II. Background and Summary

Hawaii Theatre has significantly influenced Honolulu's cultural landscape since 1922. The mission of the nonprofit Hawaii Theatre Center, established in 1984, is to provide a broad range of entertainment, cultural, and educational experiences; promote redevelopment and revitalization of downtown Honolulu and Chinatown; and enhance the quality of life in Honolulu.

The historic Hawaii Theatre is owned and operated by the Hawaii Theatre Center, a 501(c)3 nonprofit organization, and hosts over 100,000 guests annually. Over the years, the Hawaii Theatre has actively engaged in projects that celebrate and safeguard our community's artistic and historical legacy. The Robert Morton Theatre Organ has been synonymous with the Hawaii Theatre for decades. It has a rich history that is significant to the State of Hawaii as it was originally built for the Princess Theatre in Honolulu and then relocated to the Hawaii Theatre in Honolulu in 1969 and has always been a staple attraction throughout the decades.

The Robert Morton Theatre Organ, a cultural and historical masterpiece, has been integral to our community's artistic heritage for decades. In 2019, the pandemic and the reduced staff required to maintain the organization left the physical theatre vulnerable, leading to flood damage and disrepair of the organ. Posing a threat to its cultural significance and historical value, the Hawaii Theatre urgently seeks \$250,000 in grant funding to undertake a comprehensive restoration of The Robert Morton Theatre Organ that totals over \$1.5 million in repairs.

Our primary goal is to restore The Robert Morton Theatre Organ to its original glory utilizing professional services, ensuring its continued contribution to our community's cultural tapestry with technological updates promising the life of this instrument will continue on for generations living and visiting Hawaii to enjoy. The specific costs primarily include: Comprehensive assessment and documentation of the damage, precise repair and replacement of damaged components, aesthetic restoration to preserve the organ's historical charm and implement preventative measures to safeguard against future environmental risks and general usage.

Public Purpose and Need to be Served: The restoration of The Robert Morton Theatre Organ serves a crucial public purpose by:

- Preserving a unique cultural asset that holds historical significance for our community.
- Revitalizing community engagement and pride through the restoration of a beloved artistic centerpiece.
- Contributing to the economic and cultural vitality of our region by attracting audiences and supporting local businesses.

Target Population to be Served: The restoration project targets our entire community, with a focus on:

- Tourism and visitors who associate the historic organ with the 101-year old Hawaii Theatre bringing back one of Hawaii's historic buildings back into the spotlight for local communities as well as on a global scale.
- Music enthusiasts and patrons of the arts who value and appreciate the cultural significance of The Robert Morton Theatre Organ.
- Students and educators who will benefit from educational programs centered around the history and place in Hawaii of this iconic instrument.
- Local businesses in Chinatown that stand to gain from increased foot traffic and economic activity generated by a fully functional theatre organ.

Geographic Coverage: While the immediately impact Oahu, predominantly the Honolulu and outlying areas, the restoration of The Robert Morton Theatre Organ will have a ripple effect, reaching a broad and diverse population within our community and encompassing tourism on the state and neighbor islands as a whole. Revitalization adds another place to visit on the maps of visitors to further enrich their knowledge and experience of Hawaii.

III. Service Summary and Outcomes

1. Cultural Preservation and Heritage Restoration:

• The restoration project will safeguard and restore a key cultural asset, preserving its historical significance for future generations.

2. Community Revitalization:

• A fully functional organ will reinvigorate community engagement and foster a renewed sense of pride in our cultural heritage with the organ's rich history reincorporated into the theatre's tour program and shows.

3. Economic Impact:

The Hawaii Theatre is a major economic driver in the Honolulu area and the state as a
whole at times bringing in tens of thousands of patrons on a monthly basis. A restored
theatre organ will attract audiences, contributing to increased foot traffic in the area
and benefiting local businesses.

4. Educational Opportunities:

 The project will create educational programs in addition to the existing tours the Hawaii Theatre provides, offering insights into the history and craftsmanship of The Robert Morton Theatre Organ, enriching the learning experiences of students and community members.

IV Financial

The total amount of the \$1.526,000 organ restoration is as follows:

1. Assessment and Damage Evaluation \$156,000

- Engage professional assessors and restoration experts to conduct a detailed evaluation of the damage inflicted by the flooding.
- Develop a comprehensive report outlining the specific components affected and the required restoration measures.

2. Repair and Replacement of Components \$767,000

- Procure high-quality replacement components for those irreparably damaged, ensuring the organ's full functionality is restored.
- Employ skilled craftsmen and technicians to carry out precision repairs, adhering to the highest standards of organ restoration.

3. Aesthetic Restoration \$542,000

- Undertake meticulous restoration of the organ's aesthetic features, preserving its historical charm and visual appeal.
- Collaborate with experienced artisans to recreate any intricate details that may have been lost or damaged during the flooding.

4. Travel and Lodging \$35,000:

- Airfare for consultation and on-site inspection.
- Lodging for specialists at consultation phase and removal of sensitive aged components

IV Financial cont'd

The \$250,000 funds requested will be allocated to the initial fees and costs associated with assessment and evaluation (\$156,000), Travel and Lodging (\$77,000), and remaining \$17,000 toward Aesthetic Restoration.

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V. Experience and Capability

Gregory Dunn, President and CEO of Hawaii Theatre has been working directly with Rosales Organ Builders closely for the past 2 years to ensure the unique and aged Robert Morton organ is properly restored by an organization with experience. Dunn, a seasoned theatre management professional and musician, understands the demands of instrument rebuilding and has taken the lead on direction with Rosales.

Manuel Rosales, founder of Rosales Organ Builders is a leader in the preservation of historic organs, particularly the instruments of pioneer Los Angeles organ builder Murray M. Harris. He served as a consultant for the restoration of the Harris organ at Stanford University, and as the project consultant for the restoration and reinstallation of a 1911 Harris organ at St. James' Episcopal Church in Los Angeles. Currently he serves on the technical advisory board for the restoration of the Wanamaker Organ at the Lord & Taylor Department Store in Philadelphia, at whose core is a 1904 Murray M. Harris of 146 stops.

Manuel is a member of the International Society of Organbuilders (ISO) and the American Institute of Organbuilders (AIO). He is also a founding member of the Pacific Southwest Chapter of the Organ Historical Society (OHS), a past national councilor for the Organ Historical Society, and served as a member of the executive committee of the former Pasadena Chapter of the American Guild of Organists. In 1998 he joined the board of directors of the Ruth and Clarence Mader Memorial Scholarship Fund.

VI. Personnel: Project Organization and Staffing

Qualification of Key Staff

Gregory D. Dunn, President, and CEO

Gregory D. Dunn is the Hawaii Theatre Center President & Chief Executive Officer, where he is responsible for ensuring Hawaii Theatre's success and future growth, including the advancement of its mission and vision and the daily action of living and promoting the Theatre's values.

Previously the President and CEO of Hawaii's Better Business Bureau (BBB), Dunn oversaw all aspects of the organization and its 501 (c)(3) foundation, including the recent merger to create a larger, stronger BBB of the Northwest and the Pacific. This provides Hawaii's 2,500 plus BBB Accredited Business members' access to a broad range of benefits and services.

Before the BBB, Dunn served as the Vice President of Operations for the privately-held Hawaii-based real estate investment firm Fair Horizon, LLC. Dunn spearheaded the organization's residential property acquisition and sales divisions. For the prior nine years, he was the Executive Director of the Hawaii Nature Center, where he enacted an expansion of the center's programs on Maui and developed a satellite location on the Island of Kauai.

Dunn has worked extensively with Rosales Organ Builders and other specialty industry professionals to ensure the careful restoration of the one-of-a-kind organ. Having a background in entertainment management and an enthusiast of historical musical instruments, he has built the template to safeguard all components of the Hawaii Theatre as well as the preservation operating procedures moving forward.


Ron McDaniel, Director of Communications

Ron McDaniel joined the Hawaii Theatre Center in October 2020 and is the current Director of Communications. McDaniel is responsible for creating and managing the ticket sites for each show, graphic design, digital communications, social media, content creation, website maintenance, production management and more. McDaniel brings four years of digital marketing, content creation, and graphic design having worked for multiple local and national companies and will direct Marketing efforts to ensure engagement with the organ is shared and relevant to visitors and community.

Carl Anderson, Director of Development

Carl Anderson is the newly hired leader directing all aspects of grants, sponsorship, membership and donations for the Hawaii Theatre Center. Previously a managing the prestigious Private Bank and Kala'i Services clientele at the Bank of Hawaii, Anderson was also responsible for record-breaking annual giving campaign and working directly with non-profit beneficiaries of the Bank of Hawaii Foundation. Anderson will continue to raise funds and generate continuous support to maintain the rebuilt organ.

- Rosales Organ Builders is a licensed specialty organ builder and repairs and accredited through the International Society of Organ Builders and American Institute of Organ Builders.
- 3. Private Educational Institutions The grant request will not benefit any sectarian or non-sectarian private educational institution.

Sustainability Plan

The Hawaii Theatre will enlist a comprehensive plan and schedule in partnership with Rosales Organ Builders to ensure the longevity of the rebuilt organ. This will be fostered by engagement with local aficionados and community to help support through awareness and donation.

Production manager Janelle lechad will be committed to the preservation and will manage the storage of this precious instrument on a daily basis along with the artisans who play and share our commitment to the preservation of this organ.

A budget of \$10,000 per year will be set as a goal for Carl Anderson to continue to raise funds annually through sponsorships, campaigns, and individual donors to preserve the longevity of the new rebuilt organ.

Regular maintenance will be scheduled annually for Rosales Organ Builders to inspect and maintain the organ to keep it in optimal condition including: tuning, cleaning, and standard wear and tear.

As the organ will once again become the centerpiece to this historical theatre, training and education will be provided for staff and volunteers as well as educating visitors and the community about the historical significance and cultural importance of the instrument.

Development will foster community involvement by organizing events, concerts and educational programs that showcase the organ and local musicians will be encouraged to use, collaborate and talk about the importance of the organ.

Partnerships with music organizations like the Aloha Chapter of the American Theatre Organ Society (ATOS), music schools and cultural institutions to enhance programming and share resources. These collaborative efforts will contribute to the sustainability of the organ in addition to monetary support that will be garnered.

The maintenance will be documented adding to the rich history of the organ. Being the stewards of this instrument, the Hawaii Theatre will create archives that will live both physically and digitally to preserve this information for future generations, researchers and enthusiasts.

With the generosity and foresight of the State of Hawaii, the Hawaii Theatre will utilize the funds necessary to safeguard and ensure that the Robert Morton organ remains a vibrant and cherished part of the community for years to come.
