Re: SB 346 SD1 – Relating to the Emergency Vehicles

Dear Chair Rhoads, Vice-Chair Gabbard, and Honorable Committee members:

I serve as the President of the State of Hawaii Organization of Police Officers ("SHOPO") and write to you on behalf of our Union in **strong support** of SB 346 SD1. This bill amends HRS § 291C-26(c) to make the use of emergency sirens by authorized emergency vehicles discretionary.

As noted in the measure, the use of sirens by emergency vehicles can be and is necessary to alert other vehicles and pedestrians that an emergency vehicle is exercising its authority to disregard certain traffic laws. However, use of the sirens is not always necessary or mandatory. The unnecessary use of a siren contributes to noise pollution, especially in heavily-congested residential areas. Further, providing emergency responders like police officers with the discretion to use their sirens will alleviate noise pollution, the unnecessary disturbance of our citizens who are sleeping at night when the streets are empty of cars and pedestrians, as well as curb unnecessary traffic situations and panic. This Act will provide much needed flexibility in the use of sirens by emergency response vehicles in certain circumstances.

We thank you for allowing us to be heard on this very important issue and hope your committee will unanimously support this bill and allow this bill to take effect upon its approval.

Resolution for Reducing Siren Noise in Waikiki

Whereas sirens do NOT significantly increase the timely delivery of patients to hospitals; (1)

Whereas sirens do NOT significantly increase the timely arrival of fire personnel to accident sites; (1)

Whereas civilian safety is NOT enhanced by siren use; (2)

Whereas ambulance use of sirens is associated with increased risk of ambulance crashes. (3,5)

Whereas many motorists cannot hear sirens due to driving habits; (4)

Whereas limiting use of sirens will DECREASE risk of injury and death; (6)

Whereas siren use has LITTLE bearing on patient outcomes; (2)(7)

Whereas traffic in Waikiki is significantly reduced between the hours of 10 pm and 5 am;

Whereas fire and EMT sirens are a daily occurrence that create significant disturbances;

Whereas such disturbances greatly affect the peace and sleep patterns of residents in Waikiki;

Resolved, that the Waikiki Community Council urges the Honolulu Fire Department to eliminate

the deployment of sirens between the hours of 10 pm and 5 am.

Further, the Waikiki Community Council urges the Honolulu Fire Department to re-examine its coding policy in order to reduce the number of code three extreme emergency dispatches during all hours, day and night.
