During emergencies, it is imperative Blood Bank of Hawaii (BBH) has a robust inventory of blood and related products to respond to demand resulting from disaster-related injuries and surgeries. The technology and equipment will also ensure BBH operates a facility equipped with advanced technology essential to recruiting, training and maintaining a highly skilled and specialized workforce.

II. Background and Summary

1. A brief description of the applicant's background;

Every day, hundreds of patients rely on the Blood Bank of Hawaii (BBH) to deliver safe and reliable blood, critical for their survival. BBH opened its doors in February 1941 on the grounds of what is now The Queen's Medical Center. Known then as Honolulu Blood-Plasma Bank, its name was officially changed to Blood Bank of Hawaii in 1946.

As stewards of the entire state's blood supply and an integral part of the healthcare industry, BBH services often mean the difference between life and death, helping ensure hospitals throughout Hawaii have critical access to a supply of safe and diversified blood 24/7 for lifesaving surgeries and other treatment. This diversification is essential since Hawaii's unique ethnic population has been nationally recognized as a source for many types of rare blood. BBH is the sole supplier of blood and blood components for all hospitals throughout the State. This year marks the 82nd anniversary of serving Hawaii's communities.

2. The goals and objectives related to the request;

BBH anticipates the following overall Goal and Objectives of this capital project:

GOAL: To ensure BBH's new 19,000 sf headquarters and FDA Biosafe Level 2 facility is equipped with state-of-the-art Blood Manufacturing Technology and Equipment essential for healthcare providers to perform advanced medical treatment for patients throughout Hawaii when needed.

OBJECTIVES

- To enable BBH to screen 100% of blood donations to identify rare blood found primarily among Pacific Islanders, Japanese and other Asian ethnicities. The Technology and Equipment will facilitate expansion of BBH's repository of rare blood that will save lives, particularly since life-saving surgeries and cancer treatments can only be initiated with compatible blood.
- 2. To strengthen the State's Emergency Preparedness Response by ensuring BBH maintains a safe and robust inventory of blood and related products essential to remaining on the forefront of potential disasters.
- 3. To equip the new facility with advanced technology critical to recruiting, training and maintaining a highly skilled and specialized workforce.
- 3. The public purpose and need to be served;

BBH tirelessly works to ensure a safe and reliable blood supply for Hawaii, an integral part of the infrastructure required for hospital programs. BBH services mean the difference between life and death for patients of organ transplant facilities, trauma centers, neonatal/pediatric ICUs, oncology centers and facilities where heart surgeries are performed. Without a safe, adequate supply of blood in Hawaii, residents who suffer a heart attack or are victims of traffic accidents may be unable to receive critical surgeries to save their lives.

BBH is essential for emergency preparedness in Hawaii due to its unique geographical location, susceptibility to natural disasters and the need for a consistent and readily available blood supply to treat injuries and save lives during times of crisis. Because of Hawaii's remote location, it is essential people have an ample supply of safe blood when they need it most, particularly since 1 in 7 persons entering a hospital will need blood. Both during and after emergencies, the demand for blood increases significantly due to injuries and surgeries resulting from disasters. A blood bank with a robust inventory can handle this surge in demand more effectively.

Hawaii is becoming increasingly susceptible to natural disasters, such as hurricanes, earthquakes, tsunamis and volcanic eruptions. As climate change intensifies, the risk of devastating wildfires like the destructive blaze that swept through Maui are expected to increase, with many drought-impacted communities statewide prone to severe threats. When disaster strikes, it is imperative BBH has readily available and well-stocked blood and related products to treat life-threatening injuries. Hawaii's location in the heart of the Pacific Ocean makes it challenging to quickly receive blood donations from other states in the event of a large-scale disaster. Through the purchase of Blood Manufacturing Technology and Equipment, BBH will be well-positioned to maintain an adequate supply of blood to ensure there is no delay in providing essential medical care to those in need during emergencies.

Hawaii requires a highly specialized healthcare workforce to respond to emergencies, but is currently facing a shortage of lab technicians, phlebotomists and other qualified personnel. In response, BBH is expanding its vision by developing a collaborative, integrated school curriculum for the next generation for Hawaii's healthcare workforce, providing embedded education, hands-on training and employment opportunities for high school graduates into much-needed allied health and medical technology careers.


Our new headquarters and FDA Biosafe Level 2 facility will provide the type of high-tech laboratory and equipment necessary to build capacity through workforce development. The pandemic taught us how vulnerable the state is without a qualified healthcare workforce, particularly those specialized to operate BBH and local medial centers essential to ensuring an ample supply of blood and related products for Hawaii's patient needs. The Blood Manufacturing Technology and Equipment will enhance BBH efforts to recruit, train and retain this type of specialized workforce through implementation of advanced technological tools.

4. Describe the target population to be served; and

Every 2 seconds someone in Hawaii needs blood for a life-saving treatment or emergency care. BBH is the sole blood provider for our State, serving all 18 hospitals and all of Hawaii's patients' blood needs, including those on the neighbor islands (Hawaii Island, Maui, Molokai, Lanai, and Kauai). Lives depend on BBH operating 24/7. Without blood, hospital programs including trauma, neonatal/pediatric ICU services, cancer centers, organ transplants and other life saving treatments could not exist, and importing blood from the mainland is unreliable and cost prohibitive.

5. Describe the geographic coverage.

BBH is the sole blood provider serving hospitals on the six main islands in Hawaii and provides supplemental support for Tripler Army Medical Center. Below is a map of the geographic coverage.

If State GIA funds are awarded, the project will be ready to start and draw down funds immediately, with purchase of Blood Manufacturing Technology and Equipment slated for completion within 12 months from receiving the Notice to Proceed.

Celebrating over 80 years as the sole provider of blood to hospitals throughout Hawaii, BBH has extensive experience in successfully collecting and distributing blood statewide, conducting mobile and fixed site operations and effectively recruiting donors to draw sufficient blood to meet hospitals' needs.

BBH adheres to the highest standards of safety and quality, continuing our long commitment to providing a safe and adequate blood supply for Hawaii's patients. We

have demonstrable success in implementation of automated collection programs such as platelet collections, double red cell and plasma collections as a part of our universal blood collection program, and most recently COVID convalescent plasma (CCP). In 2014 we achieved 100% automation for platelets and effectively implemented automated double red cell (2RBC) collections in 2018. By mid-2019, BBH was the US blood bank leader in utilization of automated red cell collection devices, presenting our performance data at a national meeting. In April 2020, we implemented CCP collections and distributed over 1,000 doses to COVID-19 patients at the height of the pandemic.

In early January 2016, The Blood Bank of Hawaii completed a \$1,500,000 renovation project to open its new primary donor center in Honolulu after its Dillingham location was closed due to planned construction of the Honolulu rail transit project. The new facility on Young Street more than doubled the donor capacity, ensuring donor collections did not impact blood product supply for patients in Hawaii. The new facility also enabled BBH to enhance the donor experience, offering personalized entertainment on iPads so donors can watch Netflix, respond to emails or read books while they wait. The new Center was completed on time and on budget. Annual blood collections at the Young Street Donor Center have increased 400% compared to pre-renovation.

2. Facilities

As BBH responded to challenges at our Dillingham Headquarters brought on by the City and County of Honolulu's rail plan, a bold new vision was created to manage escalating maintenance costs, the looming rail project and rapidly advancing medical technologies that the current aged facility is unable to accommodate. Having analyzed all available options, and as Hawaii's major healthcare facilities expand to West Oahu, BBH purchased a property in this growing community to serve as its new permanent home. This statewide headquarters will be supported by the current donor center in Mo`ili`ili, mobile operations and Neighbor Island blood drives.

Dr. Kim-Anh Nguyen has served as president and CEO of the Blood Bank of Hawaii since 2013. Dr. Nguyen came from San Francisco, where she was medical director of

the Blood Centers of the Pacific for eight years and concurrently served as chief medical officer of the Western Region for United Blood Services. Nguyen has also served as an associate clinical professor for the Department of Laboratory Medicine at University of California at San Francisco, and as the program director of Blood Centers of the Pacific/UCSF's Transfusion Medicine Fellowship. She holds a bachelor's degree in biochemical sciences from Harvard University and received doctorate degrees in medicine and immunology from the University of Pennsylvania.

In addition, the Board of Trustees of Blood Bank of Hawaii is comprised of community leaders who have experience in the management of a variety of capital improvement projects.

With over 80 years of serving Hawaii's community, BBH has consistently met all criteria and maintained seamless licensure and accreditation with the leading regulatory agencies and organizations – U.S. Food and Drug Administration, AABB (American Association of Blood Banks) and Clinical Laboratory Improvement Amendments.

Federal Drug Administration (FDA)

FDA licensure enables BBH to collect, manufacture, test, store and distribute blood components. Maintenance of licensure requires compliance with all federal regulations and successful outcomes of routine unannounced inspections.

AABB (Association for the Advancement of Blood & Biotherapies)

BBH is a founding member of AABB, supporting its mission to establish and promote the highest standard of care for patients and donors in all aspects of blood banking. AABB accreditation involves the most stringent industry standards among all clinical laboratories, including regular unannounced inspections. Although participation in AABB accreditation inspections is voluntary, continued accreditation is the gold standard in the international blood banking industry. BBH has been continuously accredited by AABB.

CLIA (Clinical Laboratories Improvement Amendments) and Clinical Laboratory Licenses

In addition to collecting and processing blood, BBH also performs clinical diagnostic testing, which require national and state certification. CLIA and Hawaii Clinical Laboratory certification ensures quality diagnostic laboratory testing with periodic unannounced audits to verify compliance.

America's Blood Centers (ABC)

BBH is a founding member of ABC, a network of independent community blood centers that collect half of the nation's blood supply. It serves as a valuable education and networking resource. ABC is also active on the political front, monitoring important legislative issues facing the transfusion medicine community and responding to legislative initiatives that affect blood banking.
