# Testimony of DAWN N.S. CHANG Chairperson

### Before the Senate Committees on AGRICULTURE AND ENVIRONMENT and WATER AND LAND

### In consideration of SENATE BILL 1501 RELATING TO THE PROTECTION OF TARO

Senate Bill 1501 proposes to prohibit the Board of Land and Natural Resources (Board) from disturbing or acquiring for development certain wetland taro-growing lands. The Department of Land and Natural Resources (Department) offers the following comments and concerns, and proposed amendments on this measure.

The Department supports taro cultivation but is concerned with this measure which proposes to amend Section 206-7, Hawaii Revised Statutes, to prohibit the Board from disturbing "existing ancient tarogrowing systems, ancient wetland taro lands, or structural elements of ancient wetland taro-growing systems". Moreover, the measure proposes to prohibit the Board from acquiring for development "lands and infrastructure used or to be used for wetland taro-growing, including ancient wetland taro lands and structural elements of ancient wetland taro-growing systems". The Department believes that by broadly preventing the disturbance and development of such lands and features without any minimum threshold, it may restrict the use of public lands zoned urban or agriculture for other compelling public purposes, even when the condition of the land and infrastructure may be where it is no longer feasible to engage in taro cultivation.

As an alternative, the Department recommends this measure be amended to adopt language used in a similar measure, Senate Bill 1498, which requires such undeveloped lands and infrastructure be used for

wetland taro cultivation before statehood and currently in use for wetland taro cultivation. The Department recommends that lines 12 through 14 on page 2 of the measure be amended as follows:

The board shall not disturb existing ancient taro-growing systems, ancient wetland taro lands, or structural elements of ancient wetland taro-growing systems on undeveloped lands used for wetland taro cultivation before statehood and currently in use for wetland taro cultivation.

Furthermore, the Department requests that page 4, lines 1 through 4, be amended as follows:

Undeveloped lands and infrastructure used for wetland taro cultivation before statehood and currently in use for wetland taro cultivation, including ancient wetland taro lands and structural elements of ancient wetland taro-growing systems;
