
A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO HOUSING.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that there is a severe
2 housing shortage in Hawaii. The legislature further finds that
3 some religious institutions, educational institutions, and
4 medical institutions are willing to convert a portion of their
5 land to provide housing. It is not the intent of the
6 legislature to allow fly-by-night developers to create one of
7 these types of institutions solely to circumvent the normal
8 development process.

9 The purpose of this Act is to allow religious institutions,
10 educational institutions, and medical institutions to build
11 dwelling units on lands zoned within the state urban land use
12 district, under certain conditions.

13 SECTION 2. Section 46-4, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
14 amended to read as follows:

15 "**§46-4 County zoning.** (a) This section and any
16 ordinance, rule, or regulation adopted in accordance with this
17 section shall apply to lands not contained within the forest



1 reserve boundaries as established on January 31, 1957, or as
2 subsequently amended.

3 Zoning in all counties shall be accomplished within the
4 framework of a long-range, comprehensive general plan prepared
5 or being prepared to guide the overall future development of the
6 county. Zoning shall be one of the tools available to the
7 county to put the general plan into effect in an orderly manner.
8 Zoning in the counties of Hawaii, Maui, and Kauai means the
9 establishment of districts of such number, shape, and area, and
10 the adoption of regulations for each district to carry out the
11 purposes of this section. In establishing or regulating the
12 districts, full consideration shall be given to all available
13 data as to soil classification and physical use capabilities of
14 the land to allow and encourage the most beneficial use of the
15 land consonant with good zoning practices. The zoning power
16 granted ~~herein~~ in this section shall be exercised by
17 ordinance, which may relate to:

- 18 (1) The areas within which agriculture, forestry,
19 industry, trade, and business may be conducted;
20 (2) The areas in which residential uses may be regulated
21 or prohibited;



- 1 (3) The areas bordering natural watercourses, channels,
2 and streams, in which trades or industries, filling or
3 dumping, erection of structures, and the location of
4 buildings may be prohibited or restricted;
- 5 (4) The areas in which particular uses may be subjected to
6 special restrictions;
- 7 (5) The location of buildings and structures designed for
8 specific uses and designation of uses for which
9 buildings and structures [~~may~~] shall not be used or
10 altered;
- 11 (6) The location, height, bulk, number of stories, and
12 size of buildings and other structures;
- 13 (7) The location of roads, schools, and recreation areas;
- 14 (8) Building setback lines and future street lines;
- 15 (9) The density and distribution of population;
- 16 (10) The percentage of a lot that may be occupied, size of
17 yards, courts, and other open spaces;
- 18 (11) Minimum and maximum lot sizes; and
- 19 (12) Other regulations the boards or [~~city~~] council of any
20 county find necessary and proper to permit and



1 encourage the orderly development of land resources
2 within their jurisdictions.

3 The council of any county shall prescribe rules,
4 regulations, and administrative procedures and provide personnel
5 it finds necessary to enforce this section and any ordinance
6 enacted in accordance with this section. The ordinances may be
7 enforced by appropriate fines and penalties, civil or criminal,
8 or by court order at the suit of the county or the owner or
9 owners of real estate directly affected by the ordinances.

10 Any civil fine or penalty provided by ordinance under this
11 section may be imposed by the district court, or by the zoning
12 agency after an opportunity for a hearing pursuant to chapter
13 91. The proceeding shall not be a prerequisite for any
14 injunctive relief ordered by the circuit court.

15 Nothing in this section shall invalidate any zoning
16 ordinance or regulation adopted by any county or other agency of
17 government pursuant to the statutes in effect [~~prior to~~] before
18 July 1, 1957.

19 The powers granted [~~herein~~] in this section shall be
20 liberally construed in favor of the county exercising them, and
21 in [~~such~~] a manner [~~as to promote~~] that promotes the orderly



1 development of each county or city and county in accordance with
2 a long-range, comprehensive general plan to ensure the greatest
3 benefit for the State as a whole. This section shall not be
4 construed to limit or repeal any powers of any county to achieve
5 these ends through zoning and building regulations, except
6 insofar as forest and water reserve zones are concerned and as
7 provided in subsections (c) and [~~(d)~~] (e).

8 Neither this section nor any ordinance enacted pursuant to
9 this section shall prohibit the continued lawful use of any
10 building or premises for any trade, industrial, residential,
11 agricultural, or other purpose for which the building or
12 premises is used at the time this section or the ordinance takes
13 effect; provided that a zoning ordinance may provide for
14 elimination of nonconforming uses as the uses are discontinued,
15 or for the amortization or phasing out of nonconforming uses or
16 signs over a reasonable period of time in commercial,
17 industrial, resort, and apartment zoned areas only. In no event
18 shall [~~such~~] the amortization or phasing out of nonconforming
19 uses apply to any existing building or premises used for
20 residential (single-family or duplex) or agricultural uses.
21 Nothing in this section shall affect or impair the powers and



1 duties of the director of transportation as set forth in chapter
2 262.

3 (b) Any final order of a zoning agency established under
4 this section may be appealed to the circuit court of the circuit
5 in which the land in question is found. The appeal shall be in
6 accordance with the Hawaii rules of civil procedure.

7 (c) Each county may adopt reasonable standards to allow
8 the construction of two single-family dwelling units on any lot
9 where a residential dwelling unit is permitted.

10 (d) Notwithstanding any law, ordinance, or standard to the
11 contrary, a religious institution, educational institution, or
12 medical institution may build dwelling units on a parcel of land
13 the institution has owned before January 1, 2024, and that is
14 within the state urban land use district; provided that a county
15 may impose development standards as authorized under this
16 section; provided further that a county shall allow for at least
17 ten dwelling units per acre; provided further that this
18 subsection shall not apply to industrial areas, hazardous areas,
19 county powers within special management areas delineated
20 pursuant to part II of chapter 205A, or areas zoned for one
21 primary dwelling unit or less per acre.



1 Any proposed dwelling units developed pursuant to this
2 subsection shall be:

3 (1) Less than fifteen acres and no greater than fifty per
4 cent of the parcel area;

5 (2) Used for homeless services or long-term rentals, as
6 defined by each county; and

7 (3) Retained by the a religious institution, educational
8 institution, or medical institution for so long as the
9 institution remains in existence.

10 As used in this subsection:

11 "Educational institution" means any private educational
12 organization that has been granted tax-exempt status under
13 section 501(c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as
14 amended.

15 "Medical institution" means any organization that has a
16 certificate of need pursuant to part V of chapter 323D and been
17 incorporated in the State as a nonprofit corporation and that
18 has continuously operated and will be operated exclusively to
19 provide, or to contribute to the support of, organizations or
20 institutions organized and operated exclusively to provide



1 hospital, medical, research, or therapeutic services to the
2 public.

3 "Religious institution" means any religious institution or
4 organization that has been granted tax-exempt status under
5 section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code 1986, as amended;
6 does not restrict membership to persons on the basis of race,
7 color, or ancestry; and has no part of its earnings inured to
8 any private shareholder or individual.

9 ~~[(d)]~~ (e) Neither this section nor any other law, county
10 ordinance, or rule shall prohibit group living in facilities
11 with eight or fewer residents for purposes or functions that are
12 licensed, certified, registered, or monitored by the State;
13 provided that a resident manager or a resident supervisor and
14 the resident manager's or resident supervisor's family shall not
15 be included in this resident count. These group living
16 facilities shall meet all applicable county requirements not
17 inconsistent with the intent of this subsection, including but
18 not limited to building height, setback, maximum lot coverage,
19 parking, and floor area requirements.

20 ~~[(e)]~~ (f) Neither this section nor any other law, county
21 ordinance, or rule shall prohibit the use of land for employee



1 housing and community buildings in plantation community
2 subdivisions as defined in section 205-4.5(a)(12); in addition,
3 no zoning ordinance shall provide for the elimination,
4 amortization, or phasing out of plantation community
5 subdivisions as a nonconforming use.

6 ~~[(f)]~~ (g) Neither this section nor any other law, county
7 ordinance, or rule shall prohibit the use of land for medical
8 cannabis production centers or medical cannabis dispensaries
9 established and licensed pursuant to chapter 329D; provided that
10 the land is otherwise zoned for agriculture, manufacturing, or
11 retail purposes."

12 SECTION 3. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
13 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.

14 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 3000;
15 provided that on January 1, 2034, this Act shall be repealed and
16 section 46-4, Hawaii Revised Statutes, shall be reenacted in the
17 form in which it read on the day prior to the effective date of
18 this Act.
