SUBJECT: Testimony in Support of HB499

On behalf of the nearly 300 City & County of Honolulu lifeguards on the island of O`ahu, I am in strong support of HB499, to create a Duke Kahanamoku license plate to raise money for water safety and swim education. We have been advocating for some time to see more attention paid on a statewide basis to endeavors that improve our residents' situational awareness around the ocean. Such awareness must start in our keiki, but must be a lifelong trait.

It might surprise you to learn that virtually all ocean and water safety programs across our islands are led by non-government agencies, by non-profits, by volunteers, and even by our own off duty county lifeguards – on their own time, on their own dime. It is time for state-wide leadership that *begins* to draw together these efforts so that they can be improved upon, invested in, and so that they reach more residents. Who better to do that than Duke? What better way than a reminder as we drive?

O`ahu's lifeguards stand in strong support of this measure and hope it is the beginning of even stronger legislative measures on behalf of statewide ocean safety.

Dear Chair Tam, Vice Chair Martinez, members of the Committee on Culture, Arts & International Affairs:

I am in <u>strong support</u> of HB 499 to create a Duke Kahanamoku license plate to raise money for water safety and swim education. The Outrigger Duke Kahanamoku Foundation exists to perpetuate the legacy and spirit of Duke Kahanamoku. The foundation gives scholarships and grants in Hawaii related to watersports, volleyball, and water safety. Hawaii is known as a place of waterman excellence. However, the drowning data is telling a different story.

Hawaii is ranked second in the nation for rate of drowning among residents. Sadly, these resident deaths only account for 46% of the drownings in our state; more than half the drowning victims in Hawaii are visitors.* The United Nations and the World Health Organization have officially recognized drowning as a major public health problem and it's time for our waterman state to do the same and put more resources towards prevention. We need widespread and continual aquatics education for children and adults, and residents and visitors.

Duke Kahanamoku, history's most well-known Native Hawaiian Olympic swimmer, godfather of surfing, and Ambassador of Aloha is an important figure to commemorate. Duke's likeness on a license plate symbolizes the waterman excellence and aloha spirit our state is known for, and surely would be quite popular. It would be an honor to his name to use the resulting proceeds to teach aquatics safety and to save lives.

I strongly urge you to pass this legislation. Thank you for the opportunity to testify.



Methodology


- Primary data source: death certificate database
 - Includes:
 - Unintentional deaths with drowning as underlying cause of death (UCD)
 - Deaths (unintentional or related to diseases) with drowning as contributing cause of death (CCD)
 - Excludes:
 - Deaths with drowning as underlying cause of death, but either intentional (usually suicide, but also homicide) or possibly intentional (undetermined intent)
- UCD drownings are 93% of the total
 - Proportion varies by year (lowest (82%) in 2016)
 - Proportion varies by county (lowest (89%) for Maui)

(*Includes drownings in all environments among residents of that state)




Fatal ocean drownings in Hawaii, by victim residence status 2012-2021




Ocean drownings in Hawaii, by activity of victim, 2012-2021




Ocean drownings in Hawaii, by residence and activity of victim, 2012-2021




Number and ten-year rate of ocean drownings in Hawaii, by residence of victim, 2011-2020






Leading causes of fatal injuries in Hawaii, by residence of victims, 2012-2021



Ocean drownings on Kauai, 2012-2021








Ocean drownings on Oahu, 2012-2021


- 382 total, 33 to 44 per year

- Activity: Swimming (19%) and snorkeling (19%)






Ocean drownings on Maui County, 2012-2021


- 203 total, 10 to 29 per year

- Activity: Snorkeling (45%)






Ocean drownings on Hawaii County, 2012-2021
