HOPE Services Hawaii, Inc. (HOPE Services, HOPE) provides a provision of free, public programs and services for those at imminent risk of, experiencing, and overcoming homelessness in Hawai'i County. For HOPE, our most urgent and ongoing goal is to make homelessness more rare, brief and nonrecurring on Hawai'i Island. We believe that everyone deserves a home, and our work aims to improve the conditions in which people live by increasing their access to and stabilization in housing. Housing is **the** solution to homelessness.

In 2023, HOPE provided housing-focused services to more than 800 households with a median monthly income of \$1,000.00. The existing affordable housing inventory on Hawai'i Island is not sufficient to meet the needs of low-income families and individuals. This request will establish a multi-generational housing campus (serving families and seniors) to provide truly affordable housing for our unhoused community.

Our request aims to increase the affordable housing inventory in Pahoa, district of Puna, Hawai'i Island. The goal of our request is to execute effective site preparation of approximately 10 acres of land. The objectives of this request include clearing and demolition, grading and excavation, and storm water management. Effective site preparation is critical for the success of future housing development, as it sets the foundation for safe and sustainable construction while adhering to local regulations and community needs.

II. Background and Summary

1. A brief description of the applicant's background;

Beginning in 1986, the Office for Social Ministry of the Roman Catholic Church in the State of Hawai'i assumed the greatest response to much-needed services for families and individuals experiencing homelessness in Hawai'i County through the Care-a-Van Program. As the need for focused housing and support services increased alongside more prevalent rates of homelessness, HOPE Services Hawaii, Inc. (HOPE, HOPE Services) was created as a 501(c)(3) nonprofit affiliate organization, sustaining its relationship with faith-based organizations while employing a secular and non-denominational service approach. Since being established in 2010, HOPE has expanded its service capacity and evolved to identify and serve the most economically and socially disadvantaged populations across Hawai'i Island, providing specialized housing and support services for Hawai'i County's homeless population.

Alongside providing supported services for those experiencing homelessness, HOPE engages in systemic solutions, including advocacy and public education, community planning, coordinated entry systems, and specialized supportive services to keep formerly homeless people housed. To make a lasting difference in the lives of our participants, HOPE has been committed to leadership and collaborative opportunities that challenge conventional methods of providing social services and to pursuing opportunities that significantly reduce the incidence of homelessness.

Island-wide, HOPE serves people at imminent risk of experiencing and overcoming homelessness across Hawai'i Island through a continuum of services, including mobile outreach, street medicine, prevention and diversion, emergency shelter, rental assistance, housing location and case management, permanent supportive housing, representative payee services, bed stabilization, and medical respite. HOPE employs 106 staff to provide programs and services to our most vulnerable community members. In 2023, HOPE Services was identified as the 16th largest employer on Hawai'i Island, directly resulting from saying "yes" to delivering critical programming in our community.

2. The goals and objectives related to the request;

Our request aims to increase the affordable housing inventory in Pāhoa, district of Puna, Hawai'i Island. Our request aims to execute effective site preparation of approximately 10 acres of land. The objectives of this request include clearing and demolition, grading and excavation, and stormwater management. Effective site preparation is critical for the success of future housing development, as it sets the foundation for safe and sustainable construction while adhering to local regulations and community needs.

4. Describe the target population to be served; and

This request's population of focus are people experiencing homelessness, as defined by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD):

- 1) An individual or family who lacks a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence, meaning:
 - a) An individual or family with a primary nighttime residence that is a public or private place not designed for or ordinarily used as a regular sleeping accommodation for human beings, including a car, park, abandoned building, bus or train station, airport, or camping ground;
 - b) An individual or family living in a supervised publicly or privately operated shelter designated to provide temporary living arrangements (including congregate shelters, transitional housing, and hotels and motels paid for by charitable organizations or by federal, State, or local government programs for low-income individuals); or
 - c) An individual who is exiting an institution where he or she resided for 90 days or less and who resided in an emergency shelter or place not meant for human habitation immediately before entering that institution;
- 2) An individual or family who will imminently lose their primary nighttime residence, provided that:
 - a) The primary nighttime residence will be lost within 14 days of the date of application for homeless assistance;
 - b) No subsequent residence has been identified; and
 - c) The individual or family lacks the resources or support networks, *e.g.*, family, friends, faith-based or other social networks, needed to obtain other permanent housing;
- 3) Unaccompanied youth under 25 years of age, or families with children and youth, who do not otherwise qualify as homeless under this definition, but who:

- a) Are defined as homeless under section 387 of the Runaway and Homeless Youth Act (42 U.S.C. 5732a), section 637 of the Head Start Act (42 U.S.C. 9832), section 41403 of the Violence Against Women Act of 1994 (42 U.S.C. 14043e-2), section 330(h) of the Public Health Service Act (42 U.S.C. 254b(h)), section 3 of the Food and Nutrition Act of 2008 (7 U.S.C. 2012), section 17(b) of the Child Nutrition Act of 1966 (42 U.S.C. 1786(b)), or section 725 of the McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act (42 U.S.C. 11434a);
- b) Have not had a lease, ownership interest, or occupancy agreement in permanent housing at any time during the 60 days immediately preceding the date of application for homeless assistance;
- c) Have experienced persistent instability as measured by two moves or more during the 60-day period immediately preceding the date of applying for homeless assistance; and
- d) Can be expected to continue in such status for an extended period of time because of chronic disabilities; chronic physical health or mental health conditions; substance addiction; histories of domestic violence or childhood abuse (including neglect); the presence of a child or youth with a disability; or two or more barriers to employment, which include the lack of a high school degree or General Education Development (GED), illiteracy, low English proficiency, a history of incarceration or detention for criminal activity, and a history of unstable employment; or
- 4) Any individual or family who:
 - a) Is fleeing, or is attempting to flee, domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, stalking, or other dangerous or life-threatening conditions that relate to violence against the individual or a family member, including a child, that has either taken place within the individual's or family's primary nighttime residence or has made the individual or family afraid to return to their primary nighttime residence:
 - b) Has no other residence; and
 - c) Lacks the resources or support networks, e.g., family, friends, and faith-based or other social networks, to obtain other permanent housing.

5. Describe the geographic coverage.

While this housing campus resides in Pāhoa, in the District of Puna, it will be an affordable housing option accessible to people experiencing homelessness within any community on Hawai'i Island.

V. Experience and Capability

1. Necessary Skills and Experience

HOPE Services is a trusted provider with more than twenty (20) years of experience in planning, administering, implementing, and evaluating homeless services. A list of contracts stating verifiable experience with programs and services related to this request – and which have been awarded (and are current) in the most recent three years, demonstrating uninterrupted longevity of key homeless programs – are included in response to Section IV., prompt 5.

HOPE is uniquely experienced to ensure that the people we serve have a supportive pathway to end their homelessness and to remain stabilized in housing. HOPE Services has a proven track record of delivering trauma-informed programs and services to houseless community members, and those experiencing housing instability. HOPE has been the provider of choice by the State of Hawai'i Homeless Programs Office to implement multiple, systemized interventions that meet people where they are, and has recently elevated regional Continuums of Care (CoC) as one of eight CoCs nationally who were awarded both rural and unsheltered set-aside funding through HUD's Special Notice of Funding Opportunity in 2023.

HOPE Services has successfully administered capital projects through federal Community Development Block Grants (CBBG) funding for three years, from 2018-2020, ensuring critical construction improvements at two (2) shelter sites in Hilo.

At this request's project site, HOPE has successfully administered philanthropic funding in site work, construction, and permitting processes, with the outcome of the Sacred Heart Affordable Housing Project (SHAHP), twelve (12) affordable housing units, completed in 2023. SHAHP represents a successful private-public partnership with Hawai'i Island Community Development Corporation and HPM Building Supply to test county permitting processes for affordable housing options.

Fiscal and Administrative Controls

As a trusted federally, state, and county-funded nonprofit, HOPE Services has established fiscal and administrative practices to manage contracts properly. HOPE Services uses the MIP Fund Accounting System to process and record accounts receivable, accounts payable, and billing — ensuring HOPE provides complete, accurate, and timely fiscal reports. An established Financial Procedures Manual guides our protocol to ensure reasonable costs, proper allocation, and requisite accounting systems. In compliance with 2 CFR 200, HOPE has completed and received nine (9) consecutive, clean, and unmodified independent financial audits. Our most recent audit for the period ending August 31, 2022, prepared by Carbonaro CPAs and Management Group,

presented unmodified reports reflecting the reliability of HOPE's accounting system, practices and financial records, and qualifying HOPE Services as a low-risk auditee.

2. Facilities

The Sacred Heart Community for Kūpuna (SHC) is a campus in Pāhoa serving kūpuna, or elderly, experiencing and overcoming homelessness. SHC is inclusive of

- 1) Sacred Heart Shelter comprising 10 micro-unit emergency shelters and 10 micro-unit single-room occupancy rental units;
- 2) the Sacred Heart Affordable Housing Program (SHAHP), inclusive of 12 efficiency studio rental units, a new housing development to ensure vulnerable kūpuna can age in dignity and community; and
- 3) the Sacred Heart Resource Center (SHRC), an integrated multi-purpose community space on-site.

SHC is the outcome of community collaboration and public-private-philanthropic partnership, most critically in response to the 2018 lower Puna lava eruptions when, in June 2018, more than 200 local businesses and community members came together to construct the Sacred Heart Shelter, providing emergency housing for kūpuna displaced by the lava eruptions.

SHC remains in place for continued homeless services, and is owned by HOPE Services Hawaii, Inc.

VI. Personnel: Project Organization and Staffing

1. Proposed Staffing, Staff Qualifications, Supervision and Training

HOPE's mission, "We bring to life gospel values of justice, love, compassion and hope through service, empowerment, and advocacy," is realized through its leadership and commitment to making homelessness more rare, brief, and nonrecurring on Hawai'i Island.

HOPE's management structure falls under the CEO, with direction from the Governing Board of Directors. The CEO is the direct supervisor of the Director of Housing Development. The CEO, as a staff person, has sole authority to enter into contracts on behalf of the organization and is primarily responsible for ensuring all contracts are carried out in fidelity and compliance with all applicable statutes. HOPE Services' CEO, Brandee Menino, is a national expert panelist and speaker at Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) and National Alliance to End Homelessness (NAEH) conferences and a statewide leader on ending homelessness. Brandee possesses the skill and knowledge as chief executive to lead and manage the vision of HOPE and secure the necessary support, resources, and assets to enhance and align service delivery capacity with the core principles of Housing First, Coordinated Entry Systems, and Housing Prioritization. She has been the change agent in the community and the organization, leading the cultural shift from managing homelessness to ending homelessness through evidence-based practices. Brandee has more than 20 years of institutional knowledge and experience in mental health and crisis services and homeless and housing programs.

The Director of Housing Development oversees housing development and facilities management for Hope Services Hawaii, focusing on creating affordable housing options for low-income families and individuals, leading and managing housing and facilities projects, and collaborating with staff, community leaders, and stakeholders. HOPE's Director of Housing Development, Patrick Hurney, joined HOPE in 2023 after serving as Executive Director of Habitat for Humanity Hawai'i Island, with more than ten years of experience overseeing construction projects. Patrick has over twenty years of experience in the non-profit sector. He will serve as the project lead for this request.

HOPE has above-adequate staffing capacity and infrastructure to carry out the day-to-day service activities, program management, data tracking, reporting, and evaluative practices required by the Federal, State, and County human service contractors. To date, HOPE has fulfilled all government service contracts awarded and has passed all audit reviews with no findings currently unresolved. HOPE continues to be a trusted nonprofit service organization at all levels of government that manages public funds. It can be counted on to serve the community effectively and with integrity.



Funding for the Sacred Heart Community Project is limited by its location within a lava zone, precluding it from many federal funding sources available for construction. HOPE Services has been successful in raising \$1.7M in private funding for the Sacred Heart Community, however this project's sustainability requires continued philanthropic support and state and local funding, including the County of Hawai'i Affordable Housing Production Fund and the State of Hawai'i Kau Hale Funding initiative, when allowable for construction. HOPE Services will continue to seek allowable funding to increase affordable housing opportunities for low-income families and individuals with lived experience of homelessness.
