STATEMENT OF OBJECTIONS TO HOUSE BILL NO. 2359

Honorable Members Thirty-Second Legislature State of Hawai'i

Pursuant to Section 16 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawai'i, I am returning herewith, without my approval, House Bill No. 2359, entitled "A Bill for an Act Relating to the Hawaii Broadband and Digital Equity Office."

The purpose of this bill is to establish the Digital Equity Grant Program to award grants to applicants to deploy digital equity projects to covered populations in the State.

This bill is objectionable because it would inhibit the development of small-scale, community-based networks in historically disadvantaged communities in Hawaii. While the State Digital Equity Plan, developed by the Hawaii Broadband and Digital Equity Office, is a roadmap for achieving digital equity baseline across the islands, the bill excludes the deployment of broadband infrastructure and wireless community networks from eligible projects. These providers, although potentially large, should be permitted to participate in the Digital Equity Grant Program in order to best develop community-based networks in historically disadvantaged communities.

For the foregoing reasons, I am returning House Bill No. 2359 without my approval.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES THIRTY-SECOND LEGISLATURE, 2024 STATE OF HAWAII

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A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE HAWAII BROADBAND AND DIGITAL EQUITY OFFICE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that digital equity in
- 2 every community across the State is essential to the well-being
- 3 and economic reality of the State's residents. The need for
- 4 digital equity is significant, highlighted by the devastating
- 5 impacts of the recent coronavirus disease 2019 pandemic. The
- 6 lack of digital equity has had a tremendous adverse effect in
- 7 many areas, but particularly for rural and socio-economically
- 8 disadvantaged communities.
- 9 The legislature also finds that digital equity has meant
- 10 the difference between an employee being able to work remotely
- 11 and an employee possibly facing unemployment. Additionally,
- 12 digital literacy and broadband access are critical tools for
- 13 persons seeking to access social services, such as unemployment
- 14 claims; supplemental nutrition assistance program benefits;
- 15 vital records; and other essential government, educational, and
- 16 medical services.

ı	The legislature further finds that digital equity in the		
2	State will enhance Hawaii's overall economic development and		
3	education, health care, and emergency services. Making grants		
4	available to achieve digital equity for disadvantaged		
5	populations will move the State toward universal access to		
6	broadband services.		
7	The legislature strongly supports efforts to improve		
8	digital equity for residents, consumers, and businesses across		
9	the State.		
10	The purpose of this Act is to:		
11	(1) Identify and address any remaining obstacles to		
12	digital equity in all areas of the State; and		
13	(2) Establish the digital equity grant program to award		
14	grants and create an environment in which all		
15	individuals and communities in the State have the		
16	information technology capacity needed for full		
17	participation in society, democracy, and the economy.		
18	SECTION 2. The Hawaii Revised Statutes is amended by		
19	adding a new chapter to title 13 to be appropriately designated		
20	and to read as follows:		
21	"CHAPTER		

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1	DIGITAL EQUITY GRANT PROGRAM
2	§ -1 Definitions. As used in this chapter, unless the
3	context requires otherwise:
4	"Broadband" means high-speed internet access that is always
5	on, including mobile and fixed technologies.
6	"Broadband infrastructure" has the same meaning as defined
7	in section 206R-1.
8	"Covered household" means a family whose household income
9	for the most recent calendar year is no more than two hundred
10	per cent of the federal poverty level.
11	"Covered populations" means:
12	(1) Individuals who live in covered households;
13	(2) Individuals aged sixty years and older;
14	(3) Incarcerated individuals, other than individuals who
15	are incarcerated in a federal correctional facility;
16	(4) Veterans;
17	(5) Individuals with disabilities;
18	(6) Individuals who have a language barrier, including
19	individuals who:
20	(A) Are English as a second language learners; or
21	(B) Have low levels of literacy:

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- (7) Individuals who are members of a racial or ethnic
 minority group;
- 3 (8) Individuals who primarily reside in a rural area; and
- 4 (9) Homeless or unsheltered individuals.
- 5 "Department" means the department of business, economic
- 6 development, and tourism.
- 7 "Digital equity" means a condition in which all individuals
- 8 and communities have the information technology capacity needed
- 9 for full participation in society, democracy, and the economy.
- "Digital equity services" means services that increase
- 11 digital literacy in broadband access for covered populations.
- "Digital literacy" means the skills associated with using
- 13 technology to enable users to find, evaluate, organize, create,
- 14 and communicate information.
- "Office" means the Hawaii broadband and digital equity
- 16 office.
- "Program" means the digital equity grant program
- 18 established by this chapter.
- 19 "Project" means a digital equity project set forth in an
- 20 application for grant funding authorized under this chapter.

-	rreject area means an area that is proposed to be covered		
2	in an application for grant funding authorized under this		
3	chapter.		
4	"Rural area" means an area that qualifies as rural pursuant		
5	to a federal definition. If an area does not qualify as rural		
6	pursuant to a federal definition, the following definitions may		
7	be used for determining the area's rural status for the purposes		
8	of this chapter:		
9	(1) Any island with a population density fewer than or		
10	equal to five hundred residents per square mile shall		
11	be considered rural; and		
12	(2) If an island's population density exceeds five hundred		
13	residents per square mile, an area within the island		
14	shall be considered rural if it is within a zip code		
15	tabulation area with a population density below eight		
16	hundred residents per square mile, as determined by		
17	the population of the last official census and using		
18	the entire zip code tabulation area as determined by		
19	the United States Census Bureau.		
20	"State digital equity plan" means the digital equity		
21	strategies and implementation plan developed by the office.		

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- 1 § -2 Digital equity grant program; establishment. There
- 2 is established the digital equity grant program to be
- 3 implemented and administered by the office. The office shall
- 4 receive and review grant applications and may award grants for
- 5 eligible projects pursuant to the program.
- 6 § -3 Eligible projects. The office may award grants for
- 7 eligible projects; provided that on the date the application is
- 8 submitted, the project areas to be served by the project shall
- 9 include covered populations. The eligible projects may include
- 10 projects that further develop and promote digital literacy,
- 11 broadband affordability, digital navigators, access to digital
- 12 devices, broadband service subscription costs, wifi routers,
- 13 access points, and other innovative digital inclusion projects.
- 14 Projects that include the deployment of broadband infrastructure
- 15 shall be ineligible.
- 16 § -4 Applicant preference. In making awards, the office
- 17 shall give preference to applicants that are nonprofit, non-
- 18 governmental entities that have demonstrated experience in
- 19 providing digital equity services to covered populations.
- 20 Governmental agencies may apply and shall be evaluated on a
- 21 case-by-case basis.

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1	§ -	-5 Applications. (a) The office shall establish an
2	annual tim	me period during which it shall accept applications for
3	funding ur	nder the program. The time period for accepting
4	application	ons shall be no less than sixty days and no more than
5	ninety day	ys.
6	(b)	The form of the application shall be as prescribed by
7	the office	e, and the application shall include:
8	(1)	Evidence demonstrating the applicant's experience and
9		ability to plan, organize, staff, and deliver digital
10		equity services to covered populations within the
11		State;
12	(2)	A description of the project area and covered
13		population to be served;
14	(3)	A description of the project that is proposed to be
15		deployed, including specific measurable goals to
16		increase digital literacy and broadband access,
17		methods, metrics, facilities, equipment, staff, and
18		resources;
19	(4)	A plan to tailor public awareness and outreach to
20		include non-English-speaking covered populations with

1		consideration for linguistic, cultural, generational,
2		and literacy challenges;
3	(5)	Evidence that is certified by the applicant and
4		demonstrates the nature of the current digital
5		inequity in the proposed project area and covered
6		population;
7	(6)	The number of individuals in each covered population
8		that would gain access to broadband services as a
9		result of the project;
10	(7)	The total cost and timeline for completion of the
11		project;
12	(8)	The amount of matching funds that the applicant
13		proposes to contribute and a certification that no
14		portion of the matching funds are derived from any
15		state government grant, loan, or subsidy;
16	(9)	Evidence demonstrating the economic feasibility of the
17		project;
18	(10)	A direct linkage to the state digital equity plan;
19	(11)	A certification that no other funding from any federal
20		or state program is available to the applicant for the
21		project.

1	(12)	A certification that all activities undertaken for the
2		project shall comply with all applicable federal,
3		state, and county laws;
4	(13)	A certification that the applicant shall indemnify and
5		hold harmless the State and its officers, agents, and
6		employees from and against any and all claims arising
7		out of or resulting from the project and procure
8		sufficient insurance to provide this indemnification
9	+++ + + + + + + + + + + + + + + + + +	if requested to do so by the office; provided that
10		this paragraph shall not apply to projects undertaken
11		by state government agencies;
12	(14)	A certification that the grant shall be used
13		exclusively for the purposes of the project and not to
14		be used for purposes of entertainment or perquisites,
15		including lobbying activities;
16	(15)	A certification that the applicant shall agree to make
17		available to the office all records the applicant may
18		have relating to the grant for the office to monitor
19		the applicant's compliance with this chapter and rules
20		adopted pursuant to this chapter; and
21	(16)	Any other information deemed necessary by the office.

1	\$ -6 Review of applications; approval. (a) Within five
2	business days following the deadline to submit applications for
3	the program, the office shall make all the applications
4	available for review in a publicly available electronic file
5	posted on the office's or department's website.
6	(b) In reviewing applications and any challenges to the
7	applications, the office shall review the projects to ensure
8	that all awarded funds are to be used to deploy eligible
9	projects pursuant to section -3.
10	(c) The office shall award program grants based on a
11	scoring system that shall be released to the public at least
12	thirty days before the first day of the time period for the
13	submission of applications. The scoring system shall give the
14	highest weight or priority to the following:
15	(1) Projects proposing to serve larger covered
16	populations, with consideration to projects proposing
17	to serve difficult to access areas, neglected covered
18	populations, or both;
19	(2) Applicants with more experience and technical ability
20	to successfully deploy digital equity projects to

•		covered populations and more imancial of other
2		resources available to assist the projects;
3	(3)	Projects for which fewer government funds and less
4		support are necessary to deploy digital equity in an
5		economically feasible manner;
6	(4)	Projects with a higher percentage of matching funds
7		proposed to be committed by the applicant;
8	(5)	Projects that do not duplicate any existing digital
9		equity project in the project area; and
10	(6)	Other factors the office determines to be reasonable,
11		appropriate, and consistent with the purposes of the
12		program.
13	§	-7 Authority of the office. The office may:
14	(1)	Following notice and an opportunity to cure, require
15		disgorgement of grant funds in response to an
16		applicant's or a grant recipient's pattern of failure
17		to implement a project in accordance with the
18		timelines and milestones set forth in its application;
19	(2)	Consider an applicant or a grant recipient's financial
20		ability to complete the project proposed in an
21		application;

1	(3)	Request and inspect any records and information of a
2		grant recipient necessary for the oversight and
3		administration of any project funded pursuant to this
4		chapter;
5	(4)	Impose any new or additional compliance requirements
6	•	on grant recipients, through grant agreements or any
7		other mechanism, in addition to rules adopted pursuant
8		to section -8; and
9	(5)	Deny or cancel a project if the office finds the
10		project will affect federal funding opportunities.
11	S	-8 Rules. (a) The department shall adopt rules
12	pursuant	to chapter 91 to implement this chapter.
13	(b)	The rules shall:
14	(1)	Include reasonable oversight and reporting provisions
15		to ensure that grant moneys are used as intended; and
16	(2)	Not impose any financial penalty or liquidated damages
17		provisions or provisions that are not reasonably
18		related to the deployment of projects in the State in
19		accordance with this chapter.
20	(c)	Before January 1, 2025, the department shall adopt
21	rules pur	suant to this section to implement the digital equity

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- 1 grant program; provided that any rules adopted pursuant to this
- 2 subsection shall include rules regarding the submission, review,
- 3 and approval of applications; administration of the projects
- 4 funded; and grant agreements memorializing the award of funds."
- 5 SECTION 3. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
