A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO FIREWORKS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the use of illegal 1 fireworks is both a nuisance to residents and concerning to the 2 elected officials of Hawaii. Despite the city and county of 3 Honolulu's ban on most consumer fireworks in 2010, the problems 4 associated with illegal aerial fireworks have not been solved, 5 and in fact seem to have gotten worse in recent years. Videos 6 taken and shared of New Year's Eve 2021 celebrations on Oahu 7 were a stark illustration of just how ineffective current 8 measures are at curbing the importation and distribution of 9 10 illegal fireworks.

11 The legislature further finds that the 2016 New Year's 12 celebration on Oahu saw a significant increase in the use of 13 illegal aerial fireworks. From November through December of 14 2015, more than three thousand complaints were made to the 15 Honolulu police department regarding fireworks usage. The 16 number of arrests for fireworks violations also increased over 17 this time and a historical home in Ewa caught fire and sustained

thousands of dollars of damage as a result of an illegal aerial
firework. The ease of importing illegal explosives into the
State is a public safety concern that impacts all Hawaii
residents and businesses.

The legislature further finds that the inspection of 5 shipping containers, whether by the State or counties, is a 6 major element in the fight against terrorism and illegal 7 fireworks. Particularly in light of the State's geographical 8 isolation and the numerous containers arriving by ship, it is 9 10 imperative that the State broaden its inspection of incoming shipping containers. Over ninety per cent of more than two 11 hundred thousand shipping cargo containers that arrive in Hawaii 12 each year are from the continental United States. Only a small 13 fraction of these containers, however, are inspected by 14 government agencies. The lack of sufficient cargo inspections 15 means that there is ample opportunity for illegal fireworks and 16 explosives to be smuggled into the State. The legislature also 17 finds that increased inspections need to be carefully crafted to 18 avoid delays and inefficiencies in harbor operations that could 19 20 impede commerce.

1	The legislature further finds that the report of the
2	illegal fireworks task force to the legislature for the regular
3	session of 2011, which was prepared in accordance with Act 170,
4	Session Laws of Hawaii 2010, made recommendations in an effort
5	to reduce illegal firework use and importation. These
6	recommendations include increased fireworks fees and fines,
7	increased random inspections of cargo containers, and promotion
8	of cooperation among stakeholders.
9	The purpose of this Act is to implement certain
10	recommendations from the report of the illegal fireworks task
11	force to the legislature for the regular session of 2011 and
12	establish a shipping container inspection program using x-ray
13	scanners to inspect cargo shipments after arrival at the
14	harbors.
15	SECTION 2. Chapter 266, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended
16	by adding three new sections to be appropriately designated and
17	to read as follows:
18	" <u>§266-A</u> Power to inspect shipping containers. (a) In
19	addition to any other powers provided by law, the department of
20	public safety, sheriff division, may in its discretion inspect
21	any shipping container situated anywhere at any commercial

1	harbor, as defined in section 266-1, or work site to detect and
2	confiscate any material constituting a threat directly or
3	indirectly to the security of life or property in Hawaii,
4	including explosives, but excluding fireworks regulated under
5	chapter 132D.
6	(b) The department of public safety, sheriff division, may
7	collaborate with any federal agency, including any of the United
8	States armed services, and state and county agencies to
9	effectuate this section. The department of public safety shall
10	serve as the lead state agency to coordinate the inspection of
11	shipping containers pursuant to this section.
12	(c) This section shall supersede any labor work rules or
13	contracts that are contrary to the intent of this section.
14	§266-B Shipping container inspection program. (a) The
15	department of public safety, in collaboration with the
16	departments of defense and transportation, and any federal
17	agencies, including any of the United States armed services,
18	state agencies, and private organizations involved with shipping
19	cargo into the State, shall develop and implement a program to
20	randomly inspect shipping containers arriving in Honolulu for

18		contents to construct fireworks, articles pyrotechnic,
19		or a fireworks or articles pyrotechnic related device
20		shall be guilty of a [misdemeanor.] <u>class C felony.</u>

(b) Except as provided in subsection (a) or as otherwise 1 specifically provided for in this chapter, any person violating 2 any other provision of this chapter, shall be fined not more 3 than [\$5,000] \$10,000 for each violation. Notwithstanding any 4 provision to the contrary in this section, any person violating 5 section 132D-14.5 shall be fined at least \$500 and no more than 6 7 \$2,000. (c) The court shall collect the fines imposed in 8 subsections (a) and (b) for violating this chapter and, of the 9 fines collected, shall pay twenty per cent to the State and 10 eighty per cent to the county in which the fine was imposed 11 12 which shall be expended by the county for law enforcement 13 purposes. Notwithstanding any penalty set forth herein, 14 (d) violations of subsection (a) (1) or (3) may be subject to 15 nuisance abatement proceedings provided in part V of chapter 16 17 712." 18 SECTION 4. No later than twenty days prior to the convening of the 2024 and 2025 regular sessions, the department 19 20 of public safety shall submit to the legislature a report on the

established pursuant to this Act. The report shall include
findings and recommendations, including costs expended to date,
the estimated cost of operating the program, and any proposed
legislation.

5 SECTION 5. There is appropriated out of the general 6 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$250,000 or so much 7 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2023-2024 and the 8 same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 9 2024-2025 to be deposited into the shipping container inspection 10 program special fund established pursuant to this Act.

SECTION 6. There is appropriated out of the shipping 11 container inspection program special fund the sum of \$250,000 or 12 so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2023-2024 13 14 and the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for 15 fiscal year 2024-2025 for costs to establish and administer the shipping container inspection program, including the purchase, 16 care, and handling of at least two container X-ray scanning 17 18 portals.

19 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of20 public safety for the purposes of this Act.

2	2 of this Act, the revisor of statutes shall substitute
3	appropriate section numbers for the letters used in designating
4	the new sections in this Act.
5	SECTION 8. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
6	and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
7	SECTION 9. This Act shall take effect upon its approval;
8	provided that sections 5 and 6 of this Act shall take effect on
9	July 1, 2023.

HB HMIA 2023-39-01

Authorizes Department of Public Safety to inspect shipping containers for illegal fireworks and explosives. Establishes a shipping container inspection program using X-ray scanning portals and associated special fund. Authorizes Department of Transportation to impose shipping container import fees. Increases fine and punishment for fireworks violations.
