A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE ENVIRONMENT.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that based on the 2 findings and recommendations of the house of representatives' 3 environmental remediation working group, the wildfires that 4 engulfed urban areas on Maui in August 2023 contained more toxic 5 chemicals than wildfires that simply consume wood and natural 6 Materials burned in urban fires can include materials. 7 household appliances, commercial appliances, vehicles, and 8 construction materials, which can leave behind a variety of 9 chemicals, contaminants, and debris that can persist in the 10 ecosystem.

11 The legislature further finds that conducting air quality 12 testing and contaminant testing is necessary to monitor the 13 short- and long-term risks of the August 2023 Maui wildfire to 14 the ecosystem, community, and environment. Various state 15 departments and organizations are conducting testing and 16 monitoring of air samples to determine any immediate risks, and

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long-term monitoring is preferable to evaluate whether there are 1 2 any long-term risks to human health and the ecosystem. 3 The purpose of this Act is to allocate funding for longterm monitoring of air quality in certain communities impacted 4 by the August 2023 Maui wildfire, as well as support for 5 research efforts to better understand the environmental concerns 6 7 linked to urban fires. 8 SECTION 2. There is appropriated out of the general 9 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2024-2025 for 10 long-term monitoring of air quality in communities impacted by 11 12 the August 2023 Maui wildfire, as well as support for research 13 efforts to better understand the environmental concerns linked 14 to urban fires; provided that the sum appropriated shall be 15 allocated as follows: 16 for the establishment of full-time (1) \$ 17 equivalent (FTE) permanent environmental health specialist IV positions; 18 19 (2) \$ for expanding Olowalu community air 20 sampling efforts, including equipment and maintenance; 21 and

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1 for expanding Lahaina community air (3) \$ sampling efforts, including equipment and maintenance. 2 3 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of 4 health for the purposes of this Act. SECTION 3. In accordance with section 9 of article VII of 5 6 the Hawaii State Constitution and sections 37-91 and 37-93, 7 Hawaii Revised Statutes, the legislature has determined that the appropriations contained in H.B. No. , will cause the state 8 9 general fund expenditure ceiling for fiscal year 2024-2025 to be per cent. In addition, the 10 exceeded by \$ or appropriation contained in this Act will cause the general fund 11 12 expenditure ceiling for fiscal year 2024-2025 to be further 13 per cent. The combined total exceeded by \$ or 14 amount of general fund appropriations contained in only these 15 two Acts will cause the state general fund expenditure ceiling 16 for fiscal year 2024-2025 to be exceeded by 17 per cent. The reasons for exceeding the \$ or general fund expenditure ceiling are that: 18 19 (1) The appropriation made in this Act is necessary to 20 serve the public interest; and

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- (2) The appropriation made in this Act meets the needs
 addressed by this Act.
- **3** SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 3000.
