HOUSE RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE BOARD OF EDUCATION, IN PARTNERSHIP WITH THE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION, TO PRODUCE A PLAN FOR ADHERING TO SCHOOL COUNSELOR BEST PRACTICES.

WHEREAS, school counselors play a critical role in ensuring 1 2 students' academic, career, social, and emotional development 3 and in promoting equity and access to opportunities and educational experiences for all students; and 4 5 6 WHEREAS, school counselors support students' postsecondary 7 access and success by helping them navigate the college 8 admissions process, explore career opportunities, and develop 9 essential life skills; and 10 WHEREAS, school counselors also provide preventative and 11 responsive services, such as individual student planning and 12 13 systems support, to help students overcome barriers that may impede their academic and postsecondary success; and 14 15 WHEREAS, just half of Hawaii public school graduates in the 16 2022-2023 school year enrolled in a postsecondary education 17 institution in the fall after graduation; and 18 19 WHEREAS, students are at risk of the "summer melt" 20 21 phenomenon, whereby about ten to twenty percent of high school graduates who apply and are accepted to college - most of which 22 are low-income - choose not to attend; and 23 24 WHEREAS, the progression of students from high school to 25 postsecondary education and career readiness requires year-round 26 27 support, including during the summer months when important transitions occur; and 28 29 30 WHEREAS, having a twelve-month school counselor can ensure continuity of support for students, particularly for those who 31 may not have access to such support outside of school; and 32

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1 WHEREAS, grant-funded summer transition programs through 2 3 local organizations, such as Hawaii P-20, have served more than 4 four thousand students between 2020 and 2023, helping them 5 access over \$3,500,000 in scholarships; and 6 7 WHEREAS, students also benefit from more individualized 8 attention from their school counselors; and 9 10 WHEREAS, the American School Counselor Association (ASCA) recommends a student-to-school counselor ratio of two-hundred-11 12 to-one to effectively address the comprehensive needs of all 13 students, yet just sixty-two percent of Hawaii public middle and high schools meet this recommendation; and 14 15 WHEREAS, the ASCA recommends that a minimum of eighty 16 percent of a school counselor's time should be spent in direct 17 and indirect student services, yet Hawaii public middle and high 18 school counselors report only being able to spend seventy-three 19 percent of their time on these services; and 20 21 22 WHEREAS, the ASCA provides a clear definition of the appropriate activities that should be the focus of counselors to 23 24 maximize impact for students, yet Hawaii public intermediate, 25 middle, and high school counselors report having a more clearly 26 defined job description as one of their top needs; now, 27 therefore, 28 29 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the Thirty-second Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular 30 31 Session of 2024, that the Board of Education, in partnership with the Department of Education, is requested to produce a plan 32 for adhering to school counselor best practices; and 33 34 35 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that in preparing the plan, the 36 Board of Education is requested to include the following: 37 38 (1) How the Department of Education can ensure that every 39 public high school in the State can be staffed with at least one full-time, twelve-month school counselor, in 40 accordance with the ASCA's recommended student-to-41 42 counselor ratio;
