These challenges contribute to vulnerabilities such as substance abuse, gang involvement, and criminal activities among youth.

In Maui's Districts 14-01 to 14-04 and 12-04, the aftermath of the 2023 Lahaina and Kula fires, as reported by FEMA and the Red Cross, has left indelible marks on the community. Our program acknowledges the trauma faced by these communities and aims to provide supportive pathways to healing and resilience, helping young individuals rebuild their lives.

## **Addressing Crime and Safety Concerns:**

In Kaua'i's District 16-03 and Hawai'i island's District 03-02, County Crime Mapping data indicates a higher concentration of crime compared to other regions. Our initiatives focus on steering youth away from potential criminal activities and towards positive community engagement, thereby contributing to a safer environment.

<u>Personalized Mentoring:</u> Offering individualized, evidence-based mentoring tailored to each young person's unique circumstances, fostering trust, confidence, and a sense of belonging.

Our Royal Hawaiian Guard Youth Development and "What's under the helmet?" STEAMY Programs for FY '25 are meticulously designed to assist at least 250 young individuals who face diverse adversities. We provide a more detailed demographic overview to illustrate the specific needs of our target population:

#### O'ahu, District 8:

**Demographics:** Youth aged 12-18, predominantly from lower-income households (median household income 20% below the state average).

**Challenges:** High school dropout rates approximately 15% higher than the state average, increased exposure to substance abuse and gang-related activities.
