Department's Position:

The Hawaii State Department of Education (Department) supports HB 69, HD1, SD1. The Resources for Enrichment, Athletics/Academics, Culture, and Health (REACH) program provides critical, developmentally-aligned out-of-school time (OST) opportunities to public middle/intermediate and charter school students at no cost to their families.

The Department respectfully requests the appropriation of \$2,500,000, as was proposed in the first draft of HB 69 to expand its after-school programs. These funds would create opportunities for middle-level schools by increasing programming access for more students. The funds would also enhance the quality of existing programs by allowing schools to participate in special projects and help to supply and staff the programs and activities. By investing in the REACH program, the State of Hawaii will signal its commitment to our students, families, and communities.

This measure aligns with the Department's high-leverage priority of middle-level

education to support student academic growth and social-emotional learning.

Afterschool programming is incredibly important to working families. Having a nurturing place to go afterschool allows children and youth to stay safe and their parents to work full-time.

But there aren't enough afterschool programs to serve all the families needing help. It is estimated that tens of thousands more Hawai'i children would participate in an afterschool program if one were available to them.¹

For some families, this means they must choose between shortening work hours (if they can) or leaving their child unsupervised. For middle and intermediate school students, programs like R.E.A.C.H provide structured activities during out of school time.

Additional REACH funding will not only expand the offerings currently provided but allow those programs to enhance their current programming to help accelerate students' academic, social and emotional learning.
