SUBJECT: <u>HB 350 HD1</u> – RELATING TO CHILD ABUSE REPORTING.

DEPARTMENT'S POSITION: The Department of Human Services (DHS) supports this

measure, provides comments, and requests a clarifying amendment.

PURPOSE: The bill establishes that the exemption from mandatory reporting by members of the clergy does not apply when the clergy member believes that there exists a substantial risk that child abuse or neglect that is especially heinous, atrocious, or cruel, manifesting exceptional depravity, may occur in the reasonably foreseeable future. Effective 6/30/3000. (HD1)

The HD1 amended this measure by:

- (1) Changing the effective date to June 30, 3000, to encourage further discussion; and
- (2) Making technical, nonsubstantive amendments for the purposes of clarity, consistency, and style.

DHS appreciates the Legislature's commitment to improving the State's child protection and welfare systems. However, given the history of clergy abuse in Hawaii and elsewhere, DHS previously opposed any exemption from mandatory reporting for clergy. This measure will require clergy to report abuse, even when received in penitential communications, when they are "especially heinous, atrocious, or cruel, manifesting exceptional depravity," as defined in section 706-657, Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS). For the committee's information, section 706-657, HRS, provides "[a]s used in this section, the phrase "especially heinous, atrocious, or cruel, manifesting exceptional depravity" means a conscienceless or pitiless crime which is unnecessarily torturous to a victim."

DHS respectfully suggests a clarifying amendment to delete "other than a penitential communication" on page 4, lines 7-8, as this additional reference to "penitential communication" is confusing to the reader as it comes after the newly added reportable information.

While many known cases of abuse may not rise to the depravity of this added definition, this proposal will strengthen Hawaii's reporting law as it will require clergy to report abuse even when received from a penitential communication.
