H.B. NO. 2018

A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO MEDICAID.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that strengthening long-2 term care services and supports is of broad interest nationally and in the State. Recently, a Council of State Governments task 3 4 force on effective and sustainable long-term care included a 5 work group focused on sustainable funding. The department of human services med-QUEST division co-led the group, which 6 7 authored a short briefing paper with national, state, and local recommendations. One of the recommendations included a rate 8 9 study for home- and community-based services.

10 The legislature further finds that the department of human 11 services med-QUEST division completed a study of home- and community-based rates paid for community care foster family 12 homes, expanded adult residential care homes, and adult day 13 14 health and adult day care centers and other community-based services. The department of human services med-QUEST division 15 contracted Milliman, an actuarial firm, for a wide range of 16 services and to conduct the study. The study commenced in July 17

2022, and the department of human services med-QUEST division
 issued the final report on December 30, 2022.

3 The legislature also finds that a key part of the rate 4 study included stakeholder outreach and engagement with home-5 and community-based services providers and their associations, collecting provider cost and wage survey data, and getting 6 7 provider feedback on draft rate calculations. Not surprisingly, 8 the provider surveys showed significant wage pressure given the 9 current labor market. The rate study methodology used wage and 10 salary data for direct care staff and supervisors, employee-11 related expenses, transportation and administration, program 12 support, overhead, and United States Bureau of Labor Statistics and industry wage indices to pay for employee benefits such as 13 health insurance. 14

15 The legislature believes that the pandemic dramatically
16 impacted health care and long-term care delivery systems. Many
17 of these changes, particularly as they relate to patient
18 preferences, facility staffing practices, and technology
19 utilization, will persist long after the pandemic abates.
20 Accordingly, now is an opportune time to revisit prior thinking
21 about long-term care reimbursement and investigate ways that it

can be reimagined to promote patient care quality, support
 livable wages for staff, and maximize efficiency.

3 The legislature further finds that the department of human 4 services med-OUEST division should undertake rate studies to 5 better understand how the pandemic has shaped long-term care 6 providers. These studies should consider how patient 7 preferences have shifted away from institutional settings to home- and community-based settings; how patient needs evolve 8 9 with the aging population; the growing complexity of patient 10 care; and what can be done to align reimbursement with long-term 11 trends in the State. Specific attention is also necessary on 12 programs that reward high-quality care; incentivize accepting 13 and caring for medicaid beneficiaries, especially those with complex needs; pay wages necessary for the recruitment and 14 15 retention of staff across the long-term care continuum; and 16 consider the need to update the aging physical infrastructure of 17 many of the State's facilities.

18 The legislature also finds that it is important to focus on 19 home- and community-based services providers who serve groups 20 with high utilization of services and who have gone the longest 21 without a rate update, such as case management agencies,

1 community care foster family homes, adult residential care 2 homes, expanded adult residential care homes, and adult day health and adult day care centers. The Centers for Medicare and 3 Medicaid Services is also changing payment methods for nursing 4 5 facilities. State medicaid agencies will need to adopt new reimbursement methodologies that align with the new federal 6 7 payment system. These new systems create opportunities to 8 revise how providers of long-term care are reimbursed to better meet current and future needs. 9

10 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to appropriate 11 funds for the achievement of full funding, including estimated 12 payment increases, of medicaid home- and community-based 13 services.

14 SECTION 2. There is appropriated out of the general revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ 15 or so 16 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2024-2025 for the achievement of full funding, including estimated payment 17 18 increases, of medicaid home- and community-based services; 19 provided that the department of human services shall obtain the maximum federal matching funds available for this expenditure; 20 21 provided further that the department of human services shall

pursue all funding sources known to the State, including private
 grants, prior to expending any general revenues appropriated
 pursuant to this Act.

4 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of5 human services for the purposes of this Act.

6 SECTION 3. In accordance with section 9 of article VII of 7 the Hawaii State Constitution and sections 37-91 and 37-93, 8 Hawaii Revised Statutes, the legislature has determined that the 9 appropriations contained in Act 164, Regular Session of 2023, 10 and this Act will cause the state general fund expenditure 11 ceiling for fiscal year 2024-2025 to be exceeded by

12 \$ or per cent. This current declaration takes 13 into account general fund appropriations authorized for fiscal 14 year 2024-2025 in Act 164, Regular Session of 2023, and this Act 15 only. The reasons for exceeding the general fund expenditure 16 ceiling are that:

17 (1) The appropriation made in this Act is necessary to18 serve the public interest; and

19 (2) The appropriation made in this Act meets the needs20 addressed by this Act.
