1 **Fiscal Implications:** This measure may impact the priorities identified in the Governor's

2 Executive Budget Request for the Department of Health's (Department) appropriations and

3 personnel priorities.

4 **Department Testimony:** The Department supports HB0256 to amend Hawaii Revised Statutes

5 (HRS) Section 342G-1 to include two new definitions for "biodegradable" and "organic waste;"

6 amend HRS Section 342G-26(c) to identify specific measures to divert organic waste produced

7 within the counties; require the counties to incorporate these organic waste diversion

8 requirements into their respective integrated solid waste management plans; and provide funding

9 to the counties to implement this new requirement in their planning efforts.

10 The Department respectfully requests that a new subaccount project fund be established 11 in the Environmental Management Special Fund and appropriations to reimburse the counties for 12 incorporating organic waste diversion measures into their integrated solid waste management 13 plans be deposited into the subaccount. In accordance with HRS Section 342G-24, counties shall 14 submit revised integrated solid waste management plans to the Department every ten years. 15 Counties that just updated their integrated solid waste management plans will not need to submit 16 their next update to the Department for several years. For example, the County of Kaua'i 17 completed its revised integrated solid waste management plan in 2021 and will not update their 18 current plan until 2031. Creating a subaccount project fund will preserve the appropriated funds 19 until it is necessary to reimburse the counties. 20 Thank you for the opportunity to testify.

# In consideration of HOUSE BILL 256 RELATING TO ORGANIC WASTE

House Bill 256 requires each county to incorporate into its next integrated solid waste management plan revision a plan to divert all organic waste produced within the county by facilities generating more than a certain amount of organic waste per year. Appropriates funds to reimburse the counties for incorporation of the new requirement into their plan revisions. **The Climate Change Mitigation and Adaptation Commission (Commission) supports this bill.** 

The Hawai'i Climate Change Mitigation and Adaptation Commission consists of a multijurisdictional effort between 20 different departments, committees, and counties. Food loss and waste is estimated to be roughly one third of the food intended for human consumption in the United States. When food ends up in landfills, it generates methane, a potent greenhouse gas. The Commission recognizes the importance of diverting organic waste to alternative processing such as composting to reduce the generation of methane and highlights the additional need to address food waste. The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) published a report in 2021 on the environmental impacts of food waste. EPA estimated that each year, U.S. food loss and waste equals the annual CO2 emissions of 42 coal-fired power plants. The report also highlights the benefits of preventing food loss and waste in terms of agricultural land, blue water, fertilizer, and energy. Reducing and preventing food waste can increase food security, foster productivity and economic efficiency, promote resource and energy conservation, and address climate change, which in turn, could also decrease climate change-related shocks to the supply chain.

The responsible management of organic waste is a critical part of our long term waste management for Hawai'i. Our islands only have so much capacity and land mass to accommodate additional landfills and their environmental impacts.

HAPA fully supports efforts across the board to reduce landfill waste, increase composting, address climate change and support regenerative agriculture and efforts such as HB256 are part of the solution. Bills like HB256 are how we establish a sustainable, profitable and regenerative agriculture system for Hawai'i while improving our land management practices.

By diverting organic material from landfills we save this resource and generate valuable compost. This can divert up to 54% of household waste from the landfill and create rich fertilizer for healthy, nutritious plants.

Keeping organic matter out of the landfill will reduce carbon dioxide and human-made methane emissions, which are greenhouse gasses that contribute to climate change and are also a critically important part of regenerative agriculture.

For counties like Kaua'i, increased diversion of all waste from their landfill is critical and urgent. With the Kekaha Landfill once again at capacity, the county of Kaua'i is scrambling for solutions to avoid a potential garbage disaster. The support from the legislature can assist the county in achieving diversion goals for organic waste.

Organic waste is any material that comes from either a plant or an animal and can be decomposed by microorganisms (biodegradable) into carbon dioxide, methane, and simple organic molecules, or consists of the remains, residues, or waste products of any organism.

Organic Waste Management increases the structure, texture, air circulation, and water holding capacity of the soil, its storage, maintenance, and use are easier than dung manure, it is free from pathogens, toxic elements, and weed seeds, and earthworm manure reduces the loss of nutrients. Compost and fertilizer is a much better use of organic waste than to dispose of it in a landfill where it only produces dangerous methane gas.

Requiring each county to incorporate into its next integrated solid waste management plan revision a plan to divert all organic waste produced within the county by facilities generating more than a certain amount of organic waste per year and appropriating funds to reimburse the counties for incorporation of the new requirement into their plan revisions are consistent with the state and counties' duties under the Public



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Trust Doctrine under Article XI, Section 1, of the Hawaii State Constitution, and the DPH Platform environmental plank to restore, preserve, and protect our native ecosystem.
