

HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII ECONOMIC RESEARCH ORGANIZATION TO CONDUCT A STUDY OF WAYS TO INCREASE ACCESS TO SUPPLEMENTAL NUTRITION ASSISTANCE PROGRAM BENEFITS.

1	WHEREAS, many low-income households struggle to purchase
2	food due to Hawaii's high cost of living and food prices; and
3 4	WHEREAS, more than one in six residents experience food
5	insecurity; and
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7	WHEREAS, the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program
8	(SNAP), formerly known as the food stamp program, is crucial in
9	providing food assistance to some of Hawaii's most economically
10	disadvantaged residents; and
11	MURDENC beweekelde with incomes that and two hundred
12	WHEREAS, households with incomes that are two hundred percent above the federal poverty level are ineligible for SNAP;

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16	WHEREAS, the 2023 United For ALICE (Asset Limited, Income
17	Constrained, Employed) report highlighted that a family of four
18	with a household income of \$69,000 per year is ineligible for
19	SNAP benefits but needs an income of over \$100,000 per year to
20	meet basic needs, including food and housing; and
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22	WHEREAS, if the same family earned just \$1,000 less per
23	year, or \$68,000, the family would be eligible to receive more
24	than \$9,000 in SNAP benefits; and
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26	WHEREAS, the two hundred percent poverty level income
27	eligibility cutoff for SNAP assistance creates a benefits cliff
28 29	that disincentivizes individuals from reaching their greatest earning potential; and

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WHEREAS, many families just below SNAP's income eligibility 1 threshold decline pay increases because the financial benefit of 2 increased economic opportunities does not exceed the potential 3 cost of losing SNAP benefits; and 4 5 WHEREAS, SNAP is a highly effective anti-hunger initiative 6 throughout the country; in Hawaii, SNAP supports over one 7 hundred thirty thousand individuals and brings more than 8 9 \$630,000,000 into the State's economy each year; and 10 WHEREAS, many families with incomes below the two hundred 11 12 percent poverty level are ineligible for SNAP benefits for other reasons, such as citizenship status; and 13 14 15 WHEREAS, many families who are eligible for SNAP are not 16 enrolled; and 17 WHEREAS, addressing the problem posed by the SNAP benefits 18 cliff would help economically vulnerable households meet their 19 20 basic needs without limiting their earning potential; now, 21 therefore, 22 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 23 Thirty-second Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular 24 Session of 2024, the Senate concurring, that the University of 25 Hawaii Economic Research Organization is requested to conduct a 26 study of ways to increase access to Supplemental Nutrition 27 28 Assistance Program benefits; and 29 30 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the study is requested to include: 31 32 33 (1)Public policy options for addressing the benefits cliff created by SNAP's eligibility requirements, 34 including a cost-benefit analysis of expanding 35 36 eligibility to households that are three hundred percent above the federal poverty level; 37 38 An estimate of the number of Hawaii residents whose (2) 39 income is below the three hundred percent federal 40 poverty level and who may become eligible for SNAP 41 42 benefits if the State expands income eligibility to 43 this level; 44



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(3) An estimate of the number of residents who are 1 2 currently eligible for SNAP, but not enrolled; and 3 4 (4) Other issues that the University of Hawaii Economic Research Organization determines to be important in 5 6 increasing access to SNAP benefits; and 7 8 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that all relevant State departments 9 and agencies, including the Department of Human Services, Department of Labor and Industrial Relations, and the Department 10 of Taxation, are requested to provide access to any information 11 and data that the University of Hawaii Economic Research 12 Organization asks for to successfully complete the study; and 13 14 15 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the University of Hawaii Economic Research Organization is requested to submit an interim 16 17 preliminary report of its findings and recommendations, 18 including any proposed legislation, to the Legislature no later 19 than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session 20 of 2025; and 21 22 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the University of Hawaii 23 Economic Research Organization is requested to submit a final 24 report of its findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the Legislature no later than twenty 25 26 days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2026; and 27 28 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Governor, Lieutenant 29 Governor, Director of Human Services, and Executive Director of 30 the University of Hawaii Economic Research Organization. 31



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
