \$50-\$60 million annual food budget and an estimated \$100 million total annual School Food Services Program budget.¹ This requires close attention, and we hope that the DOE will begin more robust reporting on the efforts to meet its local food purchasing goals. The DOE's most recent Farm to School report to the Legislature, submitted in December 2022, provided general terms and basic statistics. Equally important, there is no action plan or strategy outlining how the department will improve to meet its 30% by 2030 goal.

The 2.5-page report would not be sufficient for a \$100 million private restaurant company, and certainly should not be considered sufficient for the DOE school meal system.

We understand that the task to implement local products into our keiki's meals is complex, so we commend those within the DOE who are enthusiastic and willing to champion the State's worthy farm to school goals. However, the DOE stated in back-to-back annual reports to the Legislature that the department could not do the necessary reporting accurately due to the lack of information technology (IT) system functionality. Furthermore, for more than 3 years now, the Farm to School Coordinator position within the DOE has remained vacant. The DOE and the State must find ways to support the School Food Services Branch in meeting its farm to school goals, including the development of a local food procurement strategic plan, the development of efficient and effective data gathering IT systems to support that plan, and the hiring of Farm to School positions to provide necessary labor resources. Ulupono and many others remain very open and willing to support the DOE in meeting these needs.

We ask that the Legislature consider adding in a requirement for the DOE to develop a strategic business plan to meet its local food goals established in this measure.

The Hawaii Farmers Union United (HFUU) is a 501(c)(5) agricultural advocacy nonprofit representing a network of over 2,500 family farmers and their supporters across the Hawaiian Islands. **HFUU supports HB247.**

The bill aims to increase the percentage of local agricultural products that certain state departments and the University of Hawaii system purchase by certain deadlines. This act will also repeal the separate benchmark for the Department of Education, requiring 30% of food served in public schools to consist of locally sourced products by 2030. HFUU agrees that setting clear and ambitious target goals for the purchase of locally grown food ensures that the state plays its role in supporting local farmers, keeps revenue from local produce in Hawaii, and feeds local people.

By clarifying annual reporting requirements to include total spending by certain market channels and requiring corrective action plans if benchmarks are not met, this legislation will ensure that the manifold benefits to Hawaii's economy, environment, culture, and public health are realized.

HFUU believes that the goals to provide locally-sourced food should be consistent across all relevant state departments to avoid any confusion between departments. Furthermore, the establishment of a farm-to-state liaison within the office of the governor will provide critical support to state departments in meeting purchasing goals.

Hawai'i Public Health Institute (HIPHI) works to advance policy and systems change to reduce disparities and improve the health of Hawai'i residents. HIPHI is home to and testifies here on behalf of the Obesity Prevention Task Forceⁱ and The Hawai'i Farm to School Hui, which collectively represent over 60 organizations from across the islands.

Hawai'i Public Health Institute (HIPHI) appreciates the opportunity to provide Strong Support for HB 247, which increases the percentage of local agricultural products that certain departments need to purchase by a specific date. It also expands annual reporting requirements to include the total spending by certain designees. It requires reports to the legislature to ensure the benchmarks are met, and creates a Farm-to-State Liaison within the Governor's office to coordinate efforts between the 5 departments affected by the bill. Finally it streamlines meeting the Department of Education benchmark of 30% locally sourced products served by 2030.

This bill aligns Farm to School (Act 175) and Farm to State (Act 176) procurement goals and expands annual reporting requirements. The requirements of goal setting, benchmarks, and reporting will strengthen the efforts to reach the statewide food system goals. Critically, this bill creates a Farm to State liaison in the Governor's Office, which will help the various state departments coordinate local food procurement rather than competing with each other

The bill supports an increase in local procurement by creating a continuum of incremental goals through 2050. Every year the locally sourced food goals increase by 5%, culminating in a 50% locally sourced goal by 2050. Increased procurement of locally grown and raised foods for consumption by Hawai'i's students will positively impact the health of our keiki and the development of Hawai'i sustainable food systems.

Organized since 1948, the HFB is comprised of 1,800 farm family members statewide and serves as Hawai'i's voice of agriculture to protect, advocate and advance the social, economic, and educational interests of our diverse agricultural community.

The Hawai i Farm Bureau supports HB 247, HD1, which increases the percentages of local agricultural products that certain departments are required to purchase by certain deadlines, expands annual reporting requirements to include the total spending by certain market channels, requires each relevant state departments and the University of Hawai i system to include a corrective action plan in its respective report to the legislature, should it not meet its benchmark, and repeals the separate benchmark for the department of education that requires thirty per cent of food served in public schools to consist of locally sourced products by 2030.

HFB strongly supports the increased use of locally grown agricultural products, fruits, vegetables, meats, dairy, and poultry products in our state institutions and appreciates the Legislature's support of Farm to State and Farm to School Acts 175 and 176 (SLH 2021).
