## HOUSE RESOLUTION

RESOLVING TO END HOMELESSNESS ON MAUI

1	WHEREAS, Hawai'i has one of the most severe homelessness			
2	epidemics In the U.S.A.; and			
3				
4	WHEREAS, the 2023 point in time count determined			
5	there were 6223 homeless in the state of Hawaii and 704 on Maui			
6	before the August 8, 2023 wildfires; and			
7 8	WHEDERC non the U.C. Depertment of Heuring and Heben			
8 9	WHEREAS, per the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development's 2023 Annual Homeless Assessment Report, Hawai'i			
9 10	had the highest percentage of people experiencing chronic			
11	homelessness; and			
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13	WHEREAS, Hawai'i also had the third highest rate of			
14	homeless youth staying in unsheltered locations; and			
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16	WHEREAS, recent Maui Fires have increased homelessness ; and			
17				
18	WHEREAS, homelessness can have many causes including family			
19	violence, limited housing opportunities, lack of adequate			
20	employment, substance addiction, mental/physical health			
21	conditions, trauma, lack of adequate employment and other			
22 23	factors; and			
23 24	WHEREAS, Hawai'i's housing costs are extremely high and			
25	average incomes fail to meet criteria for rentals; and			
26				
27	WHEREAS, the price of housing in Hawai'i is a large factor			
28	in why the homeless population is growing; and			
29				
30	WHEREAS, it is extremely difficult to find affordable			
31	housing in Hawai'i; and			

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1 2 WHEREAS, native Hawai'ians are particularly susceptible to 3 homelessness; and 4 5 WHEREAS, housing people reduces suffering; and 6 7 WHEREAS, housing people reduces medical costs; and 8 9 WHEREAS, living on the streets frequently leads to an early death; now, therefore, 10 11 12 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the Thirtysecond Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 13 2024, that significantly increased efforts must be made to house 14 15 people in Hawai'i; and 16 17 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that we request the Governor and his Coordinator on Homelessness and Housing Solutions to secure a 18 viable location on Maui and build at least 450 homes for the 19 displaced victims of the Lahaina wildfires; and 20 21 22 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that request the Governor and his Coordinator on Homelessness and Housing Solutions to secure at 23 least two different geographic locations on Maui to build a 24 25 Kauhale for any displaced Lahaina wildfire victims as well as homeless prior to the August 8, 2023 wildfires and ensure 26 outreach services to provide for mental health, crisis 27 28 stabilization, along with any wraparound social services for all residents of the new housing units; and 29 30 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that Maui needs to house an 31 estimated 800 homeless and the State will move forward with 32 33 compassion and aloha to help these people by constructing new housing housing units on Maui; and 34 35 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the State and the people of 36 Hawai'i want to house the houseless, shelter those with no 37 shelter, and find homes for all of the housing insecure; and 38 39 40 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this Resolution be transmitted to The Honorable Governor Joshua 41
