H.B. NO. **1481**

A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE SENIOR MEDICARE PATROL PROGRAM.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the safety and
welfare of the islands' kupuna is a priority. Scams and
fraudulent behaviors targeting our kupuna are unacceptable and
diminish our kupuna's assets, dignity, and legacy.

5 The legislature further finds that medicare loses over 6 \$70,000,000,000 annually to fraudulent claims. Hawaii ranks 7 first in the nation in terms of longevity with an average life 8 expectancy of 81.3 years. As the baby boomer generation 9 continues to age, the number of people eligible for medicare 10 will continue to grow.

11 The legislature further finds that the State's senior 12 medicare patrol program established in 1997 has a documented 13 history of advocating, educating, and protecting Hawaii's most 14 vulnerable population. The program was established with two 15 temporary full-time positions and continues to provide services 16 with just two full-time staff positions despite significant 17 increases in scam incidences. In addition, the State's senior



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1 medicare patrol program does not limit assistance to health care 2 fraud and abuse. The executive office on aging recognizes that other types of fraud and abuse that trick kupuna into providing 3 personal information and money, including gift card and charity 4 5 schemes; romance, caregiver, and imposter scams; and ransomware, 6 have the potential to harm kupuna. To address increasing 7 reports of fraud, medical billing errors, and abuse, more full-8 time staff positions are needed to expand the State's senior 9 medicare patrol program and delivery of services. The 10 additional staff will allow the program to work closely with other private and government service providers to build a wider 11 12 "help net" and assist kupuna statewide.

13 The purpose of this Act is to appropriate funds for three 14 additional positions within the State's senior medicare patrol 15 program to meet the rising demand for assistance caused by 16 increased reports of fraud, medical billing errors, and abuse.

SECTION 2. There is appropriated out of the general revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$229,680 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2023-2024 and the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2024-2025 for one full-time equivalent (1.0 FTE) program



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1 specialist III position, one full-time equivalent (1.0 FTE) program specialist IV position, and one full-time equivalent 2 3 (1.0 FTE) program specialist V position within the executive office on aging for the senior medicare patrol program. 4

5 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the executive office on aging for the purposes of this Act. 6

7 SECTION 3. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2023.
