

HB974 HD1 RELATING TO AGRICULTURE Senate Committee on Ways and Means

The Office of Hawaiian Affairs (OHA) offers its <u>SUPPORT WITH AMENDMENTS</u> for HB974 HD1, which would establish and fund a full-time program specialist position within the Department of Agriculture to, among other things, to provide grant program administration and to perform needs assessments. **OHA takes care to note that Native** Hawaiian farmers and ranchers often face greater inequities and disparities as a result of historic injustice. OHA asks that the Legislature to amend this measure to require that the program specialist is tasked with developing a program that specifically addresses the needs of socially disadvantaged farmers and ranchers.

OHA offers the following language to enhance this measure on Page 2, lines 10-19, to read:

The purpose of this Act is to establish and fund a fulltime program specialist position within the department of
agriculture to seek and write grants; provide technical
assistance; provide grant program administration; perform needs
assessments; make recommendations to the chairperson of the
board of agriculture; and assist farmers, ranchers, and other
agricultural operators, with additional focus on socially
disadvantaged farmers and ranchers, in applying for and
obtaining grants offered by the United States Department of
Agriculture and other sources, and to assist them with
fulfilling and complying with the requirements of the grants.

The United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) defines socially disadvantaged farmers and ranchers (SDFR) "as those belonging to groups that have been subject to racial, ethnic, or gender prejudice." The USDA has affirmed that Native Hawaiians are recognized

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under the SDFR characterization² and a number of financial support instruments exist through the USDA for SDFRs.³ While this distinction and the needs of those within this designation exist at the federal level, the State of Hawai'i has yet to adopt the necessary policies and mechanisms to address inequities and disparities faced by socially disadvantaged farmers and ranchers, like Native Hawaiian mahi'ai. As the principal public agency in the State responsible for the performance, development, and coordination of programs and activities relating to Native Hawaiians, OHA asks this legislature to ensure that Native Hawaiian farmers and ranchers are provided equitable farm assistance opportunities, such as the grants proposed through this measure.

OHA appreciates this opportunity to offer its support with amendments on HB974 HD1 and asks that the Legislature level the field for socially disadvantaged farmers by amending this measure with OHA's recommendation. Mahalo nui loa.

HOUSE BILL 974 HD1 RELATING TO AGRICULTURE

Chairperson Dela Cruz and Members of the Committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to present testimony on House Bill 974, HD1. The purpose of this bill is to establish and fund a full-time program specialist position within the department of agriculture to seek and write grants, provide technical assistance, provide grant program administration, perform needs assessments, make recommendations to the chairperson of the board of agriculture and assist farmers, ranchers and other agricultural operators in applying for and obtaining grants offered by the United States Department of Agriculture and other sources, and to assist them with fulfilling and complying with the requirements of the grants. The Department supports this bill. There is an appropriation requested for the purposes of this measure.

The Department comments that testimony submitted by Ulupono for a similar measure, HB974 included the securing of more than \$15 million in federal funding through the efforts of three grant positions at three agriculture focused non-profits funded by Ulupono from 2020 – 2021 and most recently, in 2022, Ulupono funded a grant writer whose work enabled CTAHR to secure a \$40 million USDA Climate Smart

Commodities grant that provides direct funding to Hawaii's farmers and ranchers that practice climate smart agriculture.

The position within the Department will prioritize the federal formula grants (block grants) that are available to Hawaii via an allocation of funds that are awarded upon an approved application and not subject to competition.

It has been announced that through the efforts of the Hawaii Congressional delegation, the Infrastructure Improvement and Jobs Act allocated \$2.8 billion to Hawaii. These are the opportunities the position will pursue.

Ulupono Initiative strongly supports HB 974 HD1, Relating to Agriculture.

Dear Chair Dela Cruz and Members of the Committee:

My name is Micah Munekata, and I am the Director of Government Affairs at Ulupono Initiative. We are a Hawai'i-focused impact investment firm that strives to improve the quality of life throughout the islands by helping our communities become more resilient and self-sufficient through locally produced food, renewable energy and clean transportation choices, and better management of freshwater resources.

Ulupono <u>strongly supports</u> HB 974 HD1, which establishes and appropriates funds for a program specialist position within the Department of Agriculture (DOA) and prioritizes assistance for farmers and ranchers who produce local food that is at least partially consumed within the State.

Ulupono supports the State's efforts to actively pursue grant opportunities that help local agriculturalists. Many federal programs are dedicated to state departments or agencies who can apply for funding to support local initiatives. Establishing a position at the DOA for this work is extremely timely, not only to meet the needs of local farmers and ranchers, but also due to the funding that has been made available by the federal government.

Ulupono currently funds three grant and loan writer programs with The Kohala Center, the Oʻahu Agriculture and Conservation Association (OACA), and the Hawaiʻi Farm Bureau. From 2020 to 2021, these three grant and loan writer programs were able to secure more than \$15 million in federal funds via USDA agricultural programs. In 2022, Ulupono funded a grant writer to enable UH CTAHR's USDA Climate Smart Commodities grant application. UH CTAHR was awarded a massive \sim \$40 million USDA Climate Smart Commodities grant that will provide direct funding to Hawaiʻi farmers and ranchers that practice climate smart agriculture. Similarly, Ulupono believes a dedicated DOA grant writer will be well worth the investment, and result in millions of dollars in federal funding to further support the State's agricultural efforts.

We appreciate this committee's effort to hear important measures that look to establish long-term support for our local farmers and ranchers.

Aloha Chair Dela Cruz, Vice-Chair Keith-Agaran, and Members of the Committee:

I am Brian Miyamoto, Executive Director of the Hawai'i Farm Bureau (HFB). Organized since 1948, the HFB is comprised of 1,800 farm family members statewide and serves as Hawai'i's voice of agriculture to protect, advocate and advance the social, economic, and educational interests of our diverse agricultural community.

The Hawai'i Farm Bureau supports HB 974, HD1, which establishes a program specialist position within the Department of Agriculture and appropriates moneys to fund the position. HB 974, HD1 prioritizes assistance for farmers and ranchers who produce local food that is at least partially consumed within the State.

The decrease in direct Federal appropriations for agriculture has resulted in an increased level of dependence on grants. Many federal programs have turned into competitive grant programs.

Hawai'i's farmers and ranchers are finding it difficult to secure the financial support necessary to build capacity. Grant writing for USDA, State, County, and other grants usually involves a very complex application process that can be difficult to navigate through. This often deters farmers and ranchers from applying for USDA and other grants. A well-trained and skilled grant writer would be able to assist farmers and ranchers obtain USDA and other grants by assisting them with applying for and fulfilling the requirements of the grants.

Access to USDA and other grants can result in increased capacity, new business opportunities, increase employment opportunities and address Hawai'i's goals of increased self-sufficiency and sustainability.

Chair Dela Cruz, Vice Chair Keith-Agaran, and Members of the Committee,

The Hawaii Cattlemen's Council (HCC) is the Statewide umbrella organization comprised of the four county level Cattlemen's Associations. Our member ranchers represent over 60,000 head of beef cows; more than 75% of all the beef cows in the State. Ranchers are the stewards of over 750 thousand acres of land in Hawaii, or 20% of the State's total land mass. We represent the interests of Hawaii's cattle producers.

The Hawaii Cattlemen's Council <u>supports HB974 HD1</u> which establishes a program specialist position within the Department of Agriculture and appropriates moneys to fund the position and prioritizes assistance for farmers and ranchers who produce local food that is at least partially consumed within the State.

Funding a position within the Department of Agriculture to assist ranchers and farmers to secure funding is important to ensuring access to capital for operations to succeed. The Hawaii Cattlemen's Council supports all forms of agriculture and would like to point out that the opportunity to export goods helps many operations stay economically viable as a business. Every rancher in Hawaii contributes to local food whether it's through a grass-finished branded program or through cull cows and bulls that contribute to the local ground beef supply. Exporting goods is a smart way to diversify operations especially in times of drought. However, we support this measure which gives priority to those who produce local food.
