Pacific Health Ministry (PHM) was established in 1986 as a not-for-profit 501(c)3 organization to develop hospital spiritual care, and Clinical Pastoral Education (CPE) programs in Hawai'i. Our mission is to provide the highest quality interfaith spiritual care to the people of Hawai'i, pastoral training to students around the world and education for the community.

Pacific Health Ministry is *Hawai'i's only fully accredited institution* by the Association for Clinical Pastoral Education (ACPE) and attracts students from around the world¹. We strive to provide care for ill, grieving, isolated, and underserved people through spiritual care services and education for clergy and laity throughout Hawai'i. Communities may find PHM chaplains serving on O'ahu, Maui, and Kaua'i.

PHM has 23 chaplains and four (4) resident chaplains who serve patients and staff at 11 hospitals or long term care facilities across the state, who are experiencing crisis, emergencies, and/or end-of-life situations. The chaplains are supported by five (5) administrative staff (2 FT and 4 PT) located in Honolulu. We currently have only 14 on-call chaplains across three islands which support our team, mostly for overnight and weekend coverage.

"A hospital chaplain is a professionally trained clergy member who supports patients and staff with spiritual and religious concerns. He or she is clinically trained to help navigate the healthcare experience. Chaplains have similar skill sets to social workers but are specially trained to support belief systems **across faiths and cultures**" (2014)².

PHM Chaplains provide spiritual care and emotional support for patients, families and staff and are clinically trained to offer compassionate spiritual care while respecting the individual's faith tradition and religious or spiritual beliefs. In Hawai'i, this also includes respecting the numerous cultural observances, practices, and beliefs. Throughout the pandemic, our chaplains were and continue to be on the frontlines providing comfort and spiritual care to families and loved ones. It has been particularly challenging during the lockdowns, visitor restrictions, and healthcare changes over the course of the last three years. This year was a particularly notable for our chaplain response to the Maui fires that destroyed a town and affected the whole state in the face of loss and grief. Chaplains on Maui served not only the patients but the staff who were all connected in some way to someone who was impacted by the fires.

We are also accredited to provide four different paths of instruction on ministry formation, pastoral visitation, crisis counseling, institutional ministry practice, and the ability to provide service to diverse people from cultural and religious backgrounds.

As Harold Koenig states in JAMA, "a whole person is someone whose being has physical, emotional, and spiritual dimensions. Ignoring any of these aspects of humanity leaves the patient feeling incomplete and may even interfere with healing" (2020)³. Our chaplains witness this everyday, and particularly in the glare that the pandemic shone on everyone impacted, including patients, healthcare workers, and the general population.

2. The goals and objectives related to the request;

This program will immediately address the increased, pressing need for patients and healthcare workers who need 24/7 on-call chaplain coverage across three islands: Oʻahu, Maui, and Kauaʻi, as well as provide continued spiritual care educational training for new and current chaplains. As part of this grant, we will provide and train on-call chaplains to serve communities on Oʻahu, Maui, and Kauaʻi.

In the 11 facilities we currently serve, there are only one to three chaplains on duty during the day per facility. While each facility has varying bed capacities and patient censuses, our chaplains are nowhere near the levels the community deserves and needs. However, our immediate goal is the provision of 24/7 on-call chaplaincy services for *all*. Currently, any emergency, crisis, or end-of-life situation that happens outside of regular business hours are attended to by on-call chaplains. This grant will ensure the provision of around the clock essential spiritual care services.

The devastating fires in Lahaina on August 8, 2023 required immediate coverage and focus. Having additional on-call chaplains would provide communities with ongoing spiritual care as well as crisis spiritual care. To avoid and prevent burnout amongst our current chaplains, this grant is vital to provide on-call chaplains who can respond in times of crises, emergencies, and natural/man-made disasters.

Chaplains tend to continue to give and provide spiritual care, in spite of his/her/their own personal exhaustion. However, crisese, emergencies, and disasters are unpredictable and must be responded to beyond our regular chaplains' load. Having additional 24/7 care is crucial to maintain our services and reduce or eliminate burnout which could potentially leave communities without a chaplain entirely.

Our goal is to have five (5) additional on-call chaplains: three (3) on O'ahu, and one on-call chaplain each on Maui (1) and Kaua'i (1).

Pacific Health Ministry provides the highest level of clinical pastoral education which highlights that "...chaplains receive more than 1,600 hours of training focused specifically in healthcare settings" (2017) 4. We are proud to be perhaps the only provider clinical pastoral education in the Pacific (the next closest being in Australia). Our educational services also include continuing education with chaplains as well as regular site visits with chaplains including those on Maui and Kaua'i. This program is requesting travel access funds to ensure the highlest levels of clinical spiritual care education on the islands is available to the chaplains.

"Although chaplains are a helpful component to the care team, only 60 percent of hospitals in the United States have a chaplain. The remaining 40 percent of hospitals rely on community and volunteer support, which can sometimes be insufficient in a healthcare setting" ⁵.

According to Puchalski, Blatt, Kogan, and Butler (2014) they noted that the American Medical Association developed a Code of Medical Ethics that suggests "physicians should provide competent care based on respect and compassion—values many would consider core to spirituality" (p. 11)⁶. Chaplains provide spiritual care not only to those who are dying, or of a specific religious observation, or culture but to *all*.

And as Gomez, White, Browning and DeLisser state,

Healthcare chaplains play an important role in the clinical sphere, providing spiritual and pastoral care, presence, and counseling to patients, their families, staff, and others in the healthcare community. Positive outcomes associated with chaplain care include relief of patient and family spiritual distress, improved communication between patients' families and the medical team, reduced spiritual and emotional distress on the part of healthcare providers, and enhanced patient satisfaction with the care provided (p. 1) ⁷.

The chaplains serve spiritual care needs of anyone – even those who do not recognize religion or particular faith. Spiritual needs are a fundamental human need and right – we are all spiritual and not all of us are religious.

Chaplains are needed to serve not only spiritual care needs but as the intermediary between the patient, medical care team, and family members who could not be with the patient. Chaplains also rapidly became conversant with using technology for telechaplaincy work, using FaceTime and other methods to communicate where physical presence is not possible.

Patients, families and staff at any of the 11 medical or long-term care institutions we serve who are ill, grieving, isolated, and underserved are offered services from PHM Chaplains who provide spiritual care and emotional support. Our Chaplains are clinically trained to offer compassionate spiritual care while respecting the individual's faith tradition and religious or spiritual beliefs. In Hawai'i, this also includes respecting the numerous cultural observances, practices, and beliefs.

Tasks: The on-call chaplains will provide spiritual care to any who are experiencing crisis, emergencies, and/or end-of-life in hospitals and health care facilities. Chaplain trainings are typically about 2 hours but can be more depending on the chaplains's community needs. The trainings will be conducted by a board-certified ACPE-accredited clinical pastoral educator.

Responsibilities: PHM will vet, hire, train, and provide five (5) or six (6) on-call emergency chaplains during the course of the grant period. PHM will also conduct, at minimum, one complete CPE chaplain training unit on Maui for the grant year. This would involve 12 (full time) or 26 (part-time) weeks of training.

A fully funded grant will provide the above and will have qualitative and quantitative information on institutions served, hours served, and population served summary.

PHM Chaplains provide spiritual care and emotional support for patients, families and staff and support to our already stretched thin population served. Chaplains are clinically trained to offer compassionate spiritual care while respecting the individual's faith tradition and religious or spiritual beliefs. In Hawai'i, this also includes respecting the numerous cultural observances, practices, and beliefs.


