

HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

URGING THE STATE TO PROHIBIT THE INTRODUCTION OF BIOCONTROL AGENTS THAT MIGHT THREATEN ECONOMICALLY IMPORTANT FORAGE GRASS SPECIES.

WHEREAS, Hawaii's beef cattle production is a major 1 2 agricultural industry in the State and contributes over \$48,000,000 to the state economy each year; and 3 4 5 WHEREAS, the beef cattle industry contributes to the economy through job creation, business and property taxes, 6 purchasing of goods and services, and the sale of animals and 7 meat products, which in turn helps to improve the State's food 8 9 security; and 10 WHEREAS, Hawaii's rangelands represent approximately twenty 11 percent, or 750,000 acres, of the total land mass in the State; 12 13 and 14 WHEREAS, these rangelands also play a vital role for all 15 communities of the State through the ecosystem services which 16 flow from these lands such as stabilizing soils, enhancing the 17 18 watershed capacity, sequestering carbon, cycling nutrients, and 19 suppressing noxious weeds; and 20 21 WHEREAS, ranchers play a critical role in managing lands and reducing fuels loads by utilizing cattle to manage the 22 ground cover to minimize bare soil and erosion, maximize water 23 24 infiltration, improve soil health, and decrease the spread of 25 noxious weeds while generating operating income that pays for their resource management to continue; and 26 27 WHEREAS, without ranchers and the land stewardship they 28 29 provide, these rangelands would be left unmanaged and become inundated with noxious weeds and an increased fire fuel load; 30 31 and



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WHEREAS, today the State's beef cattle industry is 2 dependent on many forage grasses that were intentionally 3 introduced into the State to support livestock production and 4 that remain necessary, not only to help feed the communities 5 across the islands of the State, but also to provide important 6 manageable and sustainable ground cover, which is functionally 7 important for the ecology of Hawaii's rangelands; and 8 9 WHEREAS, these important forage grasses are increasingly 10 being labeled as "invasive" and targeted for control or 11 eradication by individuals and organizations without due regard 12 13 for the adverse impact that this eradication would have on 14 ranchers and in turn the stewardship role they play; and 15 16 WHEREAS, livestock grazing is the single most important and 17 practical tool to manage introduced forage grasses at the landscape scale to reduce the threat of fire along the wildland 18 urban interface; and 19 20 WHEREAS, the Legislature recognizes the economic and 21 22 environmental contributions and the importance of ranching and 23 beef cattle production; and 24 25 WHEREAS, the Legislature also recognizes the importance of high-quality forage grasses for the beef cattle industry to 26 27 remain viable to continue to steward the land that ranchers 28 consider their kuleana (responsibility) to care for and enhance; 29 now, therefore, 30 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 31 Thirty-second Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular 32 33 Session of 2024, the Senate concurring, that the State is urged 34 to prohibit the introduction of biocontrol agents that might 35 threaten economically important forage grass species; and 36 37 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED the State is also requested to consider a holistic approach to address wildfire risk by 38 prioritizing fuel reduction of unmanaged lands that can utilize 39 40 a variety of tools including grazing, creation of fire buffers, 41 mechanical controls, and the consideration of the use of applicable strategies for landscape level control, so long that 42 it takes into consideration economic and ecological implications 43 44 as well as potential impacts to critical industries; and HCR189 HD1



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1 2 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the State is urged to provide 3 for the protection of Hawaii's rangelands and important forage grass species that sustain beef cattle production through 4 5 funding policies, initiatives, and directives to state agencies to incentivize livestock grazing for the management of forage 6 grasses and other vegetation on lands managed by the State and 7 private sector that are currently undermanaged; and 8 9 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 10 11 Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Governor, Chairperson of the Board of Agriculture, and mayor of each 12 13 county. 14 15 16
