Thank you for the opportunity to testify on Senate Bill No. 1246 relating to the food supply. The Agribusiness Development Corporation (ADC) supports this measure, which requires ADC to plan, design, construct, and operate a new animal slaughterhouse on the island of Oahu.

There's a growing need for small animal slaughterhouses and farmers and ranchers cannot overcome the government regulations and a high development cost to build their own. A new slaughterhouse for hogs, sheep, and goats will provide fresh, clean locally sourced meat, which will allow Hawaii's farmers and

ranchers to pursue new market opportunities and better meet consumer and producer demand along the supply chain.

The bill does not specify the species of animal to be harvested and processed in the new facility we ask that it be amended to specify that the new facility is for the harvesting and processing of hogs and other small animals or non-beef harvesting and processing.

The Hawaii Cattlemen's Council (HCC) is the Statewide umbrella organization comprised of the four county-level Cattlemen's Associations. Our member ranchers represent over 60,000 head of beef cows; more than 75% of all the beef cows in the State. Ranchers are the stewards of over 750 thousand acres of land in Hawaii, or 20% of the State's total land mass. We represent the interests of Hawaii's cattle producers.

The Hawaii Cattlemen's Council **supports SB1246** which requires the Agribusiness Development Corporation to plan, design, construct, and operate a new animal slaughterhouse on the island of Oahu.

We understand that this facility will serve processing for small livestock. Increased access to harvest and processing facilities for livestock is a vital aspect of improving the supply chain and increasing local food production.

The bill states the Agribusiness Development Corporation will plan, design, construct, and operate the animal slaughterhouse. We respectfully suggest that this is amended so that the Agribusiness Development Corporation will plan, design, and construct the animal slaughterhouse, but that the private sector should be in charge of running the operation aspects of the facility.

I am Brian Miyamoto, Executive Director of the Hawai'i Farm Bureau (HFB). Organized since 1948, the HFB is comprised of 1,800 farm family members statewide and serves as Hawai'i's voice of agriculture to protect, advocate and advance the social, economic, and educational interests of our diverse agricultural community.

The Hawai'i Farm Bureau supports SB 1246, which requires the Agribusiness Development Corporation to plan, design, construct, and operate a new animal slaughterhouse on the island of Oahu.

Hawai'i's livestock industry faces numerous challenges. These challenges have been a contributing factor to the decline of the state's livestock industry. Many small family farmers who have found a ready market for their livestock directly to local consumers, restaurants, and stores have difficulty converting their live animals into a product that can take advantage of them. The challenge for many of these small producers is that they often do not have USDA-inspected processing facilities available within a practical distance and at an affordable cost.

Hawai'i's swine farms are small with limited land, limited resources, and limited economies of scale. The primary competition for local pork is inexpensive mainland pork. Slaughter costs at the Hawai'i Meat plant in Kapolei are high and the pork industry is concerned about future slaughter capacity on Oahu.

To support our pork industry, we need a dedicated slaughterhouse to serve Oahu's small-scale hog farmers.

Mahalo for this opportunity to provide comments regarding SB1246, "Relating to the Food Supply," on behalf of Farm Link Hawai'i. Farm Link's mission is to create a thriving, equitable local food system by empowering local farmers and improving access to good local food. We work with over 170 Hawai'i farmers, ranchers, and food makers, to serve more than 1,000 customers with over 500+ local products. We support local farms with the marketplace, delivery logistics, demand data, and long-term buying commitments to lower producer risk. In 2022 we purchased over \$1.3MM of locally grown, raised, and produced products, including more than \$120,000 in locally raised pork.

We agree with the bill's premise that there is a great need for improved access to slaughter and processing for livestock producers throughout Hawai'i, and that this need is particularly acute on O'ahu for small animal species including pigs, goats, and sheep. **We strongly support the intent of this bill to ensure a sustainable source of animal protein for Hawai'i consumers, and the proposal to appropriate state funds to facilitate the development of a small animal livestock processing facility on O'ahu.**

That said, we recommend that the bill be amended to address the following considerations:

1. **Governance** - the Agribusiness Development Corporation's failure to successfully execute its mandate to "facilitate the transition of agricultural infrastructure from plantation operations to other agricultural enterprises" (Act 264) has been well documented (see the separate [State Audit](#) and [UHERO](#) reports, dated January 2021). This track record does not instill confidence in the choice of the ADC to manage the planning, design, and construction of a new slaughter facility. To ensure the success of this critical infrastructure, we recommend that the bill be amended as follows:
 - a. Require the ADC to issue an RFP for a qualified entity to take on these responsibilities.
 - b. Establishment of an independently selected board of directors made up of community partners and stakeholders that directly use and benefit from the facility's services.
 - c. Inclusion of anti-monopoly language to protect public assets, along with the competitive integrity of the private market. Stipulations that seek to diversify the State's existing concentration of slaughter facility ownership and operation through training and education of new industry professionals in partnership with proven workforce development programs.



- d. Open book transparency and reporting.
2. **Operational funding** - the bill currently allocates funding for planning, designing, and constructing a new facility, but fails to include funding for operating the facility when it initially comes online. It is likely that facility throughput will be insufficient to sustain breakeven operations for several years, while ranchers and farmers increase production. This should be remedied with operational funding support for years 1-3 of operation, to be matched by federal, private, and/or philanthropic funding.

With these amendments, we would be delighted to wholeheartedly support SB1246 and its intent to plan, design, construct, and operate a new animal slaughterhouse on O'ahu.

Regarding: SB1246 “Relating to the Food Supply”

By way of introduction, our foundation, along with a growing number of Hawai‘i and mainland partners, has been investing in Hawai‘i’s growing social enterprise and purpose-driven enterprise economy since 2013. Our foundation also co-invested with Hawai‘i Investment Ready, in a research project to look at capital flows in Hawai‘i’s food systems. This research is being shared with funders, academics, investors and food system entrepreneurs, providing them with critical insights to drive a more leveraged system level approach to funding Hawai‘i’s food system.

More recently, our foundation has provided funding for a group of small animal processing stakeholders to develop a small animal processing facility pro forma as a way to answer the question of what it will take to build and support a financially viable facility on O‘ahu. It is with this insight that I offer the following testimony for SB1246.

Our foundation supports the intent of SB1246. However, for SB1246 to be successful, we strongly recommend the following considerations:

1. **The design, ownership and management of this facility should be placed in the hands of a nonprofit entity**, stewarded by an independently selected board of engaged food system and animal processing stakeholders, and with representation from the next generation of leaders in this industry.
2. **Anti-monopoly language should be considered** to ensure the protection of this investment as well as the competitive integrity of the Hawai‘i private market.
3. **Additional operational and training funding should be provided through a partnership of government, philanthropy and the private sector** to finance operations until it is self-supporting. As mentioned above, the pro forma that was developed articulates various lines of sight to cash flow break even, dependent on various assumptions around volume and capital infusions. These assumptions should be vetted by the independently appointed board mentioned in item 1.

Mahalo for this opportunity to provide comments regarding SB1246, “Relating to the Food Supply,” on behalf of Piko Provisions. Our mission is to create the best foods for the world by sourcing ingredients sustainably, processing them minimally and presenting them transparently. We work with over 300 stewards of Hawai‘i to connect families with locally grown and made, pure, first food options for their growing families in over 250 communities across Hawai‘i and have so far produced, sold, donated and distributed over 150,000 meals to families.

As an individual I have been involved with, dependent upon and fulfilled by food, farming, agriculture and feeding my community since birth. Being a 6th generation farmer, dairyman and having worked previously for years in Hawaii’s animal protein industry with a vertically integrated, regenerative cattle company I know first-hand not only the plight faced by farmers and ranchers but also the opportunity there is for us to come together to help feed each other and increase the health, wealth, and wellbeing of Hawai‘i as a whole.

We agree with the bill’s premise that there is a great need for improved access to slaughter and processing for livestock producers throughout Hawai‘i, and that this need is exacerbated on O‘ahu especially for small animal species including pigs, goats, sheep and any species other than beef. **We strongly support the intent of this bill to ensure a steward-owned, community-centric, sustainable source of Hawaii born, raised and processed animal protein for Hawai‘i consumers, and the proposal to appropriate state funds to facilitate the development of a small animal livestock processing facility on O‘ahu.**

That said, we recommend that the bill be amended to address the following considerations:

1. **Governance** - To ensure the success of this critical infrastructure, we recommend that the bill be amended as follows:
 - a. Require the ADC to issue an RFP for a qualified entity to take on these responsibilities with quarterly progress reviews and annual contract reviews.
 - b. Establishment of an independently selected board of directors made up of community partners and stakeholders that directly use and benefit from the facility’s services.
 - c. Inclusion of anti-monopoly language to protect public assets, along with the competitive integrity of the private market. Stipulations that seek to diversify the State’s existing concentration of slaughter facility ownership and operation through training and



education of new industry professionals in partnership with proven workforce development programs.

- d. Open book transparency and reporting.
 - e. An established governance model to protect against the dissolution of the established entity, purpose, and/or mission of this organization which places power in the hands of the community and those impacted most by access to services. A model such as a “Golden Share, LLC” or “Perpetual Trust”.
2. **Operational funding** - the bill currently allocates funding for planning, designing, and constructing a new facility, but fails to include funding for operating the facility when it initially comes online. It is likely that facility throughput will be insufficient to sustain breakeven operations for several years, while ranchers and farmers increase production. This should be remedied with operational funding support based on a sound financial pro forma created by tenured industry professionals, to be matched by federal, private, and/or philanthropic funding.

With these amendments, we wholeheartedly support SB1246 and its intent to plan, design, construct, and operate a new animal slaughterhouse on O‘ahu. To aid the independently elected board of directors a cohort of impact investors, farmers, industry professionals and legal and financial advisors have been working on such aforementioned governance and financial documents for the past year and a half and I would be happy to convene the cohort with interested parties to help bring this amended bill into actionable steps and eventually usable fruition.

My name is David Wong and I am the Manager of Mountain View Farms. I am testifying in favor of SB 1246.

In 2012 we started raising pigs using the Korean Natural Farming system. This system uses a microbial waste management process. As a result there is no waste odors, no waste lagoons that could overflow with severe rain storms, and has no waste composting requirements.

We started with nine baby pigs and now have over 1,000 pigs. There is a great potential for locally produced pork. Hawaii's consumers love locally produced pork. The limiting factor is a small animal slaughtering facility that is USDA Inspected and approved by a Third Party Auditor.

All locally produced animal protein must be slaughtered by this type of slaughtering facility to comply with Federal Food Safety Standards.

SB 1246 will enable this to be achieved.

Today you can make a huge difference in helping Hawaii to be more food secure and to increase agriculture in our state. Regarding: SB1246 “Relating to the Food Supply”

Mahalo for this opportunity to provide comments regarding SB1246, “Relating to the Food Supply,” With 20 years experience in slaughter, butchery, education, and supply chain both here and on the continent my mission is to create a thriving, equitable local food system by empowering and supporting local producers and improving access to good local food. I’ve worked with multiple slaughter operations, both brick-and-mortar and mobile, developed training programs, and have lectured and written extensively on the importance and how to build and support local agricultural infrastructure.

There is great need for improved access to slaughter and processing for livestock producers throughout Hawai‘i, and that this need is particularly acute on O‘ahu for small animal species including hogs, sheep, and goats. I strongly support the intent of this bill to ensure a sustainable source of animal protein for Hawai‘i consumers, and the proposal to appropriate state funds to facilitate the development of a small animal livestock slaughter/processing facility on O‘ahu, **but cannot support the bill as it is currently written**

With that said below are recommend amendments to the bill to address the following considerations:

1. **That the facility be designed, owned, and managed by a nonprofit benefit corporation.** This will ensure that the use of these public funds will provide a broad public benefit.

1. **A startup board of directors consisting of community partners and stakeholders across the value chain of animal husbandry** – including representation from funders in philanthropy and the private sector. Broad and next generation representation is key to addressing the operational and system level challenges as well as the long-term financial management and fundraising needs.

1. **A board and enterprise governance model that integrates modern governance best practices and demonstrates transparency and accountability to the taxpayers of Hawai'i.**

1. **Financial support for increasing animal volume and covering slaughter facility operational costs until that volume is met must be identified if this facility is to be successful.** A pro forma analysis of this facility prepared in partnership with stakeholders is showing that a financially viable facility is possible if volumes can be achieved, and operational support provided over the next 4 to 6 years.

1. There will need to be follow up funding and sources identified and dedicated for operating until break even and profitability as both bills identify that ADC will be charged with planning, designing, constructing, and operating this facility and funding is allocated for each line item except operating. Should an RFP for an outside operator be sought it is recommended to include stipulations that seek to diversify the currently concentrated collection of facility owners and operators through the training, educating, uplifting, and empowering of passionate new industry professionals in partnership with workforce development programs such as Hawaii Investment Ready and the council for native Hawaiian advancement.

Anti-monopoly language built in to protect public assets and interests and the competitive integrity of the private market —

To protect access for future generations the facility should be strictly designated to the slaughtering and processing of 100% locally raised animals from birth to harvest and provisions in the bylaws established to ensure the protection of community interest and food security over private profit
