Chair Tarnas, Vice Chair Takayama, and members of the Committee:

The Department of Law Enforcement (DLE) strongly supports Senate Bill 821, SD1.

This bill establishes an illegal fireworks task force to plan, coordinate, and engage in law enforcement operations to interdict illegal fireworks, develop a comprehensive strategic plan to stop the importation of illegal fireworks and explosives into Hawaii, promote compliance with the state fireworks control laws, and ensure the safety and security of airports, harbors, and other facilities and institutions in the State against the discharge of illegal fireworks and explosives.

This bill is intended to bring together the Department of Law Enforcement, Attorney General, Harbors division of the Department of Transportation, county chiefs of police, county prosecutors, and various federal law enforcement agencies to attack the illegal fireworks problem collectively and cooperatively through joint agency law enforcement operations and investigations and the development of a comprehensive plan with findings, recommendations, and any proposed legislation for the Legislature.

The Illegal Fireworks Task Force contemplated in this bill is focused on concerted multi-jurisdictional law enforcement efforts to investigate, interdict, arrest, and

prosecute those violating county, State, and federal fireworks laws. The DLE has already initiated cooperative dialog with appropriate law enforcement agencies and will continue to develop the law enforcement relationships needed to for successful operations and the development of an appropriate strategic plan and recommendations to the Legislature as contemplated by this bill.

Aloha, Chair David Tarnas and Vice Chair Gregg Takayama, Chair Donovan Dela Cruz and respective Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs committee members. Thank you for allowing me the opportunity to provide testimony in support of SB498 SD1 in preparation of the hearing on Thursday, March 16, 2023 at 2:00 PM. I am Chair for the Pearl City Neighborhood Board No. 21; I am submitting this testimony representing our board as a whole and the numerous residents in Pearl City and the island of Oahu who are negatively impacted by illegal aerial fireworks. On January 25, 2022, the Pearl City Neighborhood Board unanimously passed a Fireworks Resolution specifically requesting the Hawaii Congressional and Legislative Representatives to request the Federal Government Law Enforcement Agencies to employ their resources to stop the tons of illegal fireworks being transported to Hawaii.

Numerous Hawaii residents have complained about illegal aerial fireworks that are negatively impacting their daily lives with bad actor neighbors and individuals launching low altitude extremely loud aerial bomb firework explosions at all hours of the day, all year around and primarily targeting neighborhoods late evenings while people are resting or at sleep. Bad actor individuals have modified illegal fireworks into Improvised Explosive Devices (IED) such as pipe bombs to create a much greater low altitude loud explosions which severely impacts the health and safety of the elderly in care homes, disabled Vets with PTSD, children and family pets with some pets running away from home and being hit by vehicles.

SB821 SD1 establishes an Illegal Fireworks Task Force within the Department of Law Enforcement to plan, coordinate, and engage in law enforcement operations to interdict illegal fireworks, develop a comprehensive strategic plan to stop the importation of illegal fireworks and explosives into the State, promote compliance with the fireworks control laws, and ensure the safety and security of airports, harbors, and other facilities and institutions in the State against the discharge of illegal fireworks and explosives.

The Pearl City Neighborhood Board is in strong support of SB498 SD1 with establishing a Task Force but with limited, selective members. The engagement plan should employ Federal agencies because we believe the best solution is targeting the organized crime ring that is making millions of dollars from the Trojan Horse containers repacked in the mainland. The Federal Government agencies have the capability to track containers and those suspect containers could be targeted on the West Coast prior to the containers being shipped to Hawaii thus reducing the number of containers that have to be inspected in Hawaii. We most strongly urge you to pass SB821 SD1 because this action would mitigate the number of fireworks getting into the bad actors' hands. Mahalo!

Thank you for the opportunity to submit testimony on behalf of Young Brothers, LLC ("YB") offering comments and <u>amendments</u> for Senate Bill 821, S.D. 1 – Relating to Fireworks.

YB is a common carrier by water, transporting property by tug and barge between the islands of Oahu, Hawaii, Kauai, Maui, Molokai, and Lanai. YB is currently the only water common carrier authorized to transport property under Chapter 271G, Hawaii Revised Statues ("HRS") (i.e., the Hawaii Water Carrier Act), subject to the regulatory authority of the Public Utilities Commission of the State of Hawaii ("PUC"). Since 1900, customers across Hawaii have relied on YB's frequent, regular, and universal sailings to serve as the bridge that connects all communities in this island-state.

This measure would establish the Illegal Fireworks Task Force ("Task Force") within the Department of Law Enforcement to develop a comprehensive plan to address illegal fireworks.

As an island state, Hawaii is very dependent upon our commercial harbors to ensure the continued and unimpeded flow of cargo in and out of our State. It is estimated that over 90 percent Hawaii's imported goods pass through our commercial harbors, including consumer goods, motor vehicles, construction materials, and fuel. On behalf of the Hawaiian Humane Society, thank you for considering our support for Senate Bill 821, SD1, which appropriates funds to the Department of Law Enforcement for the purchase of drones to monitor the use of illegal fireworks.

Hawaiian Humane supports any attempt to remove fireworks from residential neighborhoods by keeping these dangerous products out of our state entirely and/or enhancing enforcement. At what should be joyous times for local families, illegal fireworks fill our neighborhoods with unexpected explosions that terrorize pets and people alike.

We support the intention to give law enforcement modern tools to aid in collecting the evidence necessary to prosecute those responsible for the bombing of our neighborhoods.

Hawaiian Humane has long educated our community about keeping pets safe from the terror of fireworks around New Years and July 4, but these bombs increasingly go off for months at a time. That makes it impossible for pet owners to prepare and creates sustained stress on people and animals, which can do lasting damage to their emotional and physical health. Neither people nor animals should have to take tranquilizers just to survive the impacts of illegal behavior by their neighbors.

Aloha Chair, Vice Chair and Committee Members,

I **STRONGLY SUPPORT SB821 SD1** that establishes the Illegal Fireworks Task Force within the Department of Law Enforcement.

This year will be 12 years since a ban was enacted to stop illegal fireworks. The current laws are not working because it is out of control and overwhelming for enforcement. Another big concern are cases NOT being PROSECUTED.

The 13,449 pounds of illegal fireworks confiscated in August 2022 by Coast Guard inspectors is evidence of the amount entering our Honolulu ports. The Multi-Agency Strike Force Operation that included several Federal and State agencies, shows this can work to increase port security and eventually curtail the amount of illegal fireworks entering our state. Inspections at ports could provide leads to those illegally importing and selling.

It is March and fireworks can still be heard every now and then. People think it is OK to celebrate funerals with illegal types of fireworks and no permit. On February 12th, Super Bowl Sunday, there was quite a bit of fireworks, and a man in Kaneohe sustained serious injuries when a firework exploded in a cinder block causing serious injuries to his body and knee. More recently on March 7th, three individuals were shot in Ewa. A man holding a get-together to introduce his 2-month old infant to family, heard his neighbor set off a couple of fireworks. He told the neighbor that he can't be doing that here, and the neighbor entered the property and shot him, a friend, and his father-in-law. With fireworks going off anytime it is difficult to determine if it is shots from a weapon or fireworks.

Every year complaints are growing. Injuries, fatalities, pollution, health concerns, property damage, noise pollution, harm to animals and pets. The aerials and the bombs are the worst. I have pictures of the debris that I've collected that land and scatter all over my yard and roof. No sense saving it to turn-in because they are spent fireworks, and because they exploded in the sky from a street over, I can't use it as evidence. Am I supposed to walk around the block to get video and risk getting hit by fireworks, receive threats, or possible retaliation? People are not the same. Many of the tubes have chemical hunks still stuck in them. They are toxic to animals. One year it tore one of our screens. Remember the incident in Ewa that shattered multiple car windows and damaged two cars, one so bad it could no longer be driven? I wonder who has to

pay for all this damage? What about solar panels? What about the fatalities and serious injuries? Are they so soon forgotten?

The community needs to be better protected. The amount of illegal fireworks entering the state needs to be reduced so effective enforcement and prosecution can take place.
