On the following measure: H.B. 467, RELATING TO SOCIAL WORK

Chair Hashem and Members of the Committee:

My name is Rochelle Araki, and I am the Executive Officer of the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs' (Department) Professional and Vocational Licensing Division (Division) Social Worker Licensing Program (Program). The Department offers comments on this bill.

The purposes of this bill are to require: (1) the Department of Public Safety, in collaboration with the Department of Human Services, to develop and establish a social work training program to assist nonviolent incarcerated individuals in exploring a professional pathway in social work and becoming eligible to work as assistants to licensed social workers; and (2) the Department of Public Safety and Department of Human Services to jointly submit a report of the departments' progress in developing and establishing the social work training program to the Legislature no later than the twenty days prior to the convening of the regular sessions of 2024 and 2025.

While the Department appreciates the intent of this measure, the Department would like to ensure that any individual exploring a professional pathway in the practice of social work also comply with Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS) chapter 467E. HRS chapter 467E sets forth, among other things, the requirements to be issued a license to practice social work in the State of Hawaii, as well as specific prohibited acts in connection with the use of the title of social worker with a person's name.

For the Committee's information, HRS section 467E-7 sets forth the license requirements for licensed social workers in the State, including education, examination, and experience requirements, and HRS section 467E-13 sets forth prohibited acts and penalties. HRS section 467E-13 states, in relevant part, that:

(a) No person shall:

- (1) Use in connection with the person's name any designation tending to imply that the person is a social worker, licensed bachelor social worker, licensed social worker, or licensed clinical social worker unless the person is duly licensed and authorized under this chapter; and
- (2) Represent oneself as a social worker, licensed bachelor social worker, licensed social worker, or licensed clinical social worker during the time the person's license issued under this chapter is forfeited, terminated, suspended, or revoked.

(b) Any person who violates this section shall be subject to a fine of not more than \$1,000 and each day's violation shall be deemed a separate offense.

Any person engaged in the practice of social work, unless specifically exempted from licensure pursuant to HRS section 467E-6, is subject to licensure by the Program. Thank you for the opportunity to testify on this bill.

The Hawaii Health & Harm Reduction Center (HHHRC) supports HB 467 which would provide funds to implement a pilot program with the Dept. of Public Safety (soon to be Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation) to provide workforce training to support non-violent incarcerated individuals in potentially stating a career path toward social services.

HHHRC's mission is to reduce harm, promote health, create wellness and fight stigma in Hawaii and the Pacific. We focus our efforts on those disproportionately affected by social determinants of health, including but not limited to: people living with and/or affected by HIV, hepatitis, substance use, and the transgender, LGBQ and the Native Hawaiian communities.

Testimony in Support for HB467 RELATING TO SOCIAL WORK

The National Association of Social Workers – Hawai'i (NASW- HI) supports HB467, which would require the Departments of Public Safety and Human Services to coordinate to establish a program to train nonviolent, incarcerated individuals in the area of social work.

NASW-HI greatly appreciates the spirit and intent of this measure, which would encourage nonviolent incarcerated individuals, with valuable life experience interfacing with social service organizations, to train and pursue employment opportunities in the area of social work, once released.

However, we wish to highlight that a license in social work - requiring a masters degree including practicum experience, as well as a licensure exam, cannot be accomplished via apprenticeship through this program.

To better understand the distinction between working in "the area of social work" and the "Practice of Social Work," this description adopted by the NASW is helpful:

Social work practice consists of the professional application of social work values, principles, and techniques to one or more of the following ends: helping people obtain tangible services; counseling and psychotherapy with individuals, families, and groups; helping communities or groups provide or improve social and health services; and participating in legislative processes. The practice of social work requires knowledge of human development and behavior; of social, economic, and cultural institutions; and of the interaction of all these factors.
