# A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE HAWAI'I HEALTH AGING PARTNERSHIP.

#### **BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:**

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the Hawaii healthy 2 aging partnership was established in 2003 to improve the health 3 status of older adults by empowering residents to make healthy 4 decisions and engage in healthier lifestyles. Since the 5 partnership's formation, the partnership has successfully 6 adapted evidence-based health promotion programs and disease 7 prevention programs for Hawaii's multicultural population. 8 Participants may engage in two evidenced-based interventions: 9 Better Choices Better Health (Ke Ola Pono, or "living well"), 10 which empowers and teaches participants to manage chronic 11 disease, and EnhanceFitness, which offers an effective research-12 driven exercise program to improve the overall functional 13 fitness and well-being of older adults. Due to the many 14 accomplishments of the Hawaii healthy aging partnership, the 15 partnership received the 2013 Award for Excellence in 16 Multicultural Aging from the American Society on Aging. This accomplishment brought further recognition to the partnership's 17



role in improving the health of Hawaii's diverse aging
population.

3 The legislature also finds that Act 103, Session Laws of 4 Hawaii 2017, and Act 124, Session Laws of Hawaii 2019, 5 appropriated state funds for the healthy aging partnership for fiscal years 2017-2018 and 2019-2020, respectively; however, the 6 7 partnership did not receive state funding for fiscal years 2018-8 2019 and 2020-2022. The partnership also receives a small 9 amount of supplemental funding from county appropriations and 10 federal funds from the Older Americans Act.

11 The legislature further finds that during the coronavirus 12 disease 2019 (COVID-19) pandemic, the healthy aging partnership 13 was forced to close all EnhanceFitness sites and cancel Better Choices Better Health workshops and trainings due to the State's 14 prohibitions against in-person classes. A survey of 15 EnhanceFitness participants on the impacts of COVID-19 found 16 17 that nearly all active participants were negatively impacted by 18 the pandemic and felt their health had declined. The survey also showed that kupuna needed access to safe and effective 19 20 health promotion activities. To overcome these challenges, the 21 healthy aging partnership developed activities in alternative

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formats. As of October 2021, the program has served more than
three hundred ninety-two kupuna during the pandemic.

3 More than sixty-five participants in Kauai county attended 4 modified exercise classes online, and more than ninety 5 participants in Maui county joined via a televised airing. When 6 pandemic restrictions eased, the healthy aging partnership 7 started offering in-person small group EnhanceFitness classes. 8 These classes served ninety-seven kupuna in Kauai county. 9 Virtual EnhanceFitness classes continued to serve sixty kupuna 10 in Maui county.

Better Choices Better Health offered its chronic disease 11 self-management education remotely by mailing toolkits to 12 13 participants and holding classes via telephone for those who 14 were not tech-savvy. These classes had fifty-seven participants across Kauai county, Hawaii county, and the city and county of 15 Honolulu. Virtual workshops served sixteen participants in the 16 17 city and county of Honolulu, and asynchronous online classes 18 served seven participants from Kauai county and the city and 19 county of Honolulu.

20 Preliminary evaluation findings show that during the21 pandemic, the EnhanceFitness and Better Choices Better Health

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1 programs remained effective in all outcome measures. 2 Additionally, healthy aging partnership partners have gained 3 skills and experience in offering programming in alternative 4 formats. As COVID-19 restrictions ease, the healthy aging 5 partnership is ready to scale up programs in both remote and in-6 person formats to help more kupuna stay healthy. However, 7 limited funding for the partnership inhibits programs from 8 continuing and expanding to meet the needs of kupuna. 9 Currently, the partnership depends on stretching the state 10 appropriation for fiscal year 2019-2020 to maintain certain 11 program activities.

12 The legislature recognizes that, without continued funding, 13 the Hawaii healthy aging partnership may be forced to end. As a 14 result, the executive office on aging will fail to meet the 15 first goal of the Hawaii state plan on aging to maximize 16 opportunities for older adults to age well, remain active, and 17 enjoy life in their communities.

18 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to appropriate 19 funds for the Hawaii healthy aging partnership to continue to 20 improve the health and well-being of Hawaii's kupuna.

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1	SECTION 2. In accordance with section 9 of article VII of
2	the Hawaii State Constitution and sections 37-91 and 37-93,
3	Hawaii Revised Statutes, the legislature has determined that the
4	appropriations contained in Act 164, Regular Session of 2023,
5	and this Act will cause the state general fund expenditure
6	ceiling for fiscal year 2024-2025 to be exceeded by
7	\$ or per cent. This current declaration takes
8	into account general fund appropriations authorized for fiscal
9	year 2024-2025 in Act 164, Regular Session of 2023, and this Act
10	only. The reasons for exceeding the general fund expenditure
11	ceiling are that:
12	(1) The appropriation made in this Act is necessary to
13	serve the public interest; and
14	(2) The appropriation made in this Act meets the needs
15	addressed by this Act.
16	SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general
17	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
18	much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2024-2025 to
19	fund the Hawaii healthy aging partnership to improve the health
20	

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The sum appropriated shall be expended by the executive
office on aging of the department of health for the purposes of
this Act.

4 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 3000.
