AlohaCare appreciates the opportunity to provide testimony in **support** of **HCR207**. This measure requests the Department of Health to convene a working group to continue the efforts of the early lung cancer screening task force.

Founded in 1994 by Hawai`i's community health centers, AlohaCare is a community-rooted, non-profit health plan serving over 80,000 Medicaid and dual-eligible health plan members on all islands. Approximately half of our membership are keiki. We are Hawai`i's only safety net health plan exclusively dedicated to serving Medicaid and Medicaid-Medicare dually-eligible beneficiaries. Our mission is to serve individuals and communities in the true spirit of aloha by ensuring and advocating for access to quality health care for all. We believe that health is about supporting whole-person health needs.

Lung cancer is the leading cause of cancer deaths in the United States, according to the American Cancer Society. Hawai'i is ranked 43<sup>rd</sup> in the United States for lung cancer screening with only 3% of high-risk patients receiving lung cancer screening.<sup>i</sup> Factors contributing to Hawai'i's low screening rate are likely limited access to care as well as a lack of patient and provider awareness.

As a state we need to identify ways to improve screening rates for those at the highest risk for lung cancer. Providing access to annual early screenings can make the difference between life or death. We respectfully ask that the legislature allow the important work of the Early Lung Cancer Screening Task Force to continue through the working group proposed in this measure.

Over the years, the organization has grown to four hospitals, and more than 10,000 affiliated physicians, caregivers, and dedicated medical staff statewide. As the preeminent health care system in Hawai'i, Queen's strives to provide superior patient care that is constantly advancing through education and research.

Queen's appreciates the opportunity to provide testimony **in support** of HCR207/HR211, which requests the Department of Health to convene an early lung cancer screening working group to continue efforts of The Early Lunch Cancer Screening Task Force established pursuant to Act 162, Session Laws of Hawai'i 2022.

The Queen's Health System was grateful to be included as a task force member in 2022 (Act 162) and would like to express our strong commitment to continue serving on the proposed working group. At the end of 2022, Queen's made a significant investment in state of the art technology that offers a minimally invasive procedure capable of diagnosing and removing lung cancer at earlier stages and smaller sizes. In November '22, we welcomed our first patient to the ION Robotic Navigational Bronchoscopy Program, a fully robotic, single anesthetic procedure that diagnoses, stages and treats lung cancer in one setting. For the second year in a row, the American Lung Association ranked Hawai'i last in the nation for early detection of lung cancer; with the help of this working group, it is our hope that more residents will begin early screening and receive expeditious treatment.
