# A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO PHARMACISTS.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that on May 8, 2020, the 2 Centers for Disease Control and Prevention reported that "the identified declines in routine pediatric vaccine ordering and 3 4 doses administered might indicate that U.S. children and their communities face increased risks for outbreaks of vaccine 5 preventable diseases" and suggested that a decrease in rates of 6 routine childhood vaccinations were due to changes in health 7 care access, social distancing, and other coronavirus disease 8 2019 (COVID-19) pandemic mitigation strategies. The legislature 9 also finds that during the 2018-2019 flu season, nearly a third 10 of all adult influenza vaccines were provided at a community 11 pharmacy. Pharmacies are vital to the State's health care 12 system because of their convenient points of access in their 13 communities. Additionally, pharmacists are trusted health care 14 15 professionals who have established relationships with their patients and often offer extended hours and added convenience. 16 17 Pharmacists are well positioned to increase access to



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vaccinations, particularly in medically underserved areas or for
certain populations who have a limited number of pediatricians
or primary care providers.

The legislature further finds that amendments made to the 4 5 federal Public Readiness and Emergency Preparedness Act, Pub. L. 6 109-148, division C (PREP Act), during the COVID-19 pandemic authorized pharmacists and pharmacy interns to administer 7 vaccines to persons three years of age or older. This 8 9 authorization is currently slated to end on December 31, 2024. 10 Prior to the amendments made to the PREP Act, Hawaii law only 11 authorized pharmacists to administer a limited number of 12 vaccines to children between the ages of eleven and seventeen 13 and required a valid prescription before the vaccine could be 14 administered.

15 The legislature finds that permanently codifying in state 16 law the amendments to the PREP Act that authorize pharmacists to 17 vaccinate persons three years of age or older will continue to 18 allow and expand the role of trained and certified pharmacists 19 to administer vaccines to their communities in Hawaii. 20 Additionally, as the department of health has ceased offering 21 flu vaccinations for school-aged children at department schools,



1 permanently authorizing pharmacists to vaccinate persons three 2 years of age or older will ensure these children continue to be 3 protected against influenza and other highly contagious 4 diseases. 5 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to: 6 (1)Authorize licensed pharmacists to administer vaccines 7 to persons three years of age or older; 8 (2) Authorize pharmacy interns and pharmacy technicians 9 under the direct supervision of a pharmacist to 10 administer vaccines to persons three years of age or 11 older, if certain requirements are met; and 12 (3) Authorize licensed pharmacists to order the 13 administration of vaccines for persons three years of 14 age or older. 15 SECTION 2. Section 461-1, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 16 amended by amending the definition of "practice of pharmacy" to 17 read as follows: ""Practice of pharmacy" means: 18 19 (1) The interpretation and evaluation of prescription 20 orders; the compounding, dispensing, and labeling of 21 drugs and devices (except labeling by a manufacturer,

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packer, or distributor of nonprescription drugs and 1 commercially legend drugs and devices); the 2 3 participation in drug selection and drug utilization reviews; the proper and safe storage of drugs and 4 devices and the maintenance of proper records 5 therefor; the responsibility for advising when 6 7 necessary or where regulated, of therapeutic values, content, hazards, and use of drugs and devices; and 8 the interpretation and evaluation of prescription 9 10 orders to adjust the supply dispensed for purposes of 11 medication synchronization pursuant to section 12 431:10A-606, 432:1-621, or 432D-30; Performing the following procedures or functions as 13 (2) 14 part of the care provided by and in concurrence with a 15 ["health care facility"] health care facility and ["health care service"] health care service as defined 16 17 in section 323D-2; [or a-"pharmacy"; or a] pharmacy; 18 licensed physician, [a] licensed physician assistant, 19 or [a] licensed advanced practice registered nurse with prescriptive authority; or [a "managed-care 20 plan"] managed care plan as defined in section 432E-1, 21

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1 in accordance with policies, procedures, or protocols 2 developed collaboratively by health professionals, 3 including physicians and surgeons, pharmacists, physician assistants, and registered nurses, and for 4 5 which a pharmacist has received appropriate training 6 required by these policies, procedures, or protocols: 7 (A) Ordering or performing routine drug therapy 8 related patient assessment procedures; 9 (B) Ordering drug therapy related laboratory tests; 10 (C) Initiating emergency contraception oral drug 11 therapy in accordance with a written 12 collaborative agreement approved by the board, 13 between a licensed physician, physician 14 assistant, or advanced practice registered nurse 15 with prescriptive authority and a pharmacist who 16 has received appropriate training that includes 17 programs approved by the Accreditation Council 18 for Pharmacy Education (ACPE), curriculum-based 19 programs from an ACPE-accredited college of 20 pharmacy, state or local health department 21 programs, or programs recognized by the board;



1 Administering drugs orally, topically, by (D) intranasal delivery, or by injection, pursuant to 2 3 the order of the patient's licensed physician, 4 physician assistant, or advanced practice 5 registered nurse with prescriptive authority, by a pharmacist having appropriate training that 6 7 includes programs approved by the ACPE, 8 curriculum-based programs from an ACPE-accredited 9 college of pharmacy, state or local health 10 department programs, or programs recognized by 11 the board; 12 (E) Administering [+

13 (i) Immunizations] immunizations orally, by 14 injection, or by intranasal delivery, to 15 persons [eighteen] three years of age or 16 older by a pharmacist having appropriate 17 training that includes programs approved by 18 the ACPE, curriculum-based programs from an 19 ACPE-accredited college of pharmacy, state 20 or local health department programs, or 21 programs recognized by the board [+

16	(1) A vaccine to persons between fourteen and seventeen
17	years of age pursuant to a valid prescription; and
18	(2) A human-papillomavirus, Tdap (tetanus, diphtheria,
19	pertussis), meningococcal, or influenza vaccine to
20	persons between eleven and seventeen years of age
21	pursuant-to-a-valid-prescription.

11		technician has reviewed the patient's vaccination
12		records before administering the vaccine;
13	(9)	The pharmacist has informed the patient and the
14		patient's primary guardian or caregiver of the
15		importance of a well-child visit with a pediatrician
16		or other licensed primary care provider and has
17		referred the patient as appropriate; and
18	(10)	Where a prescription has been ordered by a person
19		other than the pharmacist, the pharmacist, pharmacy
20		intern, or pharmacy technician shall verify that the

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1		prescriber or the prescriber's authorized agent is the
2		patient's medical home.
3	(b)	After the vaccination is administered, the pharmacist $\underline{\prime}$
4	pharmacy i	ntern, or pharmacy technician under the direct
5	supervisio	on of a pharmacist shall immediately provide to the
6	patient a	vaccination record including the following
7	information:	
8	(1)	The patient's name and date of birth;
9	(2)	The type of vaccine administered; and
10	(3)	The date and location that the vaccine was
11		administered.
12	(C)	The pharmacist, pharmacy intern, or pharmacy
13	technician	under the direct supervision of a pharmacist shall
14	make a goo	od faith effort to provide within seventy-two hours to
15	the medica	I home and within five business days to the department
16	of health	immunization registry the same information provided to
17	the patien	t pursuant to subsection (b) as well as the following:
18	(1)	The name of the vaccine product that was administered,
19		including the manufacturer, lot number, and expiration
20		date;
21	(2)	The method of administration; and



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1 (3) The anatomical site of administration. 2 (d) [All] In addition to the requirements of subsection 3 (a), all pharmacists, pharmacy interns, and pharmacy technicians under the direct supervision of a pharmacist who administer 4 vaccines to persons [between the ages of fourteen and seventeen 5 years or administer human papillomavirus, Tdap-(tetanus, 6 7 diphtheria, pertussis), meningococcal, and influenza vaccines to 8 persons between the ages of eleven and seventeen years] three years of age or older shall complete a training program approved 9 10 by the Accreditation Council of Pharmacy Education for which a 11 certificate of completion is issued. The pharmacist, pharmacy 12 intern, or pharmacy technician shall complete the training 13 program and submit the completion certificate for the training 14 program to the board [prior to] before administering any vaccine 15 to persons [between the ages of fourteen and seventeen-years and 16 prior to administering any human papillomavirus, Tdap (tetanus, 17 diphtheria, pertussis), meningococcal, or influenza vaccine to 18 persons between the ages of eleven and seventeen years.] three 19 years of age or older."

20 SECTION 5. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed21 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.





## 1 SECTION 6. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 3000.





#### Report Title:

Pharmacists; Pharmacy Interns; Pharmacy Technicians; Minors; Vaccinations

#### Description:

Authorizes pharmacists to administer vaccines to persons three years of age or older. Authorizes pharmacy interns and pharmacy technicians under the direct supervision of a pharmacist to administer vaccinations to persons three years of age or older, if certain requirements are met.
