#### 1. A brief description of the applicant's background;

Pacific American Foundation Hawai'i, Inc. ("PAF") is a 501(c)3 nonprofit incorporated in Hawai'i and is the owner of the Waikalua Loko I'a, complex of two fishponds in the Kāne'ohe bay. The ponds are approximately 400 years old. The restoration process started in 1995 and has become the "piko" of the organization in developing numerous highly successful educational programs and cultural stewardship practices in modern times. It has garnered tremendous community support over the years with over 130,000 community members participating in the innovative learning and restoration practices including the research into the production of aquatic food sources. In partnership with the University of Hawai'i Sea Grant, Windward Community College and many others, the Waikalua Aquatic Initiative Partnership was started in 2021 to conduct cutting edge research into bringing back ancient Hawaiian Loko I'a back into production.

#### 2. The goals and objectives related to the request

The goal of this grant is to continue the research and development of the Waikalua Aquatic Initiative Partnership to further expand the current research into growing native limu primarily with the growing of specific fish species complementary to the production of native limu. Secondly to begin the process of taking native limu to market for community consumption. Finally, to share information with other Loko I'a throughout the State of Hawai'i through Hui Malama O Loko I'a, a statewide network of fishpond practitioners and educating the community about ancient Hawaiian fishpond practices and aquaculture as viable careers.

#### 3. The public purpose and need to be served

This grant will be used for public purposes. Hawai'i has become overly dependent on imports for food (80%) and energy (90%). The public purpose of this grant is to cultivate indigenous knowledge with contemporary knowledge, science and technology to be able to begin to grow our own food again from the sea. The process of acquiring and cultivating this knowledge is important in also educating future generations about how to be a producer (food & knowledge) to better serve the needs of our community in Hawai'i.

#### 4. Describe the target population to be served; and

The Pacific American Foundation Hawai'i, Inc. is a native Hawaiian serving non-profit organization. This project will continue to target native Hawaiians as the primary target audience and the Koʻolaupoko district on the Windward side of Oʻahu in which Waikalua loko I'a is located. We have a 30-year history in working statewide with a focus on the Windward Schools, the Windward Community College and the Hawaiʻi Institute of Marine Biology. We currently run afterschool programs in 17 Title I public schools on the Windward Side from Makapuʻu to Waiahole, which has the greatest number of socio-economically disadvantaged students. They will continue to also be our target population.

#### 5. Describe the geographic coverage.

Initially the geographic area that we have historically impacted is the Windward Oʻahu Districts of Koʻolaupoko and Koʻolauloa. We also plan to share the research through the University of Hawaii Sea Grant program which has a statewide reach to assist other Loko l'a and partners that contribute to aquaculture research, food production and sustainability.

Waikalua Aquatic Initiative Partnership currently has over 50 above ground tanks of various sizes from 50 gallons to 1,000 gallons. The scope of work will be as follows:

- a. Recruit and train a new team of aquaculture practitioners (4 practitioners in total) at the site;
- b. Continue the ongoing research specifically with native limu;
- c. Continue research in the use of various native and non-native fish species that complement the growth of native limu;
- d. Continue experimentation in the interdisciplinary multi-trophic approach (limu, fish, bivalves); and
- e. Expand tank system to support more limu production.

#### Tasks:

- a. Maintain existing aquaculture system on site.
- b. Conduct routine water quality studies to collect data regarding temperature, salinity, nutrient level, turbidity, etc.
- c. Make observations daily regarding signs of disease, increase or decrease in sunlight and other factors that may contribute to contamination of the site.
- d. Expand tank system and integrate as needed with the water flow from the fishpond.
- e. Keep a data file and produce weekly, monthly, and annual reports for further discussion for possible modifications.

#### Responsibilities:

- a. US Sea Grant will be the primary supervisor over the Research component working with PAF staff.
- b. UH Sea Grant and PAF staff will recruit, train and oversee the new aquaculture team at the pond.
- c. UH Sea Grant and PAF will also oversee interns assigned to the project.
- d. UH Sea grant and PAF staff will take primary responsibility to also conduct educational programing at the site as needed.
- e. PAF Staff will be the primary liaison with KUA and the Hui Malama o Loko I'a organization to share information with other fishpond practitioners.
- f. UH Sea grant will have primary role in sharing information with others statewide that can help to contribute to food sustainability.

The operation of an aquaculture system utilizing live animals and food products like limu require 24/7 monitoring and evaluation. The aquaculture team will be trained in the protocols to observe daily, collect data, and maintain the system as free as possible from disease. These protocols have already been developed at the site with the supervision and assistance of UH Sea Grant and Dr. Kai Fox. Research requires constant observation, interpretation and application of ideas, and thoughts to properly analyze what is working and not working in the system.

Meetings with all staff and supervisors are held weekly and sometimes daily to assess, modify and learn about how successful systems can work long-term. The goal of this project is to grow food consistently for ultimate community consumption and to reduce our dependence on imports. Our focus is always on building resilient communities based in Hawaiian culture and values.

We have been restoring Waikalua Loko I'a since 1995 and have 28 years of experience in developing innovative and award-winning educational programs. We have cultivated partnerships with Windward Community College and the University of Hawai'i Sea Grant program over the same length of time and more recently built the current aquaculture system at the site in 2021. Specific research into native limu and fish have been going on for over 3 years including presentations to various different audience in our research. Last three years:

- UH Sea Grant (Partnership)

Aquaculture facilities have been in place since 2021 and includes 26 1,000-gallon tanks, 20 - 50-gallon tanks, and 5 - 500-gallon tanks. All are operational and connected to pump and filtration system utilizing salt water directly from the Waikalua Loko l'a. this grant will help to continue the research, train new team members and expand the capacity of the current facility.


The project will be supervised by Dr. Kai Fox, from UH Sea Grant who trained PAF staff, since 2021:

It combines 28 years of restoration work at Waikalua Loko l'a along with some of the top aquaculture scientist at UH Sea Grant and Windward Community College. This team will recruit and train a new team to continue the research with the intention to expand the facility, production and education programs at the site.

PAF Hawai'i will leverage its partnerships with Windward Community College, UH Sea Grant and others to pursue federal grants to support aquaculture efforts, work-force development, and continued educational programs at the site. Hau'oli Mau Loa committed to help PAF and 4 public schools in the area to build an 'āina based education model with Waikalua Loko I'a, as one of the main culture and community sites for learning. Aquaculture remains a high interest and is one of the only sites for K-12 students to get exposed to real aquaculture in the context of a 400-year-old ancient Hawaiian fishpond. This commitment runs for 5 years form 2024 to the end of 2028. PAF has also been successful in receiving significant support from Hawaii based philanthropic organizations which it will continue to pursue.

In 2022, PAF announced publicly to the community of its commitment over the next 30 years to continue the research and development of its aquaculture program to help feed the surrounding community and to share the knowledge with other Loko l'a throughout the state, so they may do the same in their community.
