The name of the requesting organization is Mental Health Kokua (MHK). The public purpose for the grant is affordable housing, and the services to be supported by the grant will be acquisition of real property to be used for permanent supported housing. The target group includes homeless adults with serious mental illness (SMI), >18 years old, with <30% area median income (AMI). The cost of the grant is \$3,000,000, matched by \$750,000 of private funds by MHK. MHK's operational budget is included in the grant.

II. Background and Summary

A brief description of the applicant's background;

Since 1973 Mental Health Kokua (MHK) has provided rehabilitative housing for adults with serious mental illness (SMI). MHK started with one house on Sierra Drive in Honolulu in 1973 serving homeless adults with SMI deinstitutionalized from the Hawaii State Hospital (HSH) with no services and nowhere to go. Today MHK has 50 locations on Kauai, Oahu, Maui, Hilo, and Kona providing

340 beds statewide, with >800 served in case management, and 2500 served by Punawai Rest Stop homeless hygiene center (Honolulu). SMI includes life-long mental illness, e.g., schizophrenia, bi-polar disorder, major depression with psychotic features, and PTSD. There is no cure for SMI, but as with other chronic medical illnesses, symptoms can be successfully managed with medication and lifestyle support. Since 1973 MHK's housing philosophy includes a group living, therapeutic community model where peers in recovery with mental illness support each other, gain skills for daily living, and learn daily routines for medication and life management.

In 1995 MHK opened Safe Haven, and HUD best practice model engaging homeless adults with SMI into supported housing. Today MHK applies a housing first, permanent supported housing model in partnership with Partners In Care, Oahu's HUD Continuum of Care to end homelessness.

MHK annually serves >3,000 adults with SMI, has more than 250 employees, with a budget of more than \$13 million annually in HUD federal grants, Hawaii State Dept. of Health contracts, and Hawaii health plan contracts.

2. The goals and objectives related to the request MHK proposes to:

- Purchase the Edwin Thomas Building, 41 S. Beretania St., Honolulu, HI 96813, with \$3,000,000 State GIA funds and \$750,000 MHK renovation funding.
- Create 27 single room occupancy rooms for homeless adults with SMI.
- Provide 24/7/365 staffing coverage.
- Create space in basement for MHK's administrative functions, e.g., accounting, leadership, information technology, human resources, etc.

The public purpose and need to be served

MHK will serve the public by creating 27 single room occupancy (SRO) units, and provide voluntary, permanent housing for homeless adults with serious mental illness. MHK will remove homeless adults with SMI from the streets of Oahu, improving the quality of life for persons served and community stakeholders by providing the target population with safe, permanent supportive housing. MHK has a 90% success rate sustaining housing for target population.

4. Describe the target population to be served

MHK's purchase of Edwin Thomas House will provide permanent supportive housing for adults >18 years old, with SMI. People are eligible even if their personal histories include one or more of the following: too little income (<30% AMI), a history of substance use, and criminal records. No prior treatment or conditions are required for housing eligibility. Participants meet HUD's definition of homelessness and are referred to MHK by Partners In Care (PIC) through the Coordinated Entry System (CES). MHK housing is voluntary, which means that

persons served must agree to become tenants/residents of MHK's community housing model of care.

5. Describe the geographic coverage

MHK's Edwin Thomas Home will provide housing for eligible Oahu citizens referred by Partners In Care (CoC) Coordinated Entry System (CES). Historically, MHK has served the following demographic populations: Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander = 29%

White = 29%

Asian = 42%

III. Service Summary and Outcomes

MHK's Edwin Thomas permanent supportive housing has tenant rules, including, visiting hours for guests are from 10am-6pm; no overnight guests are permitted; residents are responsible for the actions of their guests; residents are expected to make their beds daily and do their laundry weekly following the independent living laundry schedule; residents are expected to follow weekly chore list posted in the kitchen; new residents are required to wash their clothing and other items before moving in; residents are expected to treat each other as family, with dignity and respect. In addition to residents having a lease, MHK has a clinical relationship with each resident. If a resident breaks basic house rules MHK develops a behavioral plan to meet housing expectations. Finally, each resident is expected to have funding via a voucher or bed day unit of service, and personal income via entitlement, e.g., SSI. Residents usually earn less than 30% AMI and are expected to pay the HUD standard 30% of verified income.

3. <u>Describe its quality assurance and evaluation plans for the request. Specify how the applicant plans to monitor, evaluate, and improve their results:</u>

MHK maintains permanent supportive housing quality assurance and evaluation plans are based on CARF accreditation standards, and MHK's quality workflow: Each resident is screened for eligibility. Each resident signs a lease. Unit occupancy is tracked weekly by a bed-day occupancy report, including rent payment for 30% of verified income. Person-centered care plan goals are developed with each resident, tracked annually in electronic medical record weekly, and monitored by a licensed clinical supervisor. Satisfaction surveys of residents are tracked annually during person-centered care plan review. Annually MHK evaluates the performance of programs, reviewing expected outcome measures, gaps in service delivery, and making recommendations for improvement, which are included in MHK's strategic planning objectives for the next performance year and is monitored by MHK's board of directors.

MHK's quality assurance uses outcomes based on CARF accreditation (<u>www.carf.org</u>) Behavioral Health Standards, for MHK's permanent supportive housing involving the following areas:

- Effectiveness. 90% of residents will achieve their service plan goals and reduce resident psychiatric hospitalizations.
- Efficiency. 95% bed-day occupancy rate. If residents fail to produce rental income, MHK will create a payment plan with the resident. Continued failure to comply with rental rules may result in the loss of MHK's permanent supportive housing.
- Access to Services. 100% of referrals are via the CoC HMIS/Coordinated Entry System (CES) where information screened by MHK is matched with the needs of potential residents; and/or DOH-Adult Mental Health Division.
- Satisfaction. 90% of residents rating satisfaction average or higher.

V. Experience and Capability

1. Necessary Skills and Experience

The applicant shall demonstrate that it has the necessary skills, abilities, knowledge of, and experience relating to the request. State your experience and appropriateness for providing the service proposed in this application.

Experience

Established in 1973 as "The House," MHK is the oldest social rehabilitation service provider in Hawaii dedicated to assisting people with a serious mental illness recover and become contributing members of the community. All programs have goals of enabling participants to manage their mental illness symptoms while assuming self-care responsibilities.

Skills. MHK has provided recovery-based 24-hour supervised group services and 8-16 hour supervised care since 1973. MHK has purchased 13 housing units in partnership with the HUD Section 811 (16 homes), and MHK has purchased/leased other housing units independently. MHK provides housing locations statewide as follows:

- Therapeutic Living Program (TLP). Since 2010 MHK operates 2-houses with 7-consumers per house, licensed by Hawaii Office of Health Care Assurance (OHCS) 24-hour supervised living arrangement that provides mental health services for consumers who do not meet the criteria for a specialized treatment facility. TLP focuses on household and community contributing activities, on and off-site, that provides restorative therapy, activities of daily living, and the structure, support and skills necessary for the transition from Hawaii State Hospital to a more independent living level. TLP empowers consumers to lead, satisfying, hopeful lives.
- <u>Safe Haven</u>. Since 1995, for homeless adults with serious mental illness Safe
 Haven offers medical and psychiatric care, case management, 24-hour supervised
 housing services, and social rehabilitation activities.
- <u>Transitional Residential Resources</u>. Since 1973 MHK has offered 8 to 16 and 24-hour supervised group residential facilities and individualized services in transitional

- housing settings. MHK serves consumers with serious mental illnesses, located on Oahu, in East Hawaii and West Hawaii, on Maui and on Kauai.
- Supported Housing. Since 2015, MHK provides less intense levels of care for consumers in their own apartments with rental subsidies up to 18 months, with recovery services and consumer support on site and on-call.
- Infrastructure. MHK currently provides services located on Kauai, Oahu, Maui, Hilo and Kona, as well as the financial management infrastructure with six accountants at MHK's administrative offices, and accounting/office coordinators on Kauai, Oahu, Maui, Hilo, and Kona to oversee the effective and proficient delivery of residential housing services statewide. MHK has been administering programs in the state of Hawaii since 1973, has 50 years of experience providing group home services, as well as 45 years of experience managing fee for service contracts and >15 years of experience providing services through cost reimbursement contracts. MHK operates group homes on Oahu, Maui, Hawaii Island and Kauai. Program staff members are in place and approximately 70% of residential staff have been employed with MHK for over a year. In addition, MHK financial procedures and statements have been reviewed annually by independent auditors since 1976.

Ability. MHK has demonstrated the ability to provide recovery-based services with people in Hawaii experiencing serious mental illness through applied compliance with Hawaii Landlord-Tenant Law, as well as contracts with the Department of Health/AMHD; HMSA, Ohana Health/ Community Care Services; US Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD); Hawaii Public Housing Authority (HPHA); the Social Security Administration (SSA); City and County of Honolulu; and Aloha United Way.

Knowledge. MHK has been accredited since 1997 by CARF, the Commission on Accreditation of Rehabilitation Facilities (www.carf.org), for the provision of behavioral health programs, including Case Management, Intensive Outpatient, Peer Support, Psychosocial Rehabilitation and Community Housing Services. MHK has two CARF surveyors on staff as CEO and Clinical Director and received back-to-back perfect survey scores from CARF (no recommendations) in 2009, 2012, 2015, and again in 2018. MHK is one of only 3% of organizations in the world that has received perfect CARF survey scores. MHK will maintain CARF accreditation throughout the contract period.

MHK's proposed purchase of the Edwin Thomas Home is located at 41 S. Beretania, Honolulu, HI 96813. MHK occupied Edwin Thomas Home from 1995 to 2015 with supported housing for target population, and MHK is knows its value. The 3-story building occupies 3,657 sf of land area and 13,804 sf of building area, TMK: 1-2-1-003-006, and is zoned BMX-4 Central Business Mixed Use. The building offers 27 single room occupancy, dorm-style units with common ADA bathrooms on floors 2 and 3 for housing homeless adults with serious mental illness. The basement is planned to house MHK's administrative services. MHK has site control of the Edwin Thomas Home with a lease option to purchase.
