II. Background and Summary

1. A brief description of the applicant's background;

The YWCA of Hawaii Island is dedicated to eliminating racism, empowering women, and promoting peace, justice, freedom, and dignity for all.

The YWCA of Hawai'i Island (YWCA), which is part of the national organization consisting of 300 YWCA Associations with 2.6 million members, first organized in Hilo in 1919, was established as a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization in 1965 and has been a partner agency of the Hawai'i Island United Way (HIUW) since 1979. Employing over 50 full-time and part-time staff, the YWCA provides services to the entire Big Island.

The Developmental Preschool (Preschool), providing childcare services since the mid-1960's, is nationally accredited (National Association for Education of Young Children) and licensed to provide services to 115 children between the ages of 2 and 5. With pandemic conditions, the preschool was able to provide trauma informed care training to staff through Promising Minds, a Hawaii Community Foundation initiative, and provided counseling services to children and parents experiencing stressors. Our preschool is in downtown Hilo and provides childcare to families from all over East Hawaii.

YWCA's Sexual Assault Support Services (SASS) has been providing services to victims of sexual violence for over 40 years. Our services are at no cost to the survivor and include sex assault hotline with 24-hour on call crisis intervention; support to victims throughout the medical and forensic exam, legal process; individual/group therapeutic counseling; case management, and prevention education. In conjunction with the SASS program, the YWCA also has the Sexual Assault Nurse Examiner (SANE) program which supplies specially trained nurses to collect evidence from victims of sexual assault and strangulation for law enforcement. The SANE program has been in operation since 2012. Both SASS and SANE provide services for the entire island and have offices in East and West Hawaii.

Our Healthy Families Hawaii Program (HFP), a child abuse and neglect prevention program, has been providing services for over 40 years to parents of children ages 0 to 3. This home visiting program screens 100% of the newborns birthed at the Hilo Medical Center and offers services if parents indicate there are

stressors in the household that might impact healthy development and growth of their child. This program has a team of staff who support and provide education to help the parents to be their best parent. The HFP program provides services to residents of East Hawaii with boundaries from Volcano National Park to Paauilo.

All our programs collaborate with community agencies in partnership to support our work and refer out to specialized services when needed. With a 100+ year history, the YWCA continues to work in the community to provide services to all ages and stages of life.

2. The goals and objectives related to the request;

The YWCA's current campus on Haili and Ululani Streets houses the original cottage built prior to 1926 that serves as our preschool, a two-story multi-purpose room used by program staff and community members, and two swimming pools that closed 8 years ago when its operations proved financially unsustainable. This property has been owned by the YWCA since 1926. See attached deed.

The YWCA of Hawaii Island recently celebrated its 100th year in operations. The board of directors engaged in strategic planning and created a plan to set the foundation for its next century of service. The YWCA engaged the services of Fleming & Associates to lead the organization in conceptualizing a campus redesign. The conceptual master plan developed by includes a new modern preschool facility, a new program center, and 10 studio apartments. The estimate, based on the conceptual design to fund the master plan, total \$24 million.

In 2021, the YWCA contracted with Netzel Grigsby Associates (NGA) to conduct a capital campaign feasibility study to evaluate the YWCA's organizational capacity to conduct a capital campaign, determine the fundraising capacity, and recommend a plan to achieve the fundraising plan. After careful analysis, NGA recommended a 3-phased approach with a phase 1 goal of \$9.5 million to construct a new preschool facility.

The new preschool facility will replace the existing cottage, swimming pools, and locker rooms on the campus. The preschool facility will be 9500 square feet including five classrooms, shaded secure play areas, and a commercial kitchen to support our meal preparation and nutrition education for the families enrolled at the preschool. In addition, the new facility will provide additional parking places and safer drop and pick up off locations for keiki.

The new center will grow from the existing number of children enrolled of 85 to an NAEYC accredited and Hawaii licensed capacity of 115. The YWCA preschool serves 2-to-5-year-olds with a curriculum that balances structured learning with creativity, character, and social skills.

The YWCA has been serving the Island of Hawaii for over 100 years. We are a vital part of the fabric of downtown Hilo. Not only will this project enable the YWCA to strengthen and grow its program but will add to the revitalization of the downtown community.

Proposed use of funds

- a. The funds will be used to prepare the site for a new early learning childcare center. This includes the construction phase (demolition) to remove two defunct swimming pools and locker rooms and an out of repair cottage.
- b. Currently work is being completed to obtain EA, demolition plans and entitlements so that demolition can occur as soon as funding is available. Timeframes may be adjusted based on availability of funds.

3. The public purpose and need to be served;

Since 1919, the YWCA of Hawaii Island has been a nexus for people of Hawaii Island to thrive, especially women and girls who may have had limited opportunities. Originally the programs included housing, wellness activities and training with an emphasis on the unique needs for women, although programs and services are provided to all. The programs have evolved and changed over generations and continue to meet new needs as times change and community needs grow.

Since 1926 the main campus for YWCA of Hawaii Island has been at our owned location, 145 Ululani Street in Downtown Hilo. For approximately 80 years it has housed our preschool as well as community spaces. Additionally, we provide the island's only rape crisis center: 24/7 sex assault crisis hotline, forensic nursing exams and short- and long-term counseling and the nationally recognized and accredited Healthy Families program to help new parents bond with their newborns during the first 3 years of life. Throughout our history we have been a gathering place for community members, meetings and conferences.

This location is central to Hilo, just a short walk to the Mo`oheau bus terminal and our scenic downtown area. The central location is easy to reach for people relying on public or private transportation. The property is wholly owned by the YWCA of Hawaii Island, which is a unique position among nonprofit organizations and is a testament to the planning of our founders. Property ownership provides us with stability and the opportunity to plan for our future and design a campus reflective of changing community needs.

Preschool

The YWCA preschool has nurtured generations of children with 50 weeks of instruction and full days to support working families. The YWCA Preschool is licensed by the State of Hawaii and has been accredited by NAEYC for over 17 years. The program's creative curriculum by Teaching Strategies, is focused on the whole child, social - emotional, motor skills, cognitive development and

academic rigor. The preschool also has expanded services to include the family with mental health services for parents and children as well as financial literacy and reading nights for the whole family.

Gardening and incorporation of fresh foods into our nutrition program is an important part of our focus on health and wellness. We provide each child with a nutritious breakfast, lunch and snack daily.

We provide full day instruction to 2-5-year-olds and are one of the few programs which will support children prior to potty training. Because of our longevity in the community, we are on our 2nd or 3rd generation of preschoolers, our graduates have returned to us as parents, grandparents, staff and board members.

Healthy Families Program

Family stressors for adults who have experienced traumatic childhoods can be difficult to overcome. Through our Healthy Families program, we work with new parents who want a better life for their children. No child comes with an instruction book, and our accredited healthy families has provided in home coaches for encouragement and education as well as developmental screening, screens for family violence, postpartum depression, medical needs, and support and referrals. The program is voluntary and provides critical linkage to services for new parents in need of support.

SASS and SANE

Our Sex Assault support services program provides immediate crisis counseling 24 hours a day 7 day a week to victims of sex assault on Hawaii Island and their support systems who have been affected. Additionally, we provide forensic evidence exams by trained nurses for our justice system and support to victims through that process and any other interactions or interview they have. We work in concert with the justice system to hold a safe space for survivors as they heal and will support them with long term counseling as they move forward with their lives.

Advocacy

YWCA of Hawaii Island has been an advocate for women and girls since our founding in 1919. We have advocated in conjunction with other YWCAs nationally and across the state as well as groups such Association of University Women, the Hilo Women's Club, Zonta Club of Hilo, League of Women Voters. Through our efforts and the efforts of likeminded group collaboration we are constantly working toward improving the lives of women, girls and families.

Community Convening

For over 100 years the YWCA of Hawaii Island has served as a gathering place for community meetings, organizers, businesses starting out, retreats, trainings, dances, socials, family parties and other gatherings.

4. Describe the target population to be served; and

The preschool program supports working families. This is our mission in action, supporting families and creating a nurturing safe environment to instill the love of education for children **and** caring for them while their parents work or go to school in order to create a better life. We see preschool as a critical workforce infrastructure necessity. In this way we have been helping to support change and the betterment of our community for over 100 years. Our mission is to eliminate racism and empower women, we serve the entire family in every program because our entire community needs to thrive for true progress.

We collect data on free and reduced lunch and the majority (generally 70%+) of our families have incomes below free and reduced lunch limits. Well over 60% of our families are Hawaiian and part Hawaiian and work with Pauahi Keiki Scholars (Kamehameha Schools) as well as a variety of funders to support families with tuition assistance. Many of our families are single mother head of household.

The preschool focuses on serving all students and goes to great effort to support families that have short term emergencies so that preschool continues even if the family has a job interruption. This kind of consistency for children is incredibly important as families weather challenging times. Our island has had a number of traumatic events in the last few years which has added to economic and housing insecurity. Hurricane Lane, housing displacement due to lava inundation, COVID19, in addition to interpersonal family situations have created uncertainty for many children, we provide daily consistency.

Due to the incredible challenges our children have seen, we have applied a trauma informed lens to our preschool and have embedded mental health supports in the preschool for children and families. Parents can participate in Family Hui, Literacy nights and collaborate on stressors and interventions their children and parents are experiencing.

5. Describe the geographic coverage.

Our preschool is located at our owned 1.4-acre campus at 145 Ululani Street in Downtown Hilo, we serve families from the entire east side of the Island as far as Honokaa to Volcano and lower Puna as parents commute to work or school.

The YWCA's current campus on Haili and Ululani Streets houses the original cottage built in 1926 that serves as our preschool, a two-story multi-purpose room used by program staff and community members, and a swimming pool that closed 8 years ago when its operations proved financially unsustainable. This property has been owned by the YWCA since 1929, (See deed, previous pages).

The YWCA's board of directors began envisioning a revitalized campus that positions the YWCA of Hawaii Island for its next century of service. The YWCA engaged the services of Fleming & Associates to lead the organization in conceptualizing a campus redesign. The conceptual master plan developed by Fleming & Associates includes a new modern preschool facility, a renovated program center, and 10 new studio apartments. The new preschool facility is the focus of this proposal.

The new preschool facility will replace the existing cottage currently housing the preschool program, swimming pools, and locker rooms on the campus that have been closed for the past 10 years. The existing cottage has served us well but was never intended to be a preschool. The amount of damage and repairs required is extensive. The building has had lead abatement performed, pipes have been replaced, is on substandard footings, and is not ADA accessible or built to code. Although not listed on the State Register of Historic Places, we recognize the historic nature of the structure and will work with SHPD to document the building, which we believe was moved to the site in the late 1920's or early 1930's.

The YWCA is requesting GIA CIP funds to complete the entitlements and demolition of the existing preschool cottage, pool building housing the closed locker rooms, and the two existing swimming pools.in order to make way for the construction of a new preschool facility. The total cost for Phases 1 & 2, entitlements and demolition, is \$1,934,000. The YWCA has utilized the funding from 2023 GIA of \$330,000 for planning and development phases of the project and architectural work. The YWCA has utilized \$266,000 of the 2023 GIA to cover the cost of architectural and other entitlement services necessary to complete the demolition of the facilities mentioned above. The remaining \$64,000 of 2023 GIA will be applied to architectural services for the newly designed facility. This is an important step for the YWCA for two reasons. The demolition and site preparation, phases 1 & 2, will not only prepare the site for the construction of the new preschool facility but will eliminate an ongoing maintenance and safety hazard on the site. YWCA is currently seeking \$1,200,000 from GIA CIP for completion of Phase 1 & 2 and demolition, we have a pending request for the balance with Hawaii County CDBG funds.

The GIA CIP grant will position the YWCA to move forward with phase 3, construction of the new preschool facility. Concurrently, the YWCA is seeking funds from foundations,

Historically, our school has served majority (60-70%) low-income families.

V. Experience and Capability

1. Necessary Skills and Experience

The YWCA of Hawaii Island has the skills, abilities and knowledge to carry out the work in this request. We have over a century of service on Hawaii Island and are seeking funding to create a facility to support us for 100 years more. We have a committed Board, experienced and excellent leadership, extensive experience in performing work, superior staff and we have rich, multigenerational relationships.

This project will be spearheaded by the Chief Executive Officer, Kathleen McGilvray, with oversite by the YWCA of Hawaii Island's Board of Directors. The Board of Directors has a diverse mix of women with various kinds of experience that brings them to the table. The Board of Directors has committees to support various activities within the organization and each committee draws on community members to support those activities, either as a regular member of the committee or as an ad hoc member, and sometimes just by invitation to learn more about the mechanics of the project.

Our Board of Directors has a facilities committee leading this project's governance. This committee consists of members who have been involved with facilities development or repairs, an electrician, a former contractor and engineer and have also brought in subject matter experts from the community to help further define processes. The Facilities Committee has retained Fleming and Associates as consultants to provide professional Architectural and Engineering design services for this phase, entitlements and demolition. They will facilitate and oversee the compliance, design, bid and construction (demolition) process.

Additionally, our campaign leaders are Toby Taniguchi, Jennifer Zelko-Schleuter, Ashley Kierkiewicz, Ross Wilson, Sue Lee Loy, Linda Clifford, Cary Boeddeker and Sandy Tokuuke, led by Chair, Tim Richards.

2. Facilities

Applicant YWCA of Hawaii Island, CIP

Our 1.4-acre campus on the corner of Haili and Ululani Street is just above the Palace Theater and the Tsunami Zone, with a view of downtown Hilo. It is easy to access from the bus or on foot, just a short walk from the farmers market.

The campus has two aging pools on it and three buildings, the cottage, multipurpose building and the pool lanai building, which is not able to be used. Preschool is in multiple locations, the cottage and the multipurpose building. The cottage has been in use since 1926, we believe it was moved to the campus and was in use before then. Originally it was a home for women. Younger children are in our multipurpose building, in an area that was formerly administrative offices. Although the buildings are adequate, we know that the children would be better served at one location, with a commercial kitchen, with an area for pickups and drop offs, with spaces designed for children, rather than originally designed for adults. This would also make the former administrative building available for offices, allowing us to reduce rented space.

This request supports the modernization of this facility and supports the strategic direction our board is headed in, a one stop shop with all areas of the campus being used to serve the community. Since many of our services overlap, we believe our reach will be extended and our families better served.

VI. Personnel: Project Organization and Staffing

1. Proposed Staffing, Staff Qualifications, Supervision and Training

The YWCA of Hawaii Island will implement the project with leadership from the community volunteers on the board, who lend their experience and expertise to the organization.

Kathleen McGilvray, Chief Executive Officer, BS Management, Aviation Operations, Honors Certificate, Career Development Facilitator Instructor (CDFI)

Ms. McGilvray has been the organization's leader since 2013. With the board she has been conducting the campus redesign, is securing funding and will supervise the planning and construction. She has been in nonprofit and program management for 21 years in Hawaii County as the Hawaii County Workforce Investment Board Director, supervising education and training programs for out of school youth and unemployed adults and was the Hawaii County Branch Director for Goodwill Industries supervising education and training program for people with barriers to employment such as long term unemployed, out of school youth, people with disabilities, immigrant populations and retail operations. She is a past president and member of Zonta Club of Hilo for 18 years and Rotary Club of Hilo for 9 years.

Janell Kuamoo, Accounting Manager, Associates Degree in Accounting, Hawaii Community College

Ms. Kuamoo has been with the YWCA of Hawaii Island for eight years. She has served in all positions in the department in a series of promotions. She plans and directs the accounting activities and fiscal compliance within the finance department. As part of the YWCA Management team, she directs the organization's financial planning and accounting practices as well as its relationship with lending institutions, shareholders, and the financial community. She has been in management and operations for 17 years, formerly in retail and services for people with disabilities and our youth. Ms. Kuamoo is currently the treasurer for Rotary Club of Hilo Bay, she has been a member for three years.


