
<u>PURPOSE</u>: This measure amends Hawaii law to protect an individual's right to privacy and bodily autonomy within the boundaries of the State, including minors, and to declare that the laws of other states authorizing civil actions and criminal prosecutions for receiving, seeking, providing, or aiding and abetting the provision of reproductive health care services are contrary to the State's public policy and to prohibit recognition and enforcement of other states' laws that impose civil or criminal liability relating to reproductive health care services.

DHS appreciates the Legislature's efforts to support greater access to all reproductive health services, including abortions, and authorizing physician assistants and advanced practice registered nurses to help increase such access. We support an individual's right to make health

care decisions, including all reproductive health care, in a supportive and stress-free environment.

However, the current developments in the national legal landscape threaten individuals' right to privacy at a time when health care decisions should be made in a stress-free environment. Aggressive legal actions also threaten healthcare providers and our staff who assist in accessing or providing services. This bill helps further clarify and provides some protections from the threat of litigation or harassment for the provision of legal health care services in our State.

The Hawai'i Civil Rights Commission (HCRC) has enforcement jurisdiction over Hawai'i's laws prohibiting discrimination in employment, housing, public accommodations, and access to state and state funded services (on the basis of disability). The HCRC carries out the Hawai'i constitutional mandate that no person shall be discriminated against in the exercise of their civil rights. Art. I, Sec. 5.

S.B. No. 1, in its original form has three purposes: 1) to amend HRS § 453-16 to allow licensed physician assistants and licensed advanced practice registered nurses to perform abortions; 2) to declare that laws of other states are contrary to State public policy and unenforceable in Hawai'i state courts, where those laws authorize a civil action against persons who terminate or seek to terminate a pregnancy, perform or induce the termination of a pregnancy, knowingly aid or abet the termination of a pregnancy, or attempt or intend to do so; and, 3) to prohibit State application, enforcement, or satisfaction of subpoenas, decisions, or requests of other states that arise out of such other state laws creating civil or criminal liability relating to termination of a pregnancy.

S.B. No. 1, S.D.1, was amended to insert a new Section 1 of the bill (taken from Section 1 of S.B. No. 896, S.D.1) to provide a robust purpose section for the bill, reaffirming that the policy of the State and the Hawai'i State Constitution guarantee the fundamental rights of equality, liberty, and privacy, which include the right to make reproductive health decisions and decide whether to bear a child or obtain an abortion. In order to affirm and bolster protection of these rights, it is the purpose of the bill to "to bolster the State's policy to protect an individual's right to privacy and bodily autonomy within the boundaries of the State, including minors, and clarify that the provision of certain services related to the human reproductive system cannot form a basis for disciplinary action against certain licensed professionals in certain circumstances,"

HCRC supports S.B. No. 1, S.D.2, specifically the insertion of the strong purpose clause in Section 1 of the bill, in S.D. 1 and the new HRS §____-7, on page 13 of the S.D.1, and the new §636C-___, on page 41 of the S.D.1, that declare laws of other states that create civil actions against persons for terminating a pregnancy, or for performing or inducing or aiding and abetting the termination of a pregnancy are contrary to State public policy, and prohibit recognition and enforcement of other states' laws that impose civil or criminal liability relating to termination of a pregnancy. S.B. No. 1, S.D.2 added additional language regarding laws from other jurisdictions authorizing civil action or criminal prosecution are against Hawai'i public policy.

HCRC support for this bill is rooted in the context of a frontal assault on constitutional and civil rights at the federal level and in many states. A U.S. Supreme Court conservative super-majority appears poised to eviscerate constitutional rights jurisprudence that we have taken for granted for a generation. In a parade of horribles, the Court has turned the clock back on abortion and reproductive rights and establishment of religion, while limiting state regulation of guns and open carry laws with expansive reading of 2nd amendment rights, giving notice that other hard-won rights are in its crosshairs. Constitutional protections that are in jeopardy include unenumerated privacy protections (right to contraception, striking down state law criminalization of same-sex relationships, and marriage equality). In this context, it is prudent for Hawai'i to renew its state commitment to hard-won rights that we have exercised for generations. Reviewing and shoring up our state statutory protections as a "backstop" against the onslaught on fundamental rights that has been unleashed is a necessary first step.

For nearly fifty years, the U.S. Supreme Court's decision in *Roe v. Wade* established a fundamental right for an individual to access abortion based on a constitutional right to privacy. However, in 2022, the Supreme Court overturned *Roe* in *Dobbs v. Jackson Woman's Health Organization*, paving the way for individual states to restrict and even eliminate individuals' right to these medical decisions for themselves and/or based on the advice of individuals' medical advisors.

An increasing number of states have enacted or proposed restrictions on an individual's right to reproductive freedoms through civil and criminal penalties imposed on individuals who knowingly aid or abet the performance or inducement of the termination of a pregnancy. The HCRC supports S.B. No. 1's declaration that these laws are contrary to the public policy of the State, shall not be enforceable in any state court, and shall not be the basis for the granting of legal or equitable relief in any state court.

Historically, the State of Hawai'i has had a strong commitment to the protection of civil rights, found in Art. I § 5 of the State Constitution which states that "[n]o person . . . shall be denied the enjoyment of the person's civil rights or be discriminated against in the exercise thereof because of race, religion, sex, or ancestry." This provision grants our citizens the fundamental right to be free from race, religion, sex or ancestry discrimination, and was first adopted by the Constitutional Convention of 1950 (ratified as Article I, §4), prior to Hawai'i becoming a state. Const. Conv. of 1950, v. 1. There is no counterpart civil rights clause in the United States Constitution.

Hawai'i has a proud civil rights history. We were the first state to ratify the Equal Rights Amendment, and we have an ERA in our State Constitution Bill of Rights. Article I, §3. And, we have an express right to privacy in our State Constitution as well. Article I, §6. We were the first state to recognize women's right to choose and, to our credit, the first to address the issue of same-sex marriage seriously. Each generation has a responsibility to protect and defend these state constitutional and civil rights.

An individual's right to make reproductive health decisions is a civil right. In 2019 the Legislature recognized this right and codified its protection, amending HRS § 378-2 to expressly add reproductive health decisions as a protected basis upon which employment discrimination is prohibited. HRS § 378-2(a)(1), 378-2(a)(9) [am L 2019, c 178 §2] ("Reproductive health decisions" include the use or attempted use of any legal drug, device, or medical service intended

to prevent or terminate a pregnancy, or the use or attempted use of any assisted reproductive technology. HRS § 378-1). Reproductive health decisions are deeply personal choices, and individuals in our state should not fear State complicity in criminal prosecution or civil liability under the state laws of other jurisdictions for exercising this right.

The HCRC supports S.B. No. 1, S.D.2.

My name is Ahlani Quiogue, and I am the Executive Officer of the Hawaii Medical Board (Board). The Board appreciates the intent and offers comments on this bill.

The purposes of this bill are to: (1) allow licensed physician assistants to perform abortions; (2) repeal the requirement that abortions be performed at certain locations; (3) clarify that the State shall not deny or interfere with a pregnant person's right to choose to (a) obtain an abortion or (b) if necessary to protect the life or health of the patient to terminate the pregnancy; (4) define "abortion" and "nonviable fetus"; (5) prohibit a covered entity from disclosing information relating to reproductive health care services; (6) prohibit the issuance of a subpoena in connection with an out-of-state or interstate proceeding relating to reproductive health care services legally performed in the State; (7) prohibit agencies from providing information or expending resources in the furtherance of out-of-state or interstate investigations or proceedings relating to reproductive health care services; (8) prohibit the State from taking adverse action based on pregnancy outcomes or for aiding or assisting a pregnant individual with accessing reproductive health care services; (9) require the Governor to deny any demand for surrender of a person charged with a crime involving reproductive health care services unless the conduct constitutes a crime in the State or is made under Article IV, section 2, of the U.S. Constitution; (10) enumerate laws contrary to public policy and prohibits their application; (11) prohibit the issuance of a summons for persons to testify in another state with regard to lawful reproductive health care services; (12) clarify under various licensing statutes that the provision or assistance in

receipt or provision of certain services related to the human reproductive system cannot form a basis for disciplinary action; (13) prohibit the enforcement of a judgment or order arising from a foreign penal civil action or other penal law with respect to reproductive health care services; and (14) amend the definition of "medical care and services" so that a minor may consent to receive abortion care without any other person's consent.

The Board appreciates the bill's intent to authorize PAs to perform certain abortions to provide greater access to health care for all Hawaii residents, especially those who reside in rural areas or on the neighbor islands. The S.D. 2 also explicitly provides that physician assistants may provide abortion care.

The Board respectfully requests that, physician assistants be limited to provide abortion care only in a hospital licensed by the Department of Health or the federal government, to ensure that appropriate teams are in place to assist if necessary. For the Committee's information, Hawaii Administrative Rules section 16-85-44.5, provides, among other things, that "[s]upervision shall be continuous but shall not be construed as necessarily requiring the physical presence of the supervising physician at the time and place services are rendered." Based on this definition, the Board believes that for purposes of ensuring consumer safety since the supervising physician may not be physically present, that abortion care provided by physician assistants occur in a hospital licensed by Department of Health or the federal government, or at a minimum, clinics or ambulatory surgery centers.

My name is Chelsea Fukunaga, and I am the Executive Officer for the Board of Nursing (Board). The Board supports sections 10 and 11 and takes no position on other sections of this measure.

The purposes of this bill are to: (1) allow licensed physician assistants to perform certain abortions; (2) repeal the requirement that abortions be performed at certain locations; (3) clarify that the State shall not deny or interfere with a pregnant person's right to choose to: 1) obtain an abortion or; 2) if necessary to protect the life or health of the patient terminate the pregnancy; (4) defines "abortion" and "nonviable fetus"; (5) prohibits a covered entity from disclosing information relating to reproductive health care services; (6) prohibits the issuance of a subpoena in connection with an out-of-state or interstate proceeding relating to reproductive health care services legally performed in the State; (7) prohibits agencies from providing information or expending resources in the furtherance or out-of-state or interstate investigations or proceedings relating to reproductive health care services; (8) prohibits the State from taking adverse action based on pregnancy outcomes or for aiding or assisting a pregnant individual with accessing reproductive health care services (9) requires the Governor to deny any demand for surrender of a person charged with a crime involving reproductive health care services unless the conduct constitutes a crime in the State or is made under Article IV, section 2, of the U.S. Constitution; (10) enumerates laws contrary to public policy and prohibits their application; (11) prohibits the issuance of a summons for persons to testify in another state with regard to lawful reproductive health care

services; (12) clarifies under various licensing statutes that the provision or assistance in receipt or provision of certain services related to the human reproductive system cannot form a basis for disciplinary action; (13) prohibits the enforcement of a judgment or order arising from a foreign penal civil action or other penal law with respect to reproductive health care services; and (14) amends the definitions of "medical care and services" so that a minor may consent to receive, without any other person's consent, surgery or any treatment to induce abortion.

The amendments to Hawaii Revised Statutes chapter 457 under sections 10 and 11 of the bill will provide exceptions for disciplinary action against a licensed practical nurse (LPN), registered nurse (RN) or advanced practice registered nurse (APRN) who is disciplined by another state or convicted where the disciplinary action or conviction is based on the provision or assistance in receipt or provision of medical, surgical, pharmaceutical, counseling, or referral services relating to the human reproductive system, including but not limited to services relating to pregnancy, contraception, or the termination of a pregnancy so long as the provision or assistance in receipt or provision of such services was in accordance with the laws of this State or would have been in accordance with the laws of this State if it occurred within this State.

This will allow protection of an individual's right to privacy and personal autonomy over their body within State boundaries, by allowing LPNs, RNs, and APRNs to continue to provide or assist in the receipt or provision of medical, surgical, pharmaceutical, counseling, or referral services relating to the human reproductive system, without adverse repercussions.

Relating to Health Care

Thank you for the opportunity to submit testimony on this bill, which among other things would prohibit a covered entity from disclosing information about the provision of reproductive health care services and prohibit government agencies and employees from providing information or assistance in furtherance of a proceeding seeking to impose liability for reproductive health care services. The Office of Information Practices (OIP) takes no position on the bill as a whole, but requests an amendment to address its concern that the section specifically relating to disclosure of information by government agencies and employees is so broad as to set up a conflict with the open record requirements of chapter 92F, HRS, the Uniform Information Practices Act (UIPA).

Proposed section __-4, starting on bill page 12, prohibits government agencies as defined in the UIPA and their employees from providing any information "in furtherance of any out-of-state or interstate investigation or proceeding seeking to impose civil or criminal liability" for the provision, use of, or

assistance related to reproductive health care services. Since the definition of "agency" is explicitly based on that used in the UIPA, this provision is clearly intended to apply to UIPA requests. The problem is that the bill's prohibition on disclosing information applies not just to patient health information or similarly confidential information but to information in general, and it is not limited to a situation in which the agency or employee furnishing information actually knows that the record request was made in connection with an investigation or proceeding seeking to impose liability.

The UIPA allows anonymous requests, and except where an individual is requesting his or her personal records that would not be disclosed to the general public, an agency cannot require record requesters to identify themselves or explain the purpose of a record request. And since the proposed prohibition on providing information would apply not just to requests coming from another state government but also to requests from private individuals seeking to impose civil liability under a bounty law, there is no reason to think that record requests made in furtherance of such a proceeding will necessarily be identifiable as such.

Thus, government agencies and employees will risk violating the bill's prohibition when they disclose public records as required under the UIPA because they will have no way of knowing whether a request is connected to an investigation or proceeding seeking to impose liability for the use, provision of, or assistance related to reproductive health care services. And that can be expected to chill the general public's access to government records by encouraging agencies to deny requests, with the new prohibition as their justification, for fear that the requested records – no matter how seemingly

innocuous – could conceivably further in some way a proceeding seeking to impose liability related to reproductive health services.

For instance, a request for an agency's staffing schedule, or a particular worker's leave requests — public information under the UIPA — potentially could be used to further a prohibited proceeding by showing whether an employee was working her usual schedule at the time the proceeding claims she received or assisted someone in receiving reproductive health services, and agencies might start to deny such requests for fear of violating this new law. Even when the agency doesn't see an obvious way the requested records would be used in a proceeding, the agency could still fear the information would be used in a way it didn't predict but that violated the ban, and based on that fear start denying record requests that should have been granted. In such a case, an agency would have a valid argument that because disclosure of the records could violate this new law, the agency was authorized to withhold otherwise public records under the UIPA's exception to disclosure for records made confidential by law.

To avoid creating a conflict of laws that could chill the general public's ability to obtain open records under the UIPA, **OIP recommends this Committee amend this measure** to limit the prohibition to situations where an agency **discloses information** <u>that is not public</u> <u>under the UIPA</u> in furtherance of an investigation or proceeding seeking to impose liability as described in this bill.

Specifically, OIP recommends that proposed subsection __-4(a) on page 12 line 10 to page 13 line 4 be amended to read as follows (added language is bolded):

"(a) No agency, as defined in section 92F-3, or employee, appointee, officer, official, or any other person acting on behalf of an agency shall provide any **nonpublic** information or expend or use time, money,

facilities, property, equipment, personnel, or other resources in furtherance of any out-of-state or interstate investigation or proceeding seeking to impose civil or criminal liability upon a person or entity for:

- (1) The provision, seeking, paying for, receipt of, or inquiring about reproductive health care services that are legal in the State; or
- (2) Assisting any person or entity providing, seeking, receiving, paying for, or responding to an inquiry about reproductive health care services that are legal in the State."

With this amendment, an agency could no longer argue that the new law required it to withhold staff schedules, leave records, or other public information that could somehow be used in furtherance of a proceeding seeking to impose liability for reproductive health care, because it would be clear that the new law does not bar an agency from disclosing public records.

Aloha Chair Belatti, Vice Chair Takenochi, Chair Tarnas, Vice Chair Takayama and Committee Members.

I am testifying in support of SB 1 SD 2 to allow licensed physician assistants to the authority to perform certain abortions so long as those laws are not in conflict with and/or are more stringent than State laws. Our communities suffer when State elected officials supersede the rights of County leaders in regards to the health and well-being of our local constituents. The Counties are more able address the needs of our communities in a timely manner. Hawai'i County, in particular, has a good history of helping to pass public health policies in support of reproductive care such as passing ACT 35.

ACT 35 established that the State shall not deny or interfere with a pregnant person's right to chose or obtain an abortion of a nonviable fetus or an abortion to protect a pregnant person's life or health. WRITTEN TESTIMONY IN SUPPORT on S.B. 1, S.D. 2

Chairs Belatti and Tarnas, Vice Chairs Takenouchi and Takayama, and Members of the House Committees on Health & Homelessness and Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs, thank you for the opportunity to testify in **support S.B. 1**, **S.D. 2**, **Section 3**, **Part II**, **Part III sections 6**, **10**, **and 11**, **and Part IV as it relates to nursing practice and patient safety.**

In 2021, the Legislature, in its great wisdom, established that Advance Practice Registered Nurses (APRNs) can improve access to care for people in Hawai'i by authorizing them, via Act 3, SLH 2021, to provide medication and aspiration abortion care. At the time, the House noted "Your Committee finds that residents in rural and medically underserved areas of the State, including on Kauai, Molokai, Lanai, and the west side of the island of Hawaii, may not have access to health care providers who can provide abortion care. . . This measure ensures that people in Hawaii can access abortion care with fewer financial and logistical barriers and stay in their respective communities to get care from trusted providers." (Standing Committee Report Number 910, Re: H.B. 578, H.D.3). The Senate concurred, noting "Many women, particularly those on the neighbor islands and in rural parts of the State, do not have access to physicians who are authorized to perform abortions. Thus, these women are forced to fly to another island in addition to taking time off work, arranging childcare, and booking lodging to see a physician and receive safe and adequate care. Your Committees find that APRNs can safely provide abortion care and can do so outside of hospitals. This measure allows APRNs to perform medication or aspiration abortions." (Standing Committee Report Number 1178, Re: H.B. 578, H.D.3).

This measure codifies statutes to be consistent with the current, evidence-based practice standards. In addition, this measure aims to protect patients' access to care that is established in law in Hawai'i, as well as protect the qualified healthcare providers who offer these healthcare services.

The Hawai'i State Center for Nursing respectfully asks the Committee to pass **S.B. 1, S.D. 2** through your committee. The Center thanks your committee for its commitment to the people of Hawai'i, and ensuring access to high-quality health care by protecting safe and evidence-based healthcare provided by local healthcare providers including APRNs.

Thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony in support of this bill.

We often cite that Hawai`i was the first state to decriminalize abortion, but last year the US Supreme Court, in Dobbs vs. Jackson Women's Health, struck down the 5-decade-old national protection of women's rights to privacy and abortion. While we are proud that women's rights in Hawai`i are protected by Hawai'i's Constitution and laws, many note that we have not been very conscientious in keeping our laws updated.

Patients and medical providers in the United States, who for 50 years relied on federal law for protection, must now look to their state laws for protections won under Roe v. Wade. In some states, patients and healthcare workers are facing restrictive or prohibitive laws which make abortion and other reproductive health care impossible to access.

In Hawai'i, as we must look to our laws for protection, we recognize that Hawai'i's laws are in serious need of modernizing. Hawai'i's health care workers and patients need protections from punitive laws of other states; interpreted privacy protections, regardless of age, need codification; and adding physician's assistants to the list of trained medical providers who can provide non-surgical abortion will improve access to services on neighbor islands.

Passage of SB1 SD2 will bring Hawai`i's protections back to where we were prior to the Dobbs decision. Please pass it at your earliest opportunity.

The Hawai'i State Coalition Against Domestic Violence (HSCADV) addresses the social, political, and economic impacts of domestic violence on individuals, families, and communities. We are a statewide partnership of 28 domestic violence programs and shelters.

We respectfully submit testimony **supporting SB1 SD2** because protecting access to abortions also protects a method by which survivors of domestic violence can escape or cut ties from an abusive partner or regain confidence in their autonomy.

Reproductive health can and has been used as a tactic to control or hold power over an intimate partner in a situation involving domestic violence. Pregnancy has been associated with both an increased initiation of Intimate Partner Violence (IPV), as well as the increased severity of IPV. In contrast, pregnant people who were experiencing IPV reported a reduction in abuse following an abortion.

This legislation will protect abortion access by:



- Clarifying that all pregnant people in the state have the right to access abortion care, including transgender and gender nonbinary people
- Allowing physician assistants to provide safe and effective abortion care
- Protecting access to telehealth abortion services
- Reinforcing young people's ability to access abortion care

Providers need to be confident that they can continue to focus on patient health and that Hawai'i will always be a safe place to do what is best for the patient. This bill will also protect abortion providers by:

- Prohibiting medical licensure boards from taking adverse action against providers who
 provide care that is legal in the state of Hawai'i
- Eliminating archaic provisions that threaten criminal prosecution against providers for providing safe and basic abortion care
- Limiting cooperation with other states' investigations and proceedings about the provision of abortion

The State Legislature's intent to thoughtfully respond to the many implications of the Dobbs vs. Jackson Women's Health Organization decision poses to our communities reflects a meaningful connection with constituents across the state who have historically supported this human right since 1970. Further, Papa Ola Lokahi supports efforts to create an environment where our communities can self-determine their destinies without fear of harm or retaliation, which this bill seeks to uphold.

It remains legal in Hawaii to access abortion services, and we must ensure that our communities and our health care providers are protected in accessing and providing reproductive health services. The Dobbs vs. Jackson decision opens our health care workforce up to attacks from conservative states that have decided to restrict abortion access for their residents and have threatened to enact laws that reach across state lines to penalize health care providers in other states who provide abortion-related care to their residents. Given our existing health care provider shortage, having any providers open to attacks from other states puts our communities at risk of losing more providers. In addition, with our health care workforce already caring for non-resident college students, tourists, and military members, abortion providers are at an increased risk of being targeted for doing their jobs. Further, abortion services encompass many health care providers, including nurses, imaging staff, urgent care providers, family medicine physicians, and pharmacists, who will also be at risk if we do not take action to ensure their safety.

For these reasons, we ask that you pass this measure to protect the privacy of individuals, people's right to make their own health care decisions, to protect abortion access, and our abortion providers. Not passing this measure will have severe consequences for our communities and further restrict access to health care services across the state.

Hawai'i Academy of Physician Assistants (HAPA) STRONGLY SUPPORTS SB1 SD2

Thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony on SB1 SD2, which allows licensed physician assistants (PAs) to perform certain abortions. Repeals the requirement that abortions be performed at certain locations. Clarifies that the State shall not deny or interfere with a pregnant person's right to choose to (1) obtain an abortion or (2) if necessary to protect the life or health of the patient terminate the pregnancy. Defines "abortion" and "nonviable fetus". Prohibits a covered entity from disclosing information relating to reproductive health care services. Prohibits the issuance of a subpoena in connection with an out-of-state or interstate proceeding relating to reproductive health care services legally performed in the State. Prohibits agencies from providing information or expending resources in the furtherance of out-of-state or interstate investigations or proceedings relating to reproductive health care services. Prohibits the State from taking adverse action based on pregnancy outcomes or for aiding or assisting a pregnant individual with accessing reproductive health care services. Requires the Governor to deny any demand for surrender of a person charged with a crime involving reproductive health care services unless the conduct constitutes a crime in the State or is made under Article IV, section 2, of the U.S. Constitution. Enumerates laws contrary to public policy and prohibits their



application. Prohibits the issuance of a summons for persons to testify in another state with regard to lawful reproductive health care services. Clarifies under various licensing statutes that the provision or assistance in receipt or provision of certain services related to the human reproductive system cannot form a basis for disciplinary action. Prohibits the enforcement of a judgment or order arising from a foreign penal civil action or other penal law with respect to reproductive health care services. Amends the definition of "medical care and services" so that a minor may consent to receive abortion care without any other person's consent.

HAPA is the Hawai'i state chapter of The American Academy of Physician Assistants (AAPA).

HAPA supports SB1 SD2 because it allows licensed PAs to perform certain abortions, which will ensure greater access to abortion health care for all Hawai'i residents, especially those who reside in rural areas, or on the neighbor islands.

PAs are state-licensed, nationally certified medical practitioners, who receive rigorous medical training modeled on medical school curriculum. PA training programs typically require thousands of hours of prior clinical care experience before matriculation is even considered. PAs are highly skilled clinicians who diagnose illness, develop and manage treatment plans, prescribe medications, and perform medical interventions and procedures, as delegated by their collaborating physician or physician group. PAs are found in every clinical setting and in every medical specialty. PAs are authorized by the Affordable Care Act, along with physicians and APRNs, to serve as primary care provider (PCP) for their patients.

As with other medical interventions and procedures, it is within PA scope of practice to provide abortion care, including medical and aspiration abortions, if delegated by their collaborating physician, or group of physicians.

Numerous studies have found no difference in abortion safety when performed by qualified licensed providers such as PAs, rather than a physician. A multiyear study conducted by the University of California San Francisco's Bixby Center for Global Reproductive Health evaluated nurse practitioners, certified nurse midwives, and PAs providing early clinic-based abortion care. Over the five-year study, almost 8,000 patients received care from a qualified licensed provider, such as a PA, including at health centers and clinics. The study found comparable rates of safety, effectiveness, and acceptability when compared to care from a physician. In another study evaluating



patient experience after accessing abortion care, patients demonstrated a high level of satisfaction overall when they received their abortion care from a nurse practitioner, a certified nurse midwife, or a PA. There is no scientific evidence that PAs experience more complications when performing first-trimester aspiration abortions than their physician counterparts.

Many health care and professional organizations have confirmed that qualified licensed medical providers, such as PAs, can safely and effectively provide abortion care, including the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists (ACOG), the American Public Health Association, the World Health Organization, the American Academy of Physician Assistants, and the National Abortion Federation, among others. Additionally, in a 2018 review, the National Academies of Sciences, Engineering, and Medicine concluded that licensed medical providers, including PAs, are equally capable of providing safe and effective abortion care as physicians. It's evident that restricting PAs from providing abortion care confers no medical benefit and instead harms patients by limiting access to care.

In summary, Hawai`i Academy of Physician Assistants (HAPA) STRONGLY SUPPORTS SB1 SD2.

SB 1, SD2, RELATING TO HEALTH CARE

POSITION: Strong support.

BILL DESCRIPTION: PART I - Allows licensed physician assistants to perform abortions. Repeals the requirement that abortions, including aspiration abortions performed by advance practice registered nurses, be performed at certain locations. Clarifies that a patient has the right to choose to obtain an abortion, or to terminate a pregnancy if the termination is necessary to protect the life or health of the patient, and the State shall not deny or interfere with the se rights. Defines "abortion" and "nonviable fetus". Part II - Prohibits a covered entity from disclosing communication or information relating to reproductive health care services. Prohibits the issuance of a subpoena in connection with an out-of-state proceeding relating to reproductive health care services legally performed in the State. Prohibits agencies from providing information or expending resources in the furtherance of interstate investigations or proceedings relating to reproductive health care services. Prohibits the State from penalizing, prosecuting, or otherwise taking adverse action based on pregnancy outcomes or aiding or assisting a pregnant individual with accessing reproductive health care services. Requires the Governor to deny any demand for surrender of a person charged with a crime involving reproductive health care services unless the conduct constitutes a crime in the State. Enumerates laws contrary to public policy and prohibits their application as rules of decision in the courts. Prohibits the issuance of a summons for persons to testify in another state with regard to lawful reproductive health care services. Part III - Clarifies under various licensing statutes that the provision or assistance in receipt or provision of medical, surgical, pharmaceutical, counseling, or referral services related to the human reproductive system cannot form a basis for disciplinary action. Part IV - Prohibits the enforcement of a judgment or order...(See document for complete description)

RATIONALE: Imua Alliance <u>strongly supports</u> SB 1, SD2, relating to health care. Reproductive care is an essential form of healthcare. In March of 1970, Hawai'i became the first state to legalize abortion, three years before the landmark *Roe v. Wade* decision by the United States Supreme Court protected access to abortion nationwide. In so doing, the state recognized that preserving access to safe and legal reproductive care is a vital public health objective for the islands. Yet, Hawai'i's unique geography and high cost of living present barriers to obtaining reproductive care for potential patients. As of 2022, only three abortion providers exist in the islands and only Oahu and Maui host reproductive care clinics. According to Planned Parenthood, the number of abortion providers in the state has been on the decline since the 1990s.

Moreover, studies show that access to abortion care is linked to financial well-being. According to The Turnaway Study conducted by Advancing New Standards in Reproductive Health at the University of California San Francisco, people who were denied access to an abortion experienced an increase in household poverty lasting at least four years relative to those who received an abortion. Women who lacked access to reproductive care were also found to be less able to pay for basic living expenses, had lower credit scores, and had higher rates of debt and eviction than those with access to abortion care.

The U.S. Supreme Court's disastrous ruling in *Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization* overturned *Roe v. Wade* and ended the federal constitutional right to abortion care. In overturning *Roe v. Wade*, the U.S. Supreme Court erased nearly fifty years of legal precedent supporting the fundamental right to reproductive freedom, leading to a wave of abortion restrictions enacted by state legislatures across the country. The Court's decision disproportionately harms black, latino, indigenous, and other people of color, for whom access to healthcare and economic opportunities has historically been impeded by systemic racism.

In response to the Supreme Court's catastrophic ruling in *Dobbs v. Jackson Women's*Health Organization, state policymakers must take action to uphold Hawai'i's legacy as a leader in advancing reproductive care and enact policies to strengthen reproductive rights in the islands. Accordingly, and for the sake of the sex trafficking survivors whom we have helped to obtain vital reproductive care, we support this bill's enactment of a comprehensive legal framework to reinforce and expand our state's continuum of reproductive care for those in need.

The American Civil Liberties Union of Hawai'i ("ACLU of Hawai'i) writes in strong support **S.B. 1 S.D. 2**, which maintains and reinforces the constitutional right to an abortion within the State of Hawai'i.

Our state has a long track record of protecting reproductive freedom as a fundamental right guaranteed under article 1, sections 3, 5, and 6 of the Hawai'i State Constitution. We celebrate this adherence to an expansive view of the right to equality, liberty, and privacy, and this bill, when enacted by this body and signed by the Governor, is a welcome addition that will further enshrine these rights for the benefit of all people within our state.

This legislation is needed because the right to, and essential protections for, bodily autonomy are in peril throughout much of the United States at this time. In the wake of the disastrous U.S. Supreme Court ruling in *Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization*, individuals in many states are now subject to unconscionable civil actions and criminal prosecutions related to the provision of, and access to, reproductive healthcare.

This legislation will go a long way in continuing to protect access to reproductive health care in Hawai'i. It does so by 1) clarifying that all pregnant people in Hawai'i have an affirmative, protected right to seek reproductive health care; 2) allows licensed physician assistants to provide abortion health care; 3) protects access to telehealth reproductive health care, which is critically important to those living in remote communities, especially on some of the neighbor islands; and 4) reinforces the ability of young people to access reproductive health care. The legislation also provides important protections shielding people's reproductive health

care decisions and the provision of abortion care in Hawai'i from intrusive efforts by anti-choice activists and officials to interfere with such basic, essential health care. Decisions made in Hawai'i by people exercising their right to personal bodily autonomy are protected by the constitution and laws of the State of Hawai'i, not subject to the whim of the Attorney General of the State of Texas.

At the national level, the ACLU is committed to fighting for the right to abortion access. The example set by the Hawai'i State Legislature with the passage of SB1, SD2 is one that other states should follow, as it preserves a path forward in this fight - a path that provides hope, safety, and dignity not just for those who live in Hawai'i, but also those who come to the state in search of reproductive healthcare that they might be barred from accessing in their home state or across the Pacific region.

This measure will (1) Allows licensed physician assistants to perform abortions; (2) Prohibits the State from penalizing, prosecuting, or otherwise taking adverse action based on pregnancy outcomes or aiding or assisting a pregnant individual with accessing reproductive health care services; (3) Clarifies under various licensing statutes that the provision or assistance in receipt or provision of medical, surgical, pharmaceutical, counseling, or referral services related to the human reproductive system cannot form a basis for disciplinary action; (4) Prohibits the enforcement of a judgment or order arising from a foreign penal civil action or other penal law with respect to reproductive health care services;(5) Amends the definition of "medical care and services" that a minor may consent to receive without any other person's consent to include surgery and any treatment to induce abortion.

HMA appreciates the recent amendments to SB 1, with the insertion of language from SB 896 SD1 relating to the provision of reproductive healthcare services. HMA strongly supports this measure that reiterates state policy, protecting physicians who meet their ethical duties to patient's health and well-being while following clinical guidelines and complying with state regulations.

Position: STRONG SUPPORT

The Hawai'i Section of the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists (HI ACOG) **strongly supports SB 1_SD2** which aims protect access to abortion in Hawai'i by protecting Hawaii's healthcare providers from legal actions imposed by states with restrictive abortion laws, and strengthens our existing but outdated statutes regarding reproductive healthcare.

- 1. Hawai'i has a long history of recognizing the importance of access to abortion care, and protecting this access is widely supported. Hawai'i has a proud history of leading the country in protecting reproductive rights, being one of the first states to legalize abortion. Access to abortion has always been widely supported in Hawai'i,¹ with the most recent statewide survey conducted by Ward Research in February 2023 showing that 84% of Hawai'i residents believing it is important for lawmakers to ensure that current reproductive rights, including the right to abortion are protected. SB 1 would codify Governor David Ige's Executive Order 22-05, which he issued in October 2022² after a joint letter by fourteen organizations representing physicians, nurses and other allied healthcare organizations was sent urging his administration to protect healthcare professionals from out-of-state investigations seeking to impose civil or criminal liability related to the provision of abortion care that is legal in Hawai'i.
- 2. Protecting access to abortion care means protecting our healthcare workforce from out of state attacks that are being threatened across the country. While Hawai'i has been a long-time leader in reproductive health care rights, the landscape in the rest of the country is rapidly changing. Since the *Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health* decision by the United States Supreme Court in June 2022 that overturned almost fifty years of a constitutional right to abortion and bodily autonomy, several states including Idaho, Oklahoma, and Texas³ have enacted abortion restrictions that are enforced through private,

civil lawsuits. In addition, lawmakers in conservative states have threatened to pass laws that would reach across state lines and seek to penalize healthcare providers in other states who provided abortion-related care to their residents.⁴ All of these laws aim to restrict the residents of those states from not only accessing basic healthcare in their own state, but from also traveling out-of-state for abortion care.

- 3. Abortion related health care is not just provision of abortion, and any healthcare provider caring for a patient who ultimately obtains an abortion can be targetted. Each person's story is unique. Each person may take a different route on their journey to get abortion care, and the healthcare they access during that process can involve more than just their abortion provider. The urgent care physician who notifies them that they are pregnant when they were feeling ill, the radiologist who does their ultrasound, as well as the healthcare provider who performs the abortion, are all vulnerable to out-of-state threats. Especially given that the pool of abortion providers in the state is small, a threat to our healthcare providers is also a threat to abortion access for all of us in Hawai'i.
- 4. Hawai'i healthcare professionals already provide care to many patients from other states. Caring for patients from other states is nothing new as we have college student from other states, tourists, and military personnel, and we have always taken care of all patients in front of us no matter where they are from. Healthcare providers should not have to worry about litigation for providing compassionate care that is legal in Hawai'i.
- 5. Seven other states have enacted similar laws protecting health care providers.5
- 6. Our current statutes around reproductive healthcare are outdated and do not reflect current evidence-based practice. Our current statutes include specifying a location for performing an abortion which does not account for the current practice in which over half of all abortions now are done via medications which can be taken by a pregnant person anywhere, and many medication abortions are done safely via telemedicine. Our current statutes are not gender inclusive, and many of us have taken care of pregnant transgender men and pregnant nonbinary people.
- 7. **Physician assistants can safely perform abortion procedures**. PAs can perform abortions in 13 other states.⁶ A pilot program in California demonstrated that patients who have procedural abortions performed by PAs and other advance practice clinicians experience the same extremely low rate of complications as patients who have procedural abortions performed by physicians.⁷ Allowing PAs to perform abortions would help alleviate the access to abortion issues we experience in Hawai'i.

For these reasons, Hawai'i ACOG asks the legislature to be proactive and protect abortion access in Hawai'i by protecting our healthcare providers and strengthening our current statutes. **We urge you to pass SB 1.**

Thank you for the opportunity to submit testimony in STRONG SUPPORT of SB 1 SD 2.

Senate Bill 1 HD 2, which aims to protect abortion care in Hawai'i by protecting Hawai'i's healthcare providers from legal actions imposed by conservative states, resonates strongly with the Hawai'i Maternal and Infant Health Collaborative. We urge you to pass this bill to protect the health and privacy of our communities and healthcare workforce across the state.

Hawai'i has been a champion of abortion care access since 1970, legalizing this essential health care service before the passing of Roe v. Wade in 1973. Protecting access to abortion care is widely supported across the state, with <u>84% of residents</u> believing that lawmakers must ensure that current reproductive rights, including the right to abortion, are protected. This bill would codify Governor David Ige's <u>Executive Order 22-05</u>, which he issued in October 2022 after a joint letter by fourteen organizations representing physicians, nurses, and other allied healthcare organizations was sent urging his administration to protect healthcare professionals from restrictive states who have threatened to enact laws that would reach across state lines to penalize healthcare providers that provide abortion services to their residents. Abortion services encompass many healthcare providers, including but not limited to nurses, imaging staff, pharmacists, urgent care providers, family medicine physicians, and more, who will also be at risk if we do not take action to ensure their safety.

For these reasons, the Hawai'i Maternal and Infant Health Collaborative urge your committee to be proactive in protecting abortion access in Hawai'i, strengthening our existing statutes, and remaining steadfast in affirming our communities' right to self-determine their reproductive health choices without fear of harm or retaliation.

Founded in 2013, the Hawai'i Maternal and Infant Health Collaborative (Collaborative) is a public-private partnership committed to improving birth outcomes and reducing infant mortality in Hawai'i. We focus on health in the first year of life and want children to have the best start. A parent's health strongly impacts the health and well-being of their children and family, and the ability to self-determine when, where, and how to have more children or parent existing children plays a role.

The Collaborative was developed with the Executive Office of Early Learning's Action Strategy with help from the Department of Health and the National Governors' Association. The Action Strategy provides Hawai'i with a roadmap for an integrated and comprehensive early childhood system, spanning preconception to the transition to Kindergarten. The Collaborative is Team 1 of the Action Strategy and helps advance their goals by focusing on ensuring that children have the best start in life by being welcomed and healthy. The Collaborative has completed a strategic plan and accompanying Logic Model, *The First 1,000 Days*, aimed at achieving the outcomes of an 8% reduction in preterm births and a 4% reduction in infant mortality. Over 150 people across Hawai'i have been involved in the Collaborative. These members include physicians, clinicians, public health planners and providers, insurance providers, and health care administrators. The work is divided into three primary areas, preconception, pregnancy and delivery, and the first year of life, and coordinated by a cross-sector leadership team. Work is specific, outcome-driven, informed by data, and primarily accomplished in small workgroups.

Re: Testimony of Planned Parenthood Alliance Advocates in strong support of SB 1

Dear Chairs and Members of the Committee.

Planned Parenthood Alliance Advocates – Hawai'i ("PPAA") strongly supports SB 1, a bill that takes critical steps toward protecting abortion providers and patients and expands the pool of available providers by allowing physician assistants to provide abortion care. Fundamentally, providers and patients should not fear being investigated, jailed, or losing their license for providing or obtaining legal health care services.

In recent weeks, we have seen nationwide attacks on abortion access - a group of anti-abortion activists sued the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) in federal court over the FDA's approval of mifepristone, threatening access to medication abortion across the country. It is clear that anti-abortion activists and politicians are not stopping at banning abortion at the state level - they are coming after Hawai'i patients and providers too.

SB 1 Takes Critical Steps Toward Protecting Abortion Providers and Patients

SB 1 bolsters protections for providers and patients because the bill limits cooperation with other states' investigations and proceedings about the provision of abortion; eliminates statutory gaps in the physician (\$453-16) and nursing (\$457-8.7) abortion code; and prohibits medical licensure boards from taking adverse action against providers who provide abortion that is legal in the state of Hawai'i.

Because the Supreme Court erased decades of precedent last summer by taking away our federal constitutional right to abortion, one in three women of reproductive age in the U.S. – and more trans and nonbinary people – no longer have access to abortion in their state. Along with the loss of access to essential health care, providers and patients alike are living in fear of being criminally prosecuted. The law is crystal clear that abortion care provided in Hawai'i remains legal, and the Department of Justice reiterated that the Constitution restricts states' authority to ban reproductive services provided outside their borders. Nonetheless, overzealous prosecutors and lawmakers in hostile states are pursuing laws that target providers and discipline outside of states' borders.

Lawmakers should also ensure Hawai'i health care providers do not have their licenses negatively impacted or face discipline locally due to the provision of reproductive health care, even if providers are subject to discipline, investigations, or criminal charges in other states. As an example, shortly after the reversal of *Roe*, Indiana Attorney General targeted abortion provider Dr. Caitlin Bernard for providing an abortion to a 10-year-old rape survivor. Although the state of Indiana found Dr. Bernard was acting in accordance with Indiana law, her story highlights the very real possibility of providers being punished or disciplined for providing legal abortion care. Providers in these states are being forced to violate their ethical duties and medical judgment out of fear of prosecution, jail time, and loss of licensure. This bill

ensures that should Dr. Bernard have been prosecuted or otherwise disciplined in Indiana, she could continue to practice medicine in Hawai'i.

Additionally, with few remaining federal protections for abortion care, **Hawai'i cannot afford to have statutory gaps in state laws that put access to abortion at risk.** SB 1 includes language that clarifies that all pregnant people in the state have the right to access abortion care, including transgender and gender nonbinary people; eliminates archaic provisions that threaten criminal prosecution against providers for providing safe and basic abortion care; provides definitional consistency across state abortion codes; and protects access to telehealth abortion services. These clarifications go a long way in supporting our providers and patients by ensuring our statutes are as strong as possible.

All people in our state need to be confident that Hawai'i law protects their right to access abortion services, and providers should not be afraid to be jailed, lose their license, or be barred from ever practicing medicine again simply for providing basic, legal health care. Providers need to be confident that they can continue to focus on patient health and that Hawai'i will always be a safe place to do what is best for the person they are serving.

Physician Assistants Can Safely and Effectively Provide Abortion Care

PPAA supports inclusion of a provision in SB 1 that allows physician assistants to provide abortion care. Abortion, including aspiration abortion, is one of the safest medical procedures in the United States, and the risk of major complications that require hospitalization is exceptionally rare. Major complications from abortion occur in less than a quarter of one percent of procedures. This is about the same frequency of complications as for colonoscopies and less frequent than complications for wisdom tooth removal and tonsillectomy. Additionally, aspiration abortion can be safely performed in an office or clinic setting; scientific literature concludes that the safety of abortion care provided in an office setting is equivalent to the safety of abortion care provided in a hospital setting. For example, in a systematic literature review of over 11,000 scientific articles on aspiration abortion care, researchers found that medical complications from aspiration abortion were so low that this procedure could safely be provided in an office setting, and that when complications did occur in office settings, they were effectively managed at the clinic.

Numerous studies have found no difference in abortion safety when performed by qualified licensed providers – such as physician assistants – rather than a physician. For example, a multi-year study conducted by the University of California San Francisco's Bixby Center for Global Reproductive Health evaluated nurse practitioners, certified nurse midwives, and physician assistants providing early in-clinic abortion care. Over the five-year study, almost 8,000 patients received care from a qualified licensed provider, including at health centers and clinics, and the study found comparable rates of safety, effectiveness, and acceptability when compared to care from a physician. Qualified licensed provider care is also welcomed by patients: in a study evaluating patient experience after accessing abortion care, patients demonstrated a high level of satisfaction overall when they received their abortion care from a nurse practitioner, a certified nurse midwife, or a physician assistant.

Medical experts support removing restrictions on qualified licensed providers. Many health care and professional organizations have confirmed that qualified licensed providers can safely and effectively provide abortion care, including the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists (ACOG), the American Public Health Association, the World Health Organization, the American Academy of

Physician Assistants, and the National Abortion Federation, among others. Additionally, in a 2018 review, the National Academies of Sciences, Engineering, and Medicine concluded that qualified licensed providers are equally capable of providing safe and effective abortion care as physicians. Experts agree: restricting qualified providers from providing abortion care confers no medical benefit and instead harms patients by limiting access to care.

Given that many people in Hawai'i routinely receive care from qualified licensed providers, SB 1 could help maintain continuity of care with a single provider. People seeking an abortion should be able to seek care from a provider they trust who builds on-going relationships with patients and is an established abortion care provider. Having community-based providers that patients trust is particularly important for communities who have experienced a history of racism and oppression from the health care system and report a distrust of the medical providers, such as immigrants, Pacific Islanders, including Native Hawaiians, and other communities of color. Allowing PAs to provide abortion care would help people receive highly personal care from a provider they know and trust.

All people in Hawai'i deserve timely, safe, and local access to abortion care, and providers deserve to do their jobs without fearing they will get sent to jail or lose their career. A pregnant person's freedom to plan their family is a near unanimously held belief among Hawaii voters — **85 percent of Hawaii voters** believe it is important that women have access to all of the reproductive health care options available, including abortion. We look forward to continuing to work with you to remove legal barriers to abortion care to ensure that all Hawaii people have full and equal access to the care they need and deserve. Thank you for this opportunity to testify in strong support of this important legislation.

While I respectfully acknowledge Hawaii's law for women to access and obtain an abortion, I strongly oppose SB1 for the following reasons:

1. The Hawaii Federation and National Federation of Republican Women affirm and support the right to life through all stages:

The first stage is conception. In numerous peer-reviewed scientifically researched studies, it has been established that **life begins at conception**. In the textbook, "The Developing Human: Clinically Oriented Embryology." 7th edition, "A zygote (fertilized egg) is the beginning of a new human being...This highly specialized, totipotent cell marks the beginning of each of us as a **unique human being**."

- 2. Minor's access to abortion without parental consent is very concerning. The authors of this bill and Legislators who support this bill should place an emphasis on education rather than allowing minors to consent without parents. There are physical and emotional long-term impacts of abortions. I recommend an amendment to allocate resources to support a curriculum that includes contraception options as well as the physiological and emotional impact of an abortion procedure.
- 3. Impact on our community. In May 2021 the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) dropped a report that revealed the US birth rate fell by 4%, the sharpest single-year decline in nearly 50 years and the lowest number of births since 1979. When birth rates dip below what is known as the "replacement" fertility rate of 2.1", the optimal rate maintain population stability, there is a concern about future lack of healthy, young workers needed to maintain economic productivity. At the current rate of declining birth rates coupled with local families moving to the mainland, we could lose electoral votes and congressional seats.
- 4. Spiritual foundation. In Genesis 1:26-27, Then God said, "Let us make mankind in our image, in our likeness...So God created mankind in his own image, in the image of God he created them; male and female he created them." Furthermore, in Psalm 139:13, For you (God) created my inmost being you knit me together in my mother's womb.

Hawaii Family Forum is a non-profit, pro-family education organization committed to preserving and strengthening families in Hawaii. Our organization strongly opposes the amendment because it harms women who may not have access to a medical doctor to perform an abortion.

The intent to make abortions more accessible by using health practitioners other than medical doctors creates undue health risks for women, particularly those in underserved rural communities in Hawai'i.

Regulations on access to abortions are essential to protect the health and life of women who do choose to have an abortion. This amendment strips away the essential protections for women allowing health practitioners who do not have the same extensive training as medical doctors to perform abortions will undermine the safety of women in our state.

This bill may benefit traffickers, putting women at risk. Because Hawaii would refuse to engage with other states' abortion laws, SB 1 SD2 would prevent Hawaii from helping to identify and bring to justice traffickers who may force girls to undergo abortions. A young girl who is a victim of trafficking or sexual abuse would have no recourse against her abuser who takes her in for an abortion, or against the abortionist if she is harmed in the process.

Finally, it is uncertain what types of complications result from abortions, including death, because no data is available. The U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) notes that "states and areas voluntarily report data to CDC for inclusion in its annual Abortion Surveillance Report. CDC's Division of Reproductive Health prepares surveillance reports as data become available, but there is no national requirement for data submission or reporting. ¹

Aloha,

My name is Doris Segal Matsunaga and I am testifying in strong support of SB 1, SD 2.

After 40 years of working at three O'ahu community health centers as a public health educator and administrator, I retired to Waimea on Hawaii Island to live near grandchildren and extended family.

From this career, I know that health providers in Hawaii have long labored quietly, mostly under the radar to help women access abortion services, and that policy makers such as yourselves have preferred to quietly support medical privacy and reproductive freedom vs engaging in public advocacy for abortion. While Hawaii was a trailblazer on this issue and the first state to legalize abortion, we also have a strong community tradition of valuing multicultural and religious diversity and building a tolerant pluralistic democracy without inflaming community divisions. However, given events at the national level, this approach is no longer possible. SB 1, SD2 is essential to strengthen our laws and protect residents, families and providers.

As policymakers, it is time once again to show the courage of Hawaii's early heroines and heroes, take a stand for reproductive freedom and medical privacy, and pass this bill.

However, I wish to challenge the Legislature to go further... if not this year, then next. While SB1, SD 2 takes important steps to protect and expand abortion access, more remains to be done. Access to abortion services has always been a challenge for low income women, even on O'ahu. And as with all medical care, abortion services are even less available to those living on Neighbor Islands and in rural areas.

The day we moved to Waimea, the cost of our health insurance doubled. Routine and specialty services required trips to Honolulu, resulting in care delays. We all have friends and family who required emergency transport via air ambulance. In the case of abortion services, every day of delay is critical, adding complexity and cost, or making such services impossible.

To improve access on the Neighbor Islands and in other underserved areas, I urge legislators actively consult with Hawaii's abortion services providers, and the FQHC's (Federally Qualified Community Health Centers) referring patients to them, regarding barriers and facilitators of such care.

Please approve SB1, SD2. Mahalo for your attention to this important issue.

I'm here to tell you my story.

I grew up with a bright pink Planned Parenthood magnet on the fridge. I didn't know what Planned Parenthood was and all I knew was what people were saying at my elementary school. They weren't saying positive things about the organization and often said people who go to Planned Parenthood also go to hell, strong for fourth graders I know. One night, my mom and I sat down at the table and I asked her about the magnet, since this was a hot topic at school. She told me all about Planned Parenthood and the things they do to help us, like offering STI testing, birth control, and abortion. She assured me that when I got older, I would be very appreciative of Planned Parenthood.

Years later, someone from Planned Parenthood came to my school and taught my ninth grade class about gender and sexuality. As the trans kid who was outed by a teacher and sat in the far back corner of the classroom, I felt seen for the very first time. I felt that, as a transgender person, I was trans enough. That I could keep my uterus and my breasts and that there were other people like me.

After the lesson, I was presented with an opportunity: volunteer peer education work with Planned Parenthood. Through this work, I could learn things about my body that my school doesn't teach. I knew I wanted to do it because my school doesn't teach sex education and I never watched the puberty video we were supposed to watch in fifth grade. I knew nothing about my body.

I learned so much about abortion and LGBTQ+ health through my work with Planned Parenthood and I hadn't realized how important these issues really are. One of the first meetings I attended as a volunteer was right after Roe was overturned and I had just finished reading Brave New World. I was angry. I used to think 1984 got more right about our world, but the connections to Brave New World are getting stronger and stronger.

But I am very happy that Hawai'i has kept our law allowing abortion but it (the statute) needs to be updated with a stronger framework that protects abortion providers and patients.

As the local and national anti-abortion movement is trying to get rid of state laws allowing abortion, Hawai'i must remain a safe place for accessible health care for all. This means for all bodies: gender expansive bodies, gender non-conforming bodies, cisgender bodies-all bodies.

SB-1 SD-2 has been updated so that it uses inclusive language and I greatly appreciate this because I have a uterus. I am not a woman. This law applies to my body and acknowledges it but does not acknowledge my identity. There are many others that feel the same way. Hawai'i has a long history of LGBTQ+ kānaka, or māhū. There are many transgender people in Hawai'i like me who aren't acknowledged by the language used in our laws. Language about certain issues often exclude transgender people. Language about periods that only say "woman" exclude transgender people who menstruate is another example. I menstruate. I am not a woman.

Laws should acknowledge the whole person and who the body belongs to. I may not love my body but I'm learning to respect it and laws should respect our bodies too. I'm here to ask you to give support to SB-1 SD-2, a bill that strengthens our abortion law by using inclusive language and protecting abortion seekers and providers.

I completed my OBGYN residency in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, and am currently undergoing a two-year fellowship at the University of Hawai'i to become a subspecialist in complex contraception and abortion care. When I was applying for fellowship, the University of Hawai'i was my number-one choice because of the state's legacy of protecting abortion access, which was personified in its providers and the passion and dedication I saw from them on a national stage.

Because of the university's reputation in the field of complex family planning, based on Hawai'i's legacy, the University of Hawai'i draws top applicants for both medical school and residency. Training and education in this area has historically been difficult to access, and is expected to become even more difficult in the coming years due to the Supreme Court decision in Dobbs v. Jackson. This new generation of trainees, of which I am a part, is passionate and committed to providing the full spectrum of reproductive healthcare, including abortion. By showing the rest of the country that Hawai'i continues to be a leader in reproductive rights, we will continue to attract the top recruits to the state in fields like obstetrics and gynecology and family practice.

My name is Dani Mathisen and I am an Ob Gyn in training here in Oahu. Prior to moving here, I lived in Texas where I was born and raised. In my fourth year of medical school, my husband and I were blessed with a miracle pregnancy. Everything went well. Im young, I took my vitamins, I never missed an appointment and our prenatal testing came back normal. At our anatomy scan, however, we learned that my daughter had multiple lethal fetal anomalies. Senate Bill 8 had just passed in Texas and we were unable to receive counseling on options more or less actual care. We turned to friends and google for advice and had to call multiple clinics before we found someone with availability to see us. This clinic was >600 miles from my home and we had to get on a plane the next day. What we did was completely legal in the state we went to, but we still lived in fear that our decision would come back to penalize us back in our home state. Having to leave my home was traumatizing enough, but worrying that state laws could pass state lines added that much more trauma and stress. I support SB1 so that other pregnant people like me don't have to suffer from the added stress of sharing personal medical decisions across state lines that could then penalize them. Such action violates provider and patient confidentiality and creates further barriers to an already difficult journey to navigate. In my professional capacity, I get to hear youth, parent, and family concerns about reproductive and sexual health. I am troubled, nonetheless, by the cruel and punishing weight of persistent abortion stigma and unfair double standards often disproportionally placed on the shoulders of girls and young women and trans and gender non conforming bodies. Seeking medically accurate answers and available, legal options for sexual and reproductive health is an enshrined freedom and social and political human right required to live in a free, democratic society. It is not a crime, and yet the national landscape in the US continent, leads us to fear that it could be. That is why SB 1 is critical in holding the line to safeguard abortion access and reproductive justice here in Hawai'i.

How can we teach young people about consent, personal responsibility, kuleana and bodily autonomy, if they can not rely on our HI statues to affirm that their bodies are their own? Youth and families in Hawaii deserve to be assured that support, compassion, and privacy to determine their own futures will continue to be upheld as the policy and practice

of Hawaii, whatever reproductive and sexual health decision they face. SB 1 decreases barriers for the most vulnerable and most burdened, by distance and economic situation. It continues to ensure and protect physician and patient confidentiality. And in this context for time sensitive health services, SB1 takes critical steps to:

- Clarify that all pregnant people in the state have the right to access abortion care, including transgender and gender nonbinary people
- Allow physician assistants to provide safe and effective abortion care
- Protect access to telehealth abortion services
- Reinforce young peoples' ability to access abortion care

TESTIMONY OF ELLEN GODBEY CARSON

I write in strong support of SB 1, SD 2

While I write as an individual, I have served as President of Hawaii Women Lawyers, the Hawaii State Bar Association, and the Sex Abuse Treatment Center. The major part of my legal career was spent in civil rights and health law, including protecting our rights to abortion here in Hawaii.

We can be proud that Hawaii was the first state to recognize the right of access to safe and legal abortion (1970). Soon thereafter, the US Supreme Court recognized in *Roe v. Wade* a federal constitutional right to abortion, enshrining these protections on the federal level. In 2022, those rights were tragically destroyed due to changes in the US Supreme Court.

Sadly, our state abortion laws here in Hawaii over the past 50 years relied on the federal rights enshrined in *Roe v. Wade*. Our laws have not kept pace with medical advances, abortion by medication, neighbor island access needs, minors' needs, reproductive health care gaps in our community, or protections needed from foreign states who now seek to impose their punitive abortion bans on patients and providers in our islands. In short, we very much need to modernize and strengthen our laws to assure abortion services will continue to be at least as strong as those recognized under *Roe v, Wade*, so abortion access will be safe, medically appropriate, and protected for the next generations. SB 1 is a strong bill that will help meet these needs.

Please SUPPORT SB 1, SD 1, without need for amendment, as it will:

- Provide a clear, strong statement of state policy and fundamental rights to access safe, legal abortion for all pregnant persons in Hawaii
- Clarify that abortions are not limited to surgical procedures, and may instead be by medication. Medication abortion provides safety and accessibility benefits and is already the method of choice used in over half of abortions.
- Define "nonviable fetus" in a manner consistent with prevailing medical standards, and further recognize that termination of pregnancy of a viable fetus is also authorized if the termination is necessary to protect the life or health of the patient.
- Assure minors have access to safe, legal abortion care even if they are not able
 to obtain parental consent due to incest, fear of violence, eviction or other harm;
 or lack of loving parental relationships. While most minors do inform their parents
 and get their support, this protection is needed for minors who do not have a
 loving, caring home and where parents are either absent or may do harm to a
 minor who seeks an abortion.
- Provide numerous essential protections from civil and criminal liability, discovery
 proceedings and judicial procedures, as well as medical licensure disciplinary
 actions. We are facing threats of civil lawsuits, criminal prosecutions, and
 medical licensure disciplinary actions from foreign states who seek to impose

their punitive abortion bans on abortion providers and patients in this state. We need the strongest shield law we can create to protect our health care providers and their patients. Hawaii deserves the robust statutory protections from these challenges, as provided by this bill.

My name is Sarah Combs and I am currently a fourth year PhD student at the University of Hawai'i Mānoa. I am testifying today to support Senate Bill 1 "Relating to Health Care" that would expand and protect abortion access in Hawai'i and protect providers who provide this important medical service.

Abortion care is health care.

I used to work at a Federally Qualified Health Center in New York City as a Sexual Health Educator, where I worked with women to achieve their pregnancy related goals. A large part of this job was comprehensive options counseling. When a person came to the clinic for a pregnancy test, we would talk about the pros and cons of continuing the pregnancy, adoption, and abortion, in the context of their own life. This was a key part of the counseling – what would continuing or terminating a pregnancy mean to them, their lives and their goals? Many pregnant people would tell me "I never thought I would consider an abortion but there's no way I can be pregnant right now".

I think about the person who came to me when she received a positive pregnancy test and broke down crying because the pregnancy was either a result of her abusive boyfriend or a recent rape.

I think about a 15 year old student who got pregnant on the very first time she had sex and had dreams of going to college and becoming a doctor.

I think about a friend of mine who got pregnant with triplets when she already had two children and underlying health conditions that would make continuing a pregnancy dangerous. She lives in a state that now has very restrictive laws that would make it very difficult for her to obtain an abortion.

All of these people had reasons for not wanting to be pregnant and each of their situations could bring forth judgement from others about why they were considering an abortion. Not all of them chose abortion in the end, but the underlying facts remain the same:

- When a pregnancy is unplanned, there are rammifications for a person's life no matter how they
 choose to move forward.
- Abortion is a very safe procedure with fewer complications than continuing a pregnancy.
- No one should be coerced or forced into having an abortion OR continuing a pregnancy; it is
 one of the most intimate and important choices that a pregnant person can face and the right
 to choose and access to care must be protected.

The recent overturn of *Roe v Wade* has created confusion and fear around pregnancy and abortion. It passes the responsibility to the State to ensure that the right to choose stays protected. At this point, I would like to strongly reiterate my support for SB 1 as a first step to protecting these rights. I urge you to pass this important bill to protect and expand abortion access to people who considering termination and protect the medical professionals who provide this essential service.

I know you have already heard from many of us healthcare providers, but we are in a privileged place as we know firsthand the importance of access to abortion care in promoting the wellbeing of Hawaii's families. Abortion care, put simply, reduces pregnancy-related illness and death.

SB1 protections to prevent legal actions against our healthcare providers, including myself and all of those who work across the islands. Protection of providers means protection of the care we provide for our patients, including those from Hawaii and the mainland.

Lawmakers in conservative states have threatened to introduce bills to penalize abortion care provided in Hawaii. This includes threats of civil law suits, criminal prosecution, and disciplinary action against healthcare providers. This includes action against providers for performing abortion services that are fully legal in Hawaii. This means providers may be afraid to offer the standard of care for fear of legal repercussions.

There are few advertised health clinics where people can get an abortion, and the pool of abortion providers in Hawai'i is small. Protecting access to abortion necessitates protecting our current abortion workforce.

Patients may see a variety of healthcare providers prior to getting an abortion. For example, a patient may go to an urgent care clinic due to feeling ill, be told by the family physician at the clinic that they're pregnant, get referred to an ultrasound where they are seen by a radiology technician and radiologist. Then eventually they get referred to the abortion provider.

All of these health care providers along the way are providing abortion-related healthcare (i.e. healthcare related to the patient getting an abortion).

Since the U.S. Supreme Court decision *Dobbs v Jackson Womens Health Organization* which overturned Roe v Wade, an increasing number of states has been passing legislation restricting access to abortion within their state.

This proposed bill would codify and expand on Governor Ige's Executive Order 22-05 by: 1) Prohibiting disclosure of healthcare information related to abortion obtained in Hawai'i without the consent of the patient/guardian for purposes of civil litigation in another state related to that abortion;

I offer this testimony in my personal capacity to strongly support SB 1, SD 2 which modernizes our abortion statutes and affirms safe and accessible reproductive health care in Hawai'i. In my professional work as the Legal Director of the Medical-Legal Partnership for Children in Hawai'i, I have seen the dire consequences of limited resources for young and low-income people who need access to immediate, safe, and confidential abortion care. Even with Hawaii's dedicated corps of abortion care providers, we have a critical need to update our statutes, remove antiquated restrictions and penalties, protect healthcare providers, and expand reproductive health care access, especially for neighbor island and rural communities.

The state of Hawai'i has protected abortion rights for over 50 years, and Native Hawaiians have recognized abortion care as "a fundamental part of our *maoli ola*, our health care," long before colonization. Unfortunately, the U.S. Supreme Court case of *Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health* changes the calculus for everyone. Medical providers and others have enumerated barriers to access in Hawai'i, including the lack of clinical services on neighbor islands, increased threats to providers by outside entities, and the heightened stigma fueled by *Dobbs*. Hawai'i must respond by recommitting to safe and accessible abortion care as a normal part of pregnancy care.

SB 1, SD 2 updates Hawaii's abortion statutes to conform with our state's decades-long history of safe and accessible reproductive health care, including abortion care. Our state's commitment to reproductive health care positively impacts the physical and mental health, economic security, and safety of women and pregnant people. SB 1, SD 2 has broad support, and it will strengthen <u>all</u> families and communities in Hawai'i.

From ACLU of Hawai'i Statement on Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization

- Abortion in Hawai'i is legal, but still needs to be more equitable.
- Let's be clear: abortion is still legal in Hawai'i. However, it is equally clear that even though it is legal, abortion and healthcare access remains inaccessible to many people, especially people who are poor, people who live in rural areas or on islands without easily accessible clinics, and for Native Hawaiians, Pacific Islanders, Indigenous people and people of color who already experience significant health disparities.
- The ACLU of Hawai'i has historically been on the forefront of fighting to protect the right to abortion, such as suing the U.S. Food & Drug Administration (FDA) on behalf of abortion and medical providers back in 2017 for its unconstitutional restrictions on where and how patients can access mifepristone, a medication used for early abortion and miscarriage care. The FDA just last year repealed such restriction, pressured by our lawsuit.

- It's important to note that abortion legality does not mean that abortion is freely accessible to all people in need of abortion. Abortion remains difficult to access due to lack of abortion infrastructure that overcomes the financial and geographical constraints on Native Hawaiian women, immigrant women, women of color, poor

women, youth, the LGBTQIA+ community, military dependents, people with disabilities and those living on islands without an abortion provider or clinic. (p. 2)

- This limit on who may perform abortion procedures is a burden in and of itself, but is exacerbated by Hawai'i's current physician shortage and its geography as an island state.
- Currently, people on Kauai, Molokai, Lanai, and the West side of Hawai'i do not have access to a local provider, forcing many to fly to another island to seek care. In addition to incurring the high cost of interisland travel, a person may also need to take time off from work, arrange childcare, and book lodging just to see their provider. In 2018, more than ten percent of Planned Parenthood's abortion patients in Hawai'i had to travel between islands to obtain care. COVID19 has worsened these financial and logistical barriers to care, and has made travel to access abortion care more difficult, expensive, and dangerous given the potential for COVID-19 exposure. Moreover, all of these harms have a disproportionate impact on individuals who already face systemic barriers to care, including Black and Indigenous people and other people of color, people with low incomes, survivors of intimate partner violence, young people, and people who live in geographically isolated areas.
- The evidence clearly shows that APRNs can safely provide abortion care, and can do so outside of a hospital setting. Hawai'i's physician-only abortion requirement thus provides no health or medical benefit to pregnant people and yet imposes serious barriers on their access to abortion care, a constitutionally protected, fundamental right.
- Hawai'i has long stood as a leader in reproductive freedom, as many states continue to battle aggressive, well-organized efforts to shutter their remaining clinics. We must continue to lead by passing H.B. 576 and removing this outdated, unnecessary, and harmful barrier to care.

As an Obstetrician/Gynecologist who has practiced in Hawaii for 30-plus years - I have firsthand knowledge of the importance of access to abortion care in promoting the health and wellbeing of Hawaii's women and families, as well as in reducing pregnancy-related illness and death.

SB1 SD2 provides critical and timely protections to prevent legal actions against Hawaii's healthcare providers and patients from other states that seek to impose their punitive abortion laws on abortion care legally provided in Hawaii.

Lawmakers in other states have threatened to introduce bills to penalize abortion care provided in Hawaii via threats of civil lawsuits, criminal prosecution, and disciplinary action against healthcare providers for performing lawful abortion services in Hawaii. Lawmakers in these states have even threatened patients who may travel to other states such as Hawaii and have care provided there, with criminal prosecution.

SB1 SD2 reinforces that such laws by other states are contrary to Hawaii's public policy and the state constitutional right of privacy in Hawaii.

Access to abortion care is a part of Women's Healthcare excellence. The rest of SB1 is apparently an attempt to set Hawaii apart from other states in our union that have legislated restrictions on abortion following the Dobbs decision of the Supreme Court of the United States. Those other states have created situations where an abortion provider can end up with a damages judgement against him or her for the services provided in performing the abortion. SB1 states that the judgment will not be enforceable in Hawaii. However, Section 1 of Article IV to the United States Constitution includes the "Full Faith and Credit" clause which states: "Full Faith and Credit shall be given in each State to the public Acts, Records, and judicial proceedings of every other State." Section 2 of that Article provides that "The Citizens of each State shall be entitled to the Privileges and Immunities of Citizens in the several states." TESTIMONY IN OPPOSITION

SUMMARY

Regarding abortion: there's a way to reconcile the pro-choice and pro-life positions. Here are two rights which can both be achieved together. (1) A woman has a right to "control her own body" by terminating her pregnancy at any time. (2) An unborn baby has a right to live; therefore mother and her helpers have a duty to use all reasonable methods to protect baby's life and health during the process of terminating the pregnancy. Killing the baby should not be allowed as the method for ending a pregnancy, unless necessary for a woman exercising self-defense against a pregnancy that is killing her. It is both factually incorrect and morally wrong to assume that killing the embryo or fetus is the method that must or should automatically be used for a woman who chooses early termination of her pregnancy.

It is already standard medical care that babies born prematurely are taken to Neonatal Intensive Care Unit where their lives are saved. If mom chooses to end pregnancy, early birth can be induced medically by pill or injection, or surgically by Caesarean section; then use NICU. At earliest stages, use procedures from in vitro fertilization clinics to transfer zygote or embryo from a woman who chooses to end her pregnancy to a woman who is eager to become pregnant but biologically unable or personally unwilling to do it through sexual intercourse.

There are various methods currently used to kill an embryo or fetus to begin an abortion: pills which can be purchased in pharmacies and used at home or in clinics to kill it quietly and then expel it; dismemberment inside the uterus followed by using suction or forceps to remove the pieces; etc. All such methods are killing with malice aforethought, also known as murder. The person who orders a murder or pays to hire a murderer (the mother) is equally as guilty as the person who actually does the killing (doctor, nurse). A clinic or hospital which knowingly allows its facilities to be used for murder is an accomplice in the crime.

Should the State of Hawaii have a law which renders unenforceable the laws of other states which prohibit abortions, and/or demand extradition of women and/or their helpers who order or perform abortions? The U.S. Constitution Article IV, Section 1 says "Full Faith and Credit shall be given in each State to the public Acts, Records, and judicial Proceedings of every other State. And the Congress may by general Laws prescribe the Manner in which such Acts, Records and Proceedings shall be proved, and the Effect thereof." Therefore it would be inadvisable, and probably unconstitutional, for Hawaii to pass such a law making other states' laws unenforceable. Doing so would undoubtedly result in protracted and very expensive litigation. Of course the "Full Faith and Credit" clause works in both directions. Just as Hawaii might not be allowed to override or circumvent the abortion laws of other states, so also those other states might not be allowed to override or circumvent the Hawaii law that this legislature is considering for enactment. Just imagine the costs of litigation as numerous pairs of states wage war against each other in court; while doctors, nurses, hospitals, and pregnant women by the millions embark on class-action lawsuits for damages -- lawyers will prosper greatly at taxpayer expense!

DISCUSSION

Let's consider the various stages of pregnancy regarding when human life begins; and the timing of an abortion; and selection of a method for performing it in a way that protects baby's life:

Definitions:

"Abortion" is the termination of a pregnancy at any time before the baby is born either by vaginal delivery or by full-term surgical removal (Cesarean section).

"Pregnancy" begins when a blastocyst is implanted into the lining of the uterus, and ends when the fetus is born or aborted. Biology lesson about "pregnancy": When an egg has passed from a woman's ovary into a fallopian tube it may become fertilized by a sperm and is then called a zygote during its passage through the tube. Note that the egg was already fertilized during its passage through the fallopian tube; that fertilization, also called "conception", is what some religions say marks the beginning of human life. The zygote continues on its journey through the tube into the uterus where it repeatedly divides creating a hollow ball of cells called a blastocyst. The blastocyst then becomes implanted in the lining of a woman's uterus where it is called an embryo and the woman can now be called "pregnant." After 9 more weeks of growth and organ development it is called a fetus. Terminology provided here is based on information provided by the Mayo Clinic and the Cleveland Clinic.

Adopting those definitions allows us to set aside several much-discussed types of contraception before pregnancy as irrelevant to the issue of abortion. But see a section at the end of this testimony: "When does human life begin so that an unborn baby has rights? Some technicalities regarding contraception vs. abortion"

For decades there has been great controversy and strident language between pro-life and pro-choice partisans on the issue of abortion. The Roe v Wade Supreme Court decision 50 years ago guaranteed women a right to an abortion subject to various levels of federal and state regulation depending on which trimester a pregnancy was in. The Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization decision by the Supreme Court in 2022 overturned Roe as having been wrongly decided, and ruled that each state can decide the matter for itself, or Congress can enact a nationwide law.

What makes this controversy pro-life vs. pro-choice so strident is the nearly universal assumption that there is no middle ground or compromise possible.

But in fact it is possible for both pro-life and pro-choice positions to win. The difficulties arise because both sides are assuming that abortion means killing the baby -- embryo or fetus -- even the choice of words is controversial.

Hospitals today have NICUs -- Neonatal Intensive Care Units. Thousands of babies born prematurely are taken to these specialized places where they are given all the medical tests and treatments they need to survive. Some babies born only halfway through a normal gestation period, 4-5 months, are saved. Anxious and loving parents come visit them every day to have an extended finger grasped by their tiny baby, or get their shirt drooled on. Yes, it's very expensive. But how much is a human life worth, especially if it's your own child's?

A pro-choice woman/girl who wants to "control her own body" and get rid of an unwanted pregnancy anytime during its final several months can do so without killing her unborn baby. Get the fetus delivered out of mother's body into a NICU by having the mother choose to use methods already being used when mother's life is endangered by pregnancy. A choice to cause birth early can be achieved either medically with pills or shots, or surgically by Caesarean section. Of course this would be expensive, and painful, to the mother. But it's her choice, and many choices in life are expensive and painful. There might be occasions when such procedures cannot be used for valid medical reasons related to either the mother's or baby's health. In that case, mother simply cannot exercise that choice. However, neither mother nor her medical helpers should be allowed to murder the baby merely because mother doesn't want the inconvenience and cost of raising the child, or doesn't want the pain or cost of surgically or medically induced early birth. I would choose to fly my own airplane to Paris to see how the repair of Notre Dame is coming along and dine at "Le Souffle" restaurant, but I have neither the skill nor money to exercise that choice.

Even at the earliest stages of pregnancy, there are ways to end it without killing the embryo. The techniques for doing that are improving constantly as we see in numerous advertisements for "in vitro" fertilization clinics. A couple want to make a baby but either the man or the woman has a problem that prevents them from making a baby in the usual way. The woman's egg and the man's sperm (or donations of one or the other from outsiders) are mixed in a petrie dish to cause fertilization, and then the organism (zygote, blastocyst, or embryo) is implanted into the appropriate place in the woman. In a different sort of procedure, the organism can be implanted into the body of a volunteer mother who carries the pregnancy to term as a surrogate for the woman who is unable to achieve or continue a pregnancy. Such techniques are widely used already to help couples who want to make a baby; and the same techniques could be used to harvest an unborn baby from a woman who chooses to end her pregnancy during its early stages and donate it to a woman or couple who eagerly want it. Of course this would be expensive, and painful, to the woman who chooses to end her pregnancy. But it's her choice, and many choices in life are expensive and painful. There might be occasions when such procedures cannot be used for valid medical reasons related to either the mother's or baby's health. In that case, mother simply cannot exercise that choice. However, neither mother nor her medical helpers should be allowed to murder the baby merely because mother doesn't want the inconvenience and cost of raising the child, or doesn't want the pain or cost of undergoing the procedures necessary to save the baby's life.

I believe it is clear that the pro-choice position is NOT primarily based on a claim that a woman has "the right to control my own body." Early in a pregnancy she might not even be feeling any symptoms of it. She might not know she is pregnant until she misses a couple periods and sees the wrong color on a urine test strip. It's not her body that worries her. It's the loss of control over her social life and her money. Late in her pregnancy she will "show"; and after the baby is born she must stay home to take care of it. Men won't date her; she'll have to give up college and a career; she'll be spending many thousands of dollars every year for the next 20 years to raise her child: food, diapers, doctor bills, baby sitters, clothes, school supplies, college tuition.

The pregnant girl/woman is in the same position as a middle-aged adult stuck with taking care of an elderly parent with dementia who has medical problems that are costing lots of money, causing chaos and unhappiness in the family's homelife, and eroding what "should" be an inheritance. The easy solution in both situations is to get rid of the inconvenient person. Either kill them yourself or hire a killer. Both the actual killer (doctor, nurse, back-alley abortionist), and the person who recruited and paid the killer (Mom) are guilty of murder -- especially in view of the fact that there are ways to save the baby's life during the process of terminating the pregnancy. Medical science is making rapid advances in taking care of premature babies. As time goes by it will become possible to do so in a NICU at shorter and shorter periods of gestation.

Killing an elderly adult is very hard to get away with, because they are well known and people will notice if they suddenly disappear. But in some cultures it is/was (allegedly) a customarily accepted practice to send grandma on a final journey by putting her on a canoe or ice floe and sending her out to sea.

Killing an unborn baby is easy -- it's quite possible that nobody knows the woman is pregnant -- she can have a "medical" abortion privately, at home, by taking some pills that come in the mail or buying them at the drugstore; or a surgical abortion where HIPAA privacy laws keep the secret for her. And even if friends and neighbors know about it, abortion happens so often that it has become socially acceptable. Many people today complain about gun violence with multiple victims; but those numbers are very small compared with the enormous number of unborn babies murdered lawfully by abortion every day. I hope our legislature will not become an accomplice in these mass murders.

Let's be clear. Killing an unborn baby should be illegal except in self-defense when the pregnancy is actually killing its mother and there's no way to remove the baby that is safe for both mother and baby. "Killing its mother" should be defined as "physical", not merely the easily-stretched "psychological." The "balance of harms" test regards saving a life as more

important than alleviating mental distress to mother from several months of constant reminder of the trauma that produced the baby growing inside her. If a pregnancy results from rape or incest, those are not reasons for killing the innocent baby but the legislature might specify that those factors justify the charity of government payment for the procedures needed to protect baby. Legislators considering granting "personhood" status to "Mother Earth" or to various rivers, mountains, etc. should consider whether geological features are "persons" but unborn human babies are not persons and have no inherent right to exist.

When does human life begin so that an unborn baby has rights? Some technicalities regarding contraception vs. abortion

The Roman Catholic Pope Paul VI in his encyclical "Humanae Vitae" (25 July 1968) stated the church's position that life begins at the moment of conception, when an egg has been fertilized by a sperm. This would mean that human life has begun while a fertilized egg (zygote) is still in the fallopian tube passing from the ovary to the uterus, and several days before implantation into the uterus. Thus we might conclude that deliberate use of any medication which would block implantation, for the purpose of preventing a pregnancy, would be murder or attempted murder if in fact a fertilized egg (either zygote or blastocyst) was present in the uterus at that time.

"Humanae Vitae" went a step further by stating that every act of sexual intercourse must remain open to the transmission of life, meaning that contraception by barrier methods such as condoms or diaphragms must also be prohibited. The only acceptable way to avoid pregnancy while still enjoying vaginal sex would be the "rhythm method" consisting of restricting such an encounter to happen at a time in a woman's menstrual cycle when an egg is not yet present in the fallopian tube and also at a time when a sperm's lifespan will end before an egg has arrived in the tube. Accurate timing of such things is difficult if not impossible, and also limits the spontaneity which may be essential to intimacy and enjoyment; for example,

accuracy might require a woman to often measure her temperature during 2-3 weeks every month to judge whether and when ovulation has occurred, and to faithfully continue doing so for decades until menopause.

Fortunately our U.S. Constitution prohibits us from enacting laws that would constitute an "establishment of religion." Thus legislators need not obey the views of the Catholic Church, although legislators might consider them for advice when consulting their consciences while deciding how to vote. Religions besides Roman Catholic or other Christian, including Judaism, Buddhism, Hinduism, Muslim should also be considered because there are a wide variety and large number of adherents who are citizens and residents of Hawaii, and legislators feel obligated to represent the views of their constituents.

The "morning after pill" poses a dilemma about whether it is contraception or abortion. This is a pill which a woman might take soon after having unprotected sex. Does the pill merely prevent implantation? Or does it cause ejection of an egg within a day or two after it has already been implanted? Ejection would actually be abortion, although it might not be detectable as an ejection because of the extremely small amount of material. Perhaps scientists can tell us definitively whether the "morning after pill" works only to prevent implantation and is impossible to cause an ejection. However, those who believe human life exists at the moment of conception will say it does not matter whether the "morning after pill" merely prevents implantation or actually causes ejection -- because either way, life already began when the sperm fertilized the egg inside the fallopian tube even before it arrived into the uterus.

Chairs Belatti and Tarnas and Vices Chairs Takenouchi and Takayama and Committee Members:

I strongly oppose to SB1 S.D.2 for several reasons:

- a. Proposed section 453-16 (G) appears to violate Article IV of the US Constitution: "Full faith and credit shall be given in each of those States to the records, acts, and judicial proceedings of the courts and magistrates of every other State." When the previous governor, Governor Ige, promulgated Executive Order 22-5 on October 11, 2022 he outlined his intention to violate the provisions of Article IV of the US Constitution and therefore his intentions should never be put into practice.
- b. The U.S. Constitution guarantees the right to life to all human beings. The fetus that are "terminated" are unique (not the mother's body) living human beings according to their own DNA and obvious when looking at an ultrasound. They deserve equal protection under the law. We need to stop classifying human beings as only property/slaves to another human being. Slavery was abolished in our country. IVF doctors only put **living zygotes (babies)** into a mother's womb. They are living human beings.
- c. Centuries ago it was acknowledged that it was unethical to kill a baby in the womb. Based on this draft bill, it appears many of Hawaii's doctors and legislators/politicians ignore truth respecting pregnancy that they don't like. According to the earliest surviving copy of the Hippocratic Oath that doctors were once required to take:

"Neither will I administer a poison to anybody when asked to do so, nor will I suggest such a course. **Similarly I will not give to a woman a <u>pessary</u> to cause abortion. ...** Now if I carry out this oath, and break it not, may I gain for ever reputation among all men for my life and for my art; but if I break it and forswear myself, may the opposite befall me."

d. The definition of non-viable fetus is still not adequately clear. According to healthline, "A baby born between 20 and 26 weeks is a considered to be periviable, or born during the window when a fetus has a chance of surviving outside the womb." **Based on this fact and to provide clarity**,

the bill should be amended to state: No abortion may be performed for fetuses that are 20 weeks or older.

- e. The bill protects abortionists who have broken the law in other states. However, SB1 S.D.2 as currently written does not provide sufficient protections for hospitals, pharmacies, and medical staff that cannot ethically or morally take the life of a living human baby either through pills, devices or surgical abortions. If passed, amend SB1 S.D.2 to the effect: "No hospital, medical office, pharmacy, or staff in those facilities will be required to participate, refer for abortions, or prescribe/distribute or refer for abortifacients or contraceptives nor shall those individuals be liable or lose their job, be demoted, lose salary or suffer any loss of status as a result of their refusal.
- f. Revert to the term pregnant female or woman instead of the woke terminology "pregnant person". Currently only biological women can be pregnant. You have a definition for Person in the bill which makes the term "pregnant person" nonsense. Please explain: pregnant partnership, pregnant joint venture, pregnant corporation, pregnant association, pregnant business, pregnant trust, pregnant organized group or pregnant legal entity or any pregnant combination thereof.
- **g.** Hawaii has age of consent laws affecting minors 15 and under to protect them from abuse. If a minor is in a situation that consent is not possible, not only police but parents/guardians must be notified of the abuse. **Please clarify which minors are included in this bill.**

PART I - Allows licensed physician assistants to perform abortions. Repeals the requirement that abortions, including aspiration abortions performed by advance practice registered nurses, be performed at certain locations. Clarifies that a patient has the right to choose to obtain an abortion, or to terminate a pregnancy if the termination is necessary to protect the life or health of the patient, and the State shall not deny or interfere with these rights. Defines "abortion" and "nonviable fetus".

Part II - Prohibits a covered entity from disclosing communication or information relating to reproductive health care services. Prohibits the issuance of a subpoena in connection with an out-of-state proceeding relating to reproductive health care services legally performed in the State. Prohibits agencies from providing information or expending resources in the furtherance of interstate investigations or proceedings relating to reproductive health care services. Prohibits the State from penalizing, prosecuting, or otherwise taking adverse action based on pregnancy outcomes or aiding or assisting a pregnant individual with accessing reproductive health care services. Requires the Governor to deny any demand for surrender of a person charged with a crime involving reproductive health care services unless the conduct constitutes a crime in the State. Enumerates laws contrary to public policy and prohibits their application as rules of decision in the courts. Prohibits the issuance of a summons for persons to testify in another state with regard to lawful reproductive health care services.

Part III - Clarifies under various licensing statutes that the provision or assistance in receipt or provision of medical, surgical, pharmaceutical, counseling, or referral services related to the human reproductive system cannot form a basis for disciplinary action.

Part IV - Prohibits the enforcement of a judgment or order arising from a foreign penal civil action or other penal law with respect to reproductive health care services.

Part V – Amends the definition of "medical care and services" that a minor may consent to receive without any other person's consent to include surgery and any treatment to induce abortion.

My name is Jennifer Ruiz and I am testifying in support of SB1 relating to health care.

While abortion remains legal in Hawai'i; it has yet to become universally safe, equitable, and affordable for all. Limiting who may perform abortion procedures is a burden in and of itself, but is magnified by Hawai'is current physician shortage and geographical location as an island archipelago. Colonial restrictions on abortion disproportionately impact People of Color & Indigenous--especially, Native Hawaiian. In addition, to those who are classed as poor on a social-economical group and the gender-oppressed people the hardest.

Furthermore, local residents living on neighbouring islands that don't have any easy access to healthcare services free of barriers. We won't stop fighting until abortion is affordable, widely available, and readily accessible to anyone who needs it.

There's also something that I would like to add as someone who is a veteran and survivor of gender-based violence (rape, sexual assault, and more). This isn't specific to the military but in the world as whole. In the military, women are not allowed to terminate the pregnancy and have it covered by Tricare due to the policies set in place. Service members are allowed to get an abortion with civilian medical providers. I know this because I was one of the service members that needed to terminate a pregnancy while I was active duty and had to seek medical treatment from a civilian health care provider. This was several years ago and things haven't changed except the continued war on Indigenous rights & women's rights that government continues to exacerbate.

Stand here before you in words because I am unable to speak in person or virtually during the hearing. Stand before you, with written testimony to read as a Veteran, MST Survivor, and service member at one time that elected an abortion and was punished by my SNCOIC at the time following the termination. Not because of policy but his morality on my choice and bodily autonomy--with no regard that my body was not to his Judge. Nobody who makes the decision to terminate should to have face retaliation and hostility. It was the hardest and most painful decision to go through and heal from afterwards.

Chair Belatti, Chair Tarnas, and Members of the Committees:

I submit this testimony in **STRONG SUPPORT** of Senate Bill No. 1, Senate Draft 2, which is ultimately intended to maintain the constitutional right to an abortion guaranteed under *Roe v. Wade*. Further, this bill is intended to protect the privacy rights of those who access reproductive healthcare services; and protect healthcare workers who provide services to terminate pregnancies.

I would first like to recognize that although I consider my views on this matter to be from the perspective of a woman and private citizen, that I am also a member of Congress and that others may not distinguish between my professional and personal roles. I mention this to underscore the importance of this matter, and my decision to submit testimony. While this bill is under consideration by the State Legislature, it is a result of the devastating impacts of the U.S. Supreme Court's decision in *Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization* to overrule *Roe v. Wade*, and thereby has a nexus to nationwide policy.

Last May, when the draft *Dobbs* decision was leaked, I happened to be in Washington D.C. Angry, sad, refusing to accept that we are in a time when my nieces

have less rights than their grandmother did, I joined the crowds around the Supreme Court Building in protesting the attack on a women's reproductive freedom. This decision has set us back 50 years. Hawaii was at the forefront of the movement to protect an individual's right to privacy and bodily autonomy by being the first state to legalize abortion. We must now also be the leaders in protecting those rights we fought so hard for 50 years ago.

While we are fortunate enough to live in a state that recognizes the right to abortion, we also have a responsibility to be there for those Americans that currently live in fear not knowing whether, where, or how they can get safe, legal abortion care. The fact of the matter is that the *Dobbs* decision will not prevent abortions—it will prevent safe access to abortions, and thereby jeopardize the lives and health of pregnant people across the country.

Public health experts have expressed concern that reducing access to abortion may lead to more pregnancy-related deaths in the United States. Today, the United States is already the deadliest developed country to give birth in. According to data from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, in 2020, the maternal mortality rate in the United States was 24 deaths per 100,000 live births—more than three times the rate in most other high-income countries. As a country, we are already failing to assure the health of pregnant people and the Supreme Court's ruling will only worsen the nation's maternal mortality crisis if we do not take immediate action.

In the months since *Dobbs*, 24 states have banned abortion or are on track to do so. Politicians should not be in the position to decide who does and does not get access to health care. We must do better here in Hawaii.

On October 11, 2022, then-Governor David Ige issued an executive order to help secure protections for both providers and patients across the State of Hawaii. The Hawaii State Legislature is now considering Senate Bill No. 1, which would codify and expand upon this directive to safeguard the privacy rights of all patients seeking abortion services and protect abortion providers from efforts that threaten and distract them from delivering safe and effective abortion care.

It is critical that we uphold Hawaii state law, which guarantees that all pregnant people have access to safe and legal abortion care, no matter their zip code or income level. No patient should be forced to carry a pregnancy against their will, nor should a provider be punished for ensuring patients receive the individualized, quality care that they need. Senate Bill No. 1 affirms the rights and freedoms of every person within the State's boundaries to have complete autonomy over their own body.

In 1970, Hawaii became the first state to legalize abortion, three years before *Roe v. Wade* granted the constitutional right to abortion. Now, Hawaii must once again lead the nation in protecting the right to choose for which we fought so hard to secure more than 50 years ago.

I commend the Hawaii State Legislature for taking swift and bold action on behalf of the people of Hawaii and once again leading the nation in doing what is right.

The other patient had a severe fetal anomaly but decided to carry her pregnancy to term and had an uncomplicated delivery. Both patients, in the state of Hawai'i, were legally able to choose the outcome they wanted for their pregnancy. Our jobs as healthcare providers is to help patients achieve the best outcome for themselves using the full spectrum of modern medicine, and this includes safe abortion. But this is no longer possible for patients in many other states in the US. I am grateful for the work of our Senators on SB1 to protect the rights of our patients, and now I look to our Representatives to finish this important work: please pass SB1.

My name is Olivia Manayan and I am an OB/GYN resident physician based in Honolulu. I train mainly at Kapiolani Medical Center and Queen's Medical Center, and have provided abortion care at both these hospitals. I am here today in **strong support** of SB1.

Every person with a uterus has the right to decide if and when she bears children. To deny her this right is to mark her as a second-class citizen; by forcing a person to be a slave to her fertility, you deny her the ability to fully exercise her inalienable rights to life, and to liberty. In medicine, we strive to provide care that balances the principles of beneficence, non-maleficence, and autonomy. SB1 Abortion Testimony for HLT 3-15-23

Honorable Chair Belatti and House Committee members, I am Dr. Joe Ritter and am testifying **IN SUPPORT OF SB1**, for reproductive rights, for human rights, for the right to choose.

I almost did not testify today because as I have no uterus I have no right to say what reproductive medical choices any woman or any other person makes.

Nevertheless, as a scientist I feel compelled to speak out about this issue. Although my doctorate is in Physics My qualification to speak on this topic is that my first several refereed scientific publications were as a teenager in the fields of Developmental Biology specifically Embryo development, Teratology, the study of birth defects, and Pathologic Embryology. ¹⁻⁶

My qualifications in that field relevant to this discussion include multiple refereed papers and even being an Invited Keynote Speaker for the Mid Atlantic **Reproduction** and Teratology Society for my work developing landmark artificial intelligence data analysis techniques for birth defect Data⁶ 38 years ago. I have published over 50 other papers⁷ and done 46 years of research in a dozen fields in science, including Biology, Genetics, Oceanography, Satellite Remote sensing, Spacecraft propulsion, Space Optics, Metamaterial molecular design and many others. The point is I am a reputable scientist.

My main thesis is simple. A fertilized egg is not a human. A fertilized egg is not a human. Many who refuse to acknowledge a woman's fundamental right of choice often claim fallaciously that once an egg is fertilized it is a human. This is wrong. Let me explain.

Cellular differentiation is a process in which a general purpose cell expresses DNA codes in such a way that it or its next generations turn into cells with a more specific function. Common cells like stem cells or a single fertilized egg are not highly differentiated and for many generations are simply a non-specific blob of cells with no neural development, no consciousness and no external human traits.

Such blobs are no more human than the skin I scrape off my arm. Yes both have human DNA, yes both can replicate, but until a substantial amount of time has passed and extensive differentiation occurs allowing specific multi-morphology expression, a single cell or a small lump of cells is not a human.

Even after fetal cells begin to differentiate, there is no functioning consciousness. According to DARPA, a fly's brain is capable of 1 Gigaflop in computations. Yet in a fetus neural development is not even near that level until far later in pregnancy. In contrast, a developed human brain operates at the Exaflop level, a billion times the fly brain computational ability. There is no consciousness nor significant neural activity in a newly fertilized egg nor in a 6 week old fetus.

My second point is I support SB1 on legal grounds:

The central premise of Roe v. Wade was that a woman has the right to terminate a pregnancy before viability and also even after viability if an abortion is necessary to preserve her life or health.

The recent Dobbs vs. Jackson decision is highly debated with good reason: The "Due Process Clause" of the 14th Amendment to the United States Constitution provides a "right to privacy". The Constitution therefore protects a pregnant woman's liberty to choose to have an abortion without excessive government restriction. This is a fundamental right. Such difficult decisions can only be made by a woman and her physician.

Further, as a fundamental constitutionalist I am compelled to point out that Separation of church and state, is a fundamental tenant of our political system. To be specific, though not mentioned in the constitution, Our 3rd President <u>Thomas Jefferson</u> referred to the First Amendment as creating a "wall of separation" between church and state, and I follow his lead on this. We must not live in the dark ages, nor ignore science and make law based on religious tenets. ALSO we must have a clearly defined barrier between religion and education.

My last point is about human rights:

I have personally known a person carrying a child who would be born dead. To force a mother to bring such a fetus to term, to go through this hell is unconscionable.

Let us not forget how last November Dr. Caitlin Bernard was charged by a Republican attorney General in Indiana for her compassionate act of giving abortion medication to a 10 year old who was viciously raped in Ohio. We must make Hawaii a safe haven for women from anywhere without fear of cross state prosecution and we must ALSO protect our medical providers. If federal funds for clinics or procedures disappear we must make laws to compensate and protect these institutions.

If we are to be an enlightened society, not only must we allow women to control their own bodies, we must also ensure health care is available to all in need, of any age, of any gender and protect medical providers who protect us. I hope our wise legislature will expand funding and accessibility as abortions are only available on Maui and Oahu. Hawai`i, Kauai, Molokai and Lanai lack providers. We need to establish travel and housing funds for those geographically isolated from care because Health care is a human right, and no one should have their medical rights infringed upon simply because they can't afford to pay for a procedure.

In conclusion: I urge you to make laws based on sound science, compassion, respect for any person's reproductive rights, and not religious rhetoric. As a Democrat I ask you to please stand up against the slippery slope of the right wing radical Republican agenda that seeks to strip people of not only reproductive rights but also many other rights. Thank you both for hearing my testimony and for your dedication to our society.
