Title of Bill: SB 1044, SD2, HD1 RELATING TO MENTAL HEALTH.

Purpose of Bill: Appropriates funds to hire complex-based behavioral health

specialists for Hawaii's rural public schools. Effective 6/30/3000.

Department's Position:

The Hawaii State Department of Education (Department) supports and appreciates SB 1044, SD2, HD1. The appropriation of funds to increase the school-based youth mental health workforce would strengthen the Department's efforts to meet the needs of students in Hawaii's rural areas experiencing trauma, grief, family separation, depression, and other crises.

The Department previously requested an appropriation of \$861,000 to fund twelve behavioral health specialist positions to serve six complexes. However, the Department inadvertently excluded the Nanakuli-Waianae Complex.

As such, the Department respectfully requests to amend the previous request and asks for an appropriation of \$974,918 per year that would fund two behavioral health specialist positions for each of the following seven complex areas:

Hilo-Waiakea Complex; Kau-Keaau-Pahoa Complex; Honokaa-Kealakehe-Kohala-Konawaena Complex; Kapaa-Kauai-Waimea Complex; Hana-Lahainaluna-Lanai-Molokai Complex; Nanakuli-Waianae Complex; and Baldwin-Kekaulike-Kulanihakoi-Maui Complex.

While the Department appreciates the funding in this measure, we ask that it does not replace priorities outlined in the Department's Board of Education approved budget.

SB1044 Relating to Mental Health

Aloha Chair Belatti and members of the committee,

The Hawai'i Association of School Psychologists (HASP) offers comments on SB1044:

HASP strongly supports the intent of the Department of Education to increase the number of mental health service providers in schools to address issues such as suicide, trauma, grief, family separation, depression, and other crises; however, the requested monies in this bill are most appropriately and effectively spent addressing the recruitment and retention of School Psychologists.

School Psychologists receive extensive training in crisis prevention and preparedness, response, and intervention and recovery. School Psychologists are uniquely trained to address mental health in schools, including suicide, trauma, grief, anxiety, family separation, depression, and other crises. In schools, School Psychologists are the educators who know the most about psychology, and the psychologists who know the most about education.

According to the DOE from previous testimony, there are currently over 300 Behavioral Health Specialists employed by the DOE, but only approximately 61 School Psychologists, who have more appropriate and specific training aligned to the intents of SB1044.

Using funds requested in this Legislation to increase the number of School Psychologists by addressing recruitment and retention challenges, will ensure the State's keiki have access to high quality school-based mental health services by individuals most qualified to do so in school settings.

We therefore recommend that lines 12-13 of page 2 be amended to read as follows:

2024-2025 to hire [complex-based behavioral health specialists] School Psychologists for the State's rural public schools.
