

Based on 2020 census data, the poverty rate in rural Hawai'i is 11.6%, compared with 8.2% in urban areas of the state. Of KMC's patient population, nearly 40% receive medical coverage through Medicare or Medicaid and almost 50% of patients are at the Federal Poverty Level. Despite KMC's ongoing efforts to expand service offerings and address gaps in patient care, many local residents continue to struggle with significant barriers to access, including compromised road conditions and notorious traffic patterns, as well as insufficient housing and very low income. The growing shortage of affordable housing and the challenges posed by the high cost of living are evident in the widespread prevalence of multigenerational housing seen across the islands. Census Bureau information shows that Hawaii ranks first in the nation for the highest percentage of multigenerational families living together in a single

II. Background and Summary

1. BRIEF DESCRIPTION OF THE APPLICANT'S BACKGROUND

Kahuku hospital was originally built by the Kahuku Plantation Company in 1899 to provide medical care for plantation workers and their families. The hospital served the communities of Kaaawa, Kahana, Laie, Kahuku, Waimea, and Pupukea, and was operated by the plantation management who hired the doctor and sent nurses to be trained in Honolulu. In 2006, Kahuku Hospital became Kahuku Medical Center, a notfor-profit 501(c)3, critical access hospital and rural health clinic, serving a patient population that spans the North Shore and Ko'olauloa regions. Today, Kahuku Medical Center remains the only hospital within a 30-mile radius, making it crucial for emergency and primary care services in the area. The center offers a range of services including family and internal medicine, pediatrics, dental health, physical and occupational rehabilitation, mental health, imaging, laboratory, podiatry, sports medicine, and preventive care.

Kahuku Medical Center provides quality healthcare, promotes wellness and is known for its culturally diverse, personal approach in the community.

2. GOALS AND OBJECTIVES RELATED TO THE REQUEST

As the only hospital providing both acute and skilled nursing care in a 30 mile radius within a rural setting, KMC aims to provide as many services as possible to our local community to reduce the burden of healthcare disparities and improve accessibility to

medical care. To achieve this, KMC's request is to use the capital grant to purchase 2 transport vehicles equipped to accommodate both wheelchairs and stretchers to provide transport for patients who do not have the financial resources to shoulder this cost when insurance does not cover it. Additionally, the implementation of an electronic medical record system that has the functionality needed to identify patients who are at risk for worsening of their chronic conditions due to inability to access medical care will help us improve the health of our local community.

3. PUBLIC PURPOSE AND THE NEED TO BE SERVED

As healthcare disparities are identified, we are determined develop a comprehensive strategy to address accessibility challenges related to social determinants of health specific to the community of Oahu's North Shore and Ko'olauloa region. One of the major barriers identified was lack of resources to cover transportation costs in the event that insurance did not cover the patient's transport from an acute facility to a skilled nursing facility. Additionally, when the patient was receiving nursing care at our facility and needed ongoing care from an outpatient specialist, again there is the lack of insurance coverage to transport the patient to their specialty medical appointment. Addressing those issues will play a pivotal role in overcoming transportation barriers, ensuring that residents, particularly those facing economic challenges due to lack of insurance coverage for transportation, have reliable means to reach healthcare facilities. By addressing transportation issues, we aim to bridge a significant gap in access, as lack of reliable transportation often exacerbates health disparities.

Simultaneously, the ability to gather and analyze data from our electronic medical system enables our ability to address social determinants of health by enhancing the overall quality and efficiency of healthcare services through data sharing and care management tools. The system will enable seamless information sharing among other healthcare providers in the area, facilitating more holistic and coordinated care. This technological upgrade is especially crucial in a community where comprehensive healthcare solutions are essential for identifying and tackling social determinants such as economic instability and limited access to specialty medical services due to transportation challenges.

In summary, the combined impact of improving transportation and our medical record system will not only improve physical access to medical services but also contribute to a more equitable and integrated healthcare approach, directly addressing social determinants of health prevalent in the North Shore and Ko'olauloa region.

For KMC's catchment area of the patient population, nearly 40% receive medical coverage through Medicare or Medicaid. Despite KMC's ongoing efforts to expand service offerings and address gaps in patient care, many local residents continue to

struggle with significant barriers to access, including compromised road conditions and notorious traffic patterns, as well as insufficient housing and very low income.

The growing shortage of affordable housing and the challenges posed by the high cost of living are evident in the widespread prevalence of multigenerational housing seen across the islands. Census Bureau information shows that Hawaii ranks first in the nation for the highest percentage of multigenerational families living together in a single household (7.7% of all households).

5. GEOGRAPHIC COVERAGE

As the primary medical provider on the North Shore and Ko'olauloa regions, KMC continues to fill a major role in providing health services to the local community and the Island of Oahu. The hospital, emergency room, and main family medicine clinic is located in Kahuku, with a satellite family medicine clinic located in Haleiwa, but is open to anyone with the primary target being residents along the coast from Kailua to Wahiawa.

III. Service Summary and Outcomes

1. & 2. SCOPE OF WORK, TASKS, RESPONSIBILITIES AND TIMELINE

KMC's Chief Operating Officer will work directly with vendors to ensure the vehicle and equipment purchased meet the specifications needed and are fit for purpose. The purchase will take place by June 2024 for deployment within the community by August 2024.

KMC's Chief Information Officer will work closely with contractors and clinical staff to implement a new electronic medical record that will kick off in March 2024 and planned go-live in December 2024.

3. QUALITY ASSURANCE AND EVALUATION PLANS

KMC has an active and robust quality improvement and compliance program. Quality and performance improvement activities of KMC represent an integrated multidisciplinary effort by all of its employees, including: Medical providers, clinical and non-clinical management, mid-management, and program managers are active in addressing quality management components at KMC through the following: Patient Care/Peer Review Committee; Quality Improvement Committee Compliance and Risk Management Committees; Rural Health Provider Committees; Disaster Preparedness Committee; Clinical Leadership Team; and the Executive Leadership Team. Improvement of the overall organization is addressed through the Quality Improvement Committee, the Executive Leadership Team, and the Board of Directors.

4. MEASURES OF EFFECTIVENESS

The effectiveness of the transport van deployment project will be measured by screening and claims data collected over time that shows a reduction in the occurrence rate of positive screens for transportation barriers. It will also include the number of times the transport vans are utilized to overcome those transportation barriers and cost-savings to community members.

For the electronic medical record implementation, the effectiveness will be measured by an increase in our HEDIS measurements and utilization of chronic care management as evidenced by claims data reflecting the organizations efforts to move towards value-based care.

KMC is requesting \$606,304 to purchase 2 transport vans and electronic medical record software to identify and address accessibility barriers within our community.

KMC has the required IT resources and quality leaders experienced in developing and implementing successful programs and initiatives.

2. FACILITIES

Kahuku Medical Center's main campus is located on approximately 7 acres of land on the North Shore of Oahu in the Ko'olauloa region, proudly serving 'ohana from Kualoa to Waimea. KMC Haleiwa, Kahuku Medical Center's satellite clinic constructed in 2022, provides easier access and healthcare equity to people of all ages, from keiki to kupuna, from Waimea to Waialua.
