A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE HOSPITAL SUSTAINABILITY PROGRAM.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the hospital 2 sustainability program established in 2012 has served a critical 3 role in strengthening Hawaii's health care system. In the 4 eleven years since the program's inception, the hospital 5 sustainability program has helped acute care facilities treat 6 the State's most vulnerable patients, especially low-income 7 individuals requiring hospital services. The program has been 8 carried out in a public-private partnership to ensure patients 9 in Hawaii have access to quality, affordable care.

10 The legislature further finds that, even with the program, 11 hospitals in the State face major financial challenges. These 12 challenges are due in part to the continuing health and 13 financial pressures related to the coronavirus disease 2019 14 pandemic and health care workforce shortage. The federal and 15 state governments jointly finance medicaid by statutory formula. 16 The federal government pays between fifty per cent and seventy-17 four per cent, with a state's per capita income determining the



1 percentage. States with lower per capita incomes relative to 2 the national average receive higher federal matching rates. 3 Federal rules mandate that a state must pay the state's share 4 from public funds that are not federal funds. Public funding to 5 help financially sustain Hawaii's hospitals should continue by 6 assessing a provider fee, which is currently scheduled to repeal 7 in 2024.

8 The legislature further finds that provider fees exist in 9 forty-nine states and the District of Columbia as a means of 10 drawing down federal funds to sustain medicaid programs amid 11 rising state budget deficits, increasing health care costs, and 12 expanding medicaid enrollment. Provider fees, which are 13 collected from and agreed to by specific categories of 14 providers, may be imposed on nineteen different classes of 15 health care services, including inpatient and outpatient 16 hospital and nursing facility services.

17 The legislature therefore finds that, in Hawaii, a provider 18 fee for hospitals can substantially increase medicaid payments 19 without placing additional constraints on the State's budget. 20 The additional federal funds obtained via the hospital 21 sustainability program allow hospitals in the State to continue



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to serve uninsured or underinsured patients in a timely,
 effective manner, maintaining access to care for medicaid
 recipients and helping to ensure the overall sustainability of
 the health care system in Hawaii.

5 The purpose of this Act is to strengthen and make permanent
6 the hospital sustainability program to continue to preserve
7 access to health care for medicaid recipients.

8 SECTION 2. Section 346G-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
9 amended to read as follows:

10 "[+] §346G-2[+] Findings and declaration of necessity. It 11 is the intent of the legislature to establish a special fund 12 within the state treasury to receive revenue from the imposition 13 of a hospital sustainability fee to be administered by the 14 department of human services, which shall use the revenue from 15 the fee and associated federal medicaid matching funds exclusively to make [direct] payments to hospitals and for other 16 purposes as [set forth] described in this chapter." 17

18 SECTION 3. Section 346G-3, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is

The inpatient hospital sustainability 10 fee shall not exceed [five and one-half] six per cent of net 11 inpatient hospital service revenue. The outpatient hospital 12 sustainability fee shall not exceed [five and one-half] six per 13 cent of net outpatient hospital service revenue. Each fee shall 14 be the same percentage for all affected hospitals, subject to 15 subsection (d).

16 (d) The department shall exempt federal hospitals and
17 public hospitals from the hospital sustainability fees on
18 inpatient services and outpatient care services.

19 Children's hospitals, psychiatric hospitals, and 20 rehabilitation hospitals may be assessed hospital sustainability 21 fees on inpatient and outpatient services at a different rate

2	any facility from the hospital sustainability fee if it is
3	determined that its exclusion is required to meet federal
4	standards of approval.] If necessary to obtain and maintain
5	approval of the waiver by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid

Any subsequent payments shall be credited 3 first to unpaid fee amounts beginning with the most delinquent installment rather than to penalty or interest amounts." 4 SECTION 9. Report Title:

Hospital Sustainability Program; Hospital Sustainability Fee; Hospital Trade Association; Department of Human Services; Hospital Sustainability Program Special Fund; Appropriation

Description:

Expands the Hospital Sustainability Program and makes the program permanent. Amends the definition of "private hospital". Increases the fee cap on various hospital sustainability fees. Requires the Department of Human Services to consult and negotiate with the hospital trade association located in Hawaii regarding fee participation and rates. Requires the Hospital Sustainability Fee to discontinue under certain circumstances and provides guidelines for the distribution of remaining funds. Appropriates funds out of the Hospital Sustainability Program Special Fund.

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
