A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO FIRE PROTECTION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the primary mission 2 of the state fire council is to develop and support a 3 comprehensive fire service emergency management network for the protection of life, property, and the environment for the State. 4 5 Among its many responsibilities, the state fire council is statutorily required to adopt the state fire code, administer 6 7 the reduced ignition propensity cigarettes law, and provide 8 assistance with the application and administration of federal 9 grants for fire-related projects. The state fire council may also, among other things, coordinate statewide training, data 10 11 collection, and contingency planning needs for firefighters; 12 advise the governor and legislature on matters related to fire 13 prevention, fire protection, and life safety; and establish 14 statewide qualifications and procedures for testing, certifying, 15 and credentialing individuals who perform maintenance and 16 testing of portable fire extinguishers, fire protection systems, 17 and fire alarm systems.

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The legislature further finds that despite the scope of its 1 responsibilities, the state fire council has been historically 2 underfunded. From its inception until 2001, the state fire 3 council had no funding for staff to fulfill its 4 5 responsibilities. Instead, the state fire council relied upon 6 county personnel to perform the council's duties along with county personnel's normal functions within their respective fire 7 8 departments. In 2001, the governor directed the department of 9 labor and industrial relations to allocate \$35,000 to fund the first part-time employee. Ten years later, the legislature 10 appropriated an additional \$71,000 to hire two additional 11 12 personnel. 13 In 2011, the legislature also established the reduced

14 ignition propensity cigarette program special fund for the 15 deposit of certification fees collected pursuant to the reduced 16 ignition propensity cigarette program. Moneys in the special 17 fund are administered and expended by the state fire council to 18 defray the actual cost of activities and requirements of the 19 reduced ignition propensity cigarette program, including 20 employing one full-time administrator and one full-time

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assistant. As of June 30, 2022, the reduced ignition propensity 1 2 cigarette program special fund has a balance of \$885,000. The state fire council now estimates that the annual 3 \$138,000 operational expenses for the reduced ignition 4 5 propensity cigarette program will exceed the estimated \$108,000 6 in certification fees collected. To ensure that the reduced 7 ignition propensity cigarette program remains solvent, state law 8 authorizes the state fire council to annually adjust the 9 certification fee to ensure that it defrays the actual costs of 10 the administration and staffing requirements and processing, 11 testing, enforcement, inspection, and oversight activities 12 required. Even with the annual overage of \$30,000, the 13 legislature finds that there is sufficient moneys in the reduced 14 ignition propensity cigarette program special fund to defray the 15 costs of fire-related programs and the hiring of administrative 16 personnel for several years.

Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to authorize moneys in the reduced ignition propensity cigarette program special fund to be administered and expended by the state fire council to defray the cost of statewide fire prevention, education, life safety, and preparedness programs, especially as those programs

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relate to youth, seniors, and persons with disabilities, 1 2 including the hiring of administrative personnel. SECTION 2. Section 132C-9, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 3 amended to read as follows: 4 "[+] §132C-9[+] Reduced ignition propensity cigarette 5 6 program special fund. (a) There [is] shall be established in 7 the state treasury a reduced ignition propensity cigarette 8 program special fund, into which shall be deposited all moneys 9 collected by the state fire council from the reduced ignition 10 propensity cigarette program pursuant to section 132C-4. All 11 interest earned or accrued on moneys deposited in the fund shall 12 become part of the fund. 13 (b) Moneys in the reduced ignition propensity cigarette 14 program special fund shall be administered and expended by the 15 state fire council to defray the actual cost of activities and 16 requirements of section 132C-4, including employing one 17 full-time administrator and one full-time assistant whose duties include: 18 19 Adopting administrative rules for program (1) implementation, establishing compliance inspections, 20

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1		and approving forms and enforcement procedures and
2		guidelines;
3	(2)	Receiving certifications for approximately [six] eight
4		hundred different brands and styles of cigarettes from
5		the manufacturers;
6	(3)	Compiling a list of the cigarette brands and styles
7		for which manufacturers have submitted certifications,
8		verifying tax stamp compliance with the department of
9		the attorney general, and posting the list of
10		certified brands and styles on a state website for
11	,	informational purposes only;
12	(4)	Reviewing and approving, as needed, any alternative
13		test methods or fire standard compliance markings
14		submitted by the manufacturer; and
15	(5)	If needed, submitting certified cigarettes to an
16		accredited laboratory for testing to verify that
17		performance standards have been met.
18	<u>(c)</u>	Moneys in the reduced ignition propensity cigarette
19	program sp	pecial fund may also be administered and expended by
20	the state	fire council to defray the cost of statewide fire
21	prevention	n, education, life safety, and preparedness programs,

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1	especially as those programs relate to youth, seniors, and
2	persons with disabilities, including the hiring of
3	administrative personnel."
4	SECTION 3. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
5	and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.

6 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 3000.
