In consideration of **HOUSE BILL 285** RELATING TO FIRE PREVENTION

House Bill 285 proposes to appropriate funds to the Department of Land and Natural Resources (Department) to reduce hazardous wildfire fuels on the landscape, particularly on lands adjacent to communities. The Department supports this measure.

With changes in land use and climate in Hawai'i, wildfire is a significant and growing hazard in many places across the state. Research in wildfire science shows that vegetation is a key component for recurring wildfire. Vegetation management is essential for reducing wildfire hazard, creating safer conditions for firefighters, and serving as a key climate adaptation strategy as climate change increases risk for fire. Funds are needed by the Department to reduce hazardous fuels on the landscape that threaten not only the watersheds the department manages but also the adjacent communities and critical public infrastructure such as powerlines and communication facilities. The requested funds will be used to create firebreaks between communities and watersheds, reduce flammable grasses on the landscape through projects like managed grazing and provide water infrastructure for grazing and fire suppression.





Dear Rep. Linda Ichiyama, Chair and Honorable Committee Members,

The Hawaii Wildfire Management Organization (HWMO) supports House Bill 285, which proposes to appropriate funds to the Department of Land & Natural Resources to reduce hazardous wildfire fuels on the landscape, particularly on lands adjacent to communities.

As you may know, nearly a quarter of our state's lands are covered in non-native, flammable grasslands, and this footprint is ever expanding with each subsequent fire. Vegetation management is key for reducing wildfire hazards, increasing protection of our watersheds and the communities and public infrastructure that are adjacent to them.

This bill will complement and enhance the work being done by our organization alongside various agency and community partners across the state to reduce wildfire risk. Two of our collaborative, multi-partner, cross-boundary programs include the Pacific Fire Exchange, a fire science communication program that is co-led by us and the University of Hawai'i, and Hawaii's Firewise® USA Communities Program that supports and connects 18 communities across 4 islands on their awareness-raising and risk-reducing actions.
