H.B. NO. **1261** 

### A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE DEPARTMENT OF LAND AND NATURAL RESOURCES.

### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that Ka'ena point state 2 park, Mākua, and Keawa'ula regions, are significant for their 3 beauty, cultural and historical significance, and exceptional 4 value to the Hawaiian community. Historcally, these areas were 5 primarily known for their lawai'a (fishing practices), as well as 6 other traditional Native Hawaiian practices such as lua (warrior 7 training) and la'au lapa'au (medicinal practices). These areas 8 are places of cultural enlightenment and healing and are rich in 9 mo'olelo (history) encompassing life from beginning to end.

In 2016, due to years of overuse and abuse from illegal driving on the beach, unmanaged camping, harmful fishing and gathering practices, and other recreational uses that created unacceptable, potentially hazardous accumulations of dangerous rubbish and human waste, areas of Ka'ena point state park, Mākua, and Keawa'ula regions were closed to overnight access. The intent was to reopen with a proper management system in place

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that encompasses Hawaiian managagement values in balancing
public use with the preservation of the 'āina, wildlife, and
cultural resources. However, a proper management system has yet
to be implemented.

5 The legislature notes that prioritizing the State's natural resources is an essential component of destination management. 6 7 Before 2020, annual arrivals to the State exceeded 10,000,000 8 visitors, and according to state economists, by 2025, Hawaii 9 will again return to pre-pandemic tourism levels. Social media 10 has only perpetuated this growth. The legislature believes that 11 rising visitor numbers in Hawaii's state parks could be better 12 managed by implementing various types of management systems.

13 The legislature further finds that in 2018, massive 14 flooding on Kauai damaged surrounding bridges, beaches, and 15 roads, thereby forcing Hāena state park to close for fourteen 16 months. When the park reopened, the department of land and 17 natural resources worked with the local community to implement a 18 management system that balanced public use with Hawaiian 19 cultural values and the preservation of the 'āina, wildlife, and 20 cultural resources. Furthermore, based on the success of the 21 Hāena state park model, House Bill No. 2446, Regular Session of

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2022, was introduced to appropriate moneys for the department of
land and natural resources to replicate models such as used at
Hāena state park. That measure also appropriated additional
moneys from the state parks special fund for purposes of state
park management.

6 Recently implemented management plans and models have been 7 shown to improve and promote a more harmonious relationship 8 between public use and park maitenance and preservation. Ka'ena 9 point state park, Mākua, and Keawa'ula regions are in dire need 10 of such a model. Although the needs of each state park may have 11 their similarities, each park is unique and its needs may vary 12 based on location and useage.

13 The abuse and harmful activities have plaqued these ahupua'a 14 of Mākua, Kahanahāiki, and Keawa'ula for more than a century. 15 The legislature finds that a proper management system for these 16 areas is long overdue and the implementation of a system to 17 improve public safety and environmental protection is necessary. 18 The purpose of this Act is to require the department of 19 land and natural resources to develop and implement an improved 20 management system for Ka'ena point state park, Mākua, and 21 Keawa'ula regions.

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1	SECTION 2.	(a) The department of land and natural	
2	resources shall deem that Ka'ena point state park, Mākua, and		
3	Keawa'ula regions are a top priority for the development and		
4	implemenation of an improved management system.		
5	(b) The department of land and natural resources shall		
6	develop and implement a management system to allow for improved		
7	management, such as what has been utilized and deemed successful		
8	at Hāena state park, provided that the management system		
9	pursuant to this Act shall be unique and tailored to the		
10	specific criteria and needs of Ka'ena point state park, Mākua,		
11	and Keawaʻula regions.		
12	(c) In the c	development and implementation of a management	
13	system for Kaʻena point state park, Mākua, and Keawaʻula regions,		
14	the department of land and natural resources shall:		
15	(1) Collabo	rate collectively with community stakeholders	
16	and cul	tural practioners of the specific regions;	
17	(2) Work wi	th all parties that share land use and	
18	jurisdi	ction within the encompassed land and marine	
19	areas;		
20	(3) Ensure	the sustainability of the management system by	
21	working	with outside partners, such as local non-	

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1	profit organizations, as has been done at other state		
2	parks management systems; and		
3	(4) Maintain the current limited access due to misuse and		
4	the lack of management until proper measures are		
5	employed to address and resolve these issues.		
6	SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general		
7	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so		
8	much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2023-2024 and		
9	the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal		
10	year 2024-2025 for the development and implementation of a		
11	management system for Ka'ena point state park, Mākua, and		
12	Keawa'ula regions.		
13	The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department		
14	of land and natural resources for the purposes of this Act.		
15	SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2023.
