In consideration of HOUSE BILL 365, HOUSE DRAFT 1, SENATE DRAFT 1 RELATING TO SPECIAL MANAGEMENT AREAS

House Bill 365, House Draft 1, Senate Draft 1 proposes to expand exclusions from the definition of "development" as it applies to special management areas to reduce the need for special management area permits for certain activities. **The Department of Land and Natural Resources (Department) supports the bill.**

Many parts of the State fall both within the Special Management Area and the State Land Use Conservation District, and land uses in these areas might require both Special Management Area permits and Conservation District Use Permits.

The Department appreciates that this measure will exclude from the definition of "development" invasive species control and the installation of fencing for invasive species control or the preservation of native habitats. We believe that this will help facilitate projects that are intended to preserve and protect the State's natural and cultural resources.

The Department also appreciates that traditional fishpond and traditional agricultural practices will be excluded from the definition of development. In 2015 the Department initiated the "Hoʻāla Loko Iʻa" program, which streamlined the permitting process for the repair, restoration, and operation of traditional Hawaiian fishpond systems. The proposed bill is consistent with this program, and we believe it will benefit cultural practitioners who are working to restore the State's fishponds.

The Department of Planning and Permitting (DPP) **supports** House Bill No. 365, HD 1, SD 1, which would expand exclusions from the definition of "development" as it applies to special management areas (SMA) to reduce the need for SMA permits for certain activities.

We support the change in the HD 1 to keep the dwelling size at 7,500 square feet, instead of reducing it to 5,000 square feet. We also support the intent of the Bill and believe SMA permit streamlining will facilitate important restoration activities, enhance public pedestrian and bicycle access to recreational areas within the SMA, and support safety measures for public facilities.

We note the counties are empowered to require an SMA permit if they determine coastal zone impacts are anticipated for any project. Given this, we believe the proposed amendments would not compromise the need to manage activities within the SMA in Hawaii.

The Land Use Research Foundation of Hawaii (LURF) is a private, non-profit research and trade association whose members include major Hawaii landowners, developers, and utility companies. LURF's mission is to advocate for reasonable, rational, and equitable land use planning, legislation and regulations that encourage well-planned economic growth and development, while safeguarding Hawaii's significant natural and cultural resources, and public health and safety.

LURF appreciates the opportunity to support HB 365, HD1. SD1.

HB365, **HD 1**, **SD1**. The purpose of this measure is to expand exclusions from the definition of "development" as it applies to special management areas to reduce the need for special management area permits for certain activities.

LURF's Position: Under existing SMA law, development along the shoreline and special management areas require a county SMA review and permit. The existing broad definition of "development," coupled with rising labor and materials costs, can trigger a mandatory SMA use permit review for improvements, facilities, and incidental structures that may not have a significant adverse environmental impact and may not justify such intense scrutiny or the associated costs and time delays that accompany it.

This bill expands exclusions to the definition of "development" in chapter 205A, Hawaii Revised Statutes, to reduce the need for SMA permits for certain activities that may not warrant such review, increased costs, and permitting delays.

Prior testimonies indicate that the counties support this bill. Maui Council Chair Alice Lee (in her individual capacity), Maui Mayor Rick Bissen, and the City's Department of Planning and Permitting (City), have noted that the SMA law still authorizes the counties require an SMA permit if they determine coastal zone impacts are anticipated for any project; and that this measure's targeted amendments will promote, not undercut or compromise the environmental controls, quality and protections that the SMA regulations are intended to protect. Those county officials have also stated that the SMA permit streamlining in this bill will provide more time for the county to focus on and review important projects along the shoreline, including restoration activities, enhancement of public pedestrian and bicycle access to recreational areas within the SMA, and will support safety measures for public facilities.

For the reasons set forth above, LURF is in **support of HB 365**, **HD1**, **SD1**, and respectfully requests that this Committee favorably consider this measure.
