HOUSE RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE OFFICE OF HAWAIIAN AFFAIRS TO IDENTIFY THE SCOPE OF NATIVE HAWAIIAN CULTURAL APPROPRIATENESS FOR THE PURPOSE OF ADDRESSING NATIVE HAWAIIAN DISPARITIES.

WHEREAS, Native Hawaiians confront pronounced disparities 1 and inequities in crucial aspects of life, including but not 2 limited to health, housing, education, economics, and identity; 3 4 and 5 WHEREAS, the State has recognized Native Hawaiians "as the 6 7 only indigenous, aboriginal, maoli people of Hawaii"; and 8 WHEREAS, Native Hawaiians have suffered historical 9 injustices that have deprived them of sovereignty and the 10 exercise of self-determination, which has stifled their socio-11 political-economic development; and 12 13 WHEREAS, Public Law 103-150, informally known as the 14 Apology Resolution, recognized that economic and social changes 15 in Hawaii have been devastating to the health and well-being of 16 Native Hawaiians; and 17 18 WHEREAS, the State, on the condition of its admission into 19 the Union, was entrusted with continuously pursuing the 20 betterment of conditions of Native Hawaiians; and 21 22 WHEREAS, enduring structural racism, rooted in historical 23 injustices, has yet to be dismantled and continues to exacerbate 24 the adversities faced by Native Hawaiians; and 25 26 WHEREAS, Native Hawaiians inherently possess the capacity 27 28 to formulate their own solutions, necessitating the creation of opportunities for their advancement, unburdened by systemic 29 oppression, and concurrently, ensuring that the State fulfills 30 its obligation to support the pursuit of equity; and 31 32

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WHEREAS, Native Hawaiian traditional knowledge not only 1 2 contributes to addressing ecological challenges, such as climate change, but also holds immeasurable value in guiding all policy 3 processes aimed at improving the well-being of Native Hawaiians 4 and the broader community; and 5 6 WHEREAS, the State lacks a comprehensive guiding document 7 on Native Hawaiian cultural appropriateness to inform decision-8 making in an inclusive, respectful, and effective manner that is 9 sensitive to Native Hawaiian cultural identity and heritage in 10 accordance with the interests and aspirations of Native 11 Hawaiians; and 12 13 14 WHEREAS, cultural appropriateness in economic development may involve prioritizing the role of Native Hawaiian traditional 15 16 knowledge and empowering Native Hawaiian leadership and entrepreneurship over its use, while establishing culturally 17 relevant pathways for workforce development, industry and sector 18 adaptation, and business ecosystem establishment to meet the 19 20 unique needs of Native Hawaiians; and 21 WHEREAS, cultural appropriateness in education may involve 22 culturally responsive teaching, learning environments, and 23 policies that connect Native Hawaiian culture, language, and 24 life experiences with Native Hawaiian learners to meet the 25 unique needs of Native Hawaiians; and 26 27 28 WHEREAS, cultural appropriateness in health care may 29 involve adhering to Native Hawaiian frameworks for achieving social and health equity and emphasizing cultural competence as 30 the ability of providers and organizations to effectively 31 32 deliver health care services to meet the unique needs of Native Hawaiians; and 33 34 WHEREAS, cultural appropriateness in housing may involve 35 elevating traditional housing concepts for integration into 36 modern planning and development and adapting these systems to 37 meet the unique needs of Native Hawaiians; and 38 39 WHEREAS, the breadth of existing guidance on cultural 40 appropriateness is extensive and diverse, yet dispersed across 41

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1 various sources, thereby underscoring the imperative necessity to consolidate and expand upon this guidance; and 2 3 WHEREAS, the Office of Hawaiian Affairs, as the 4 constitutionally established principal public agency in the 5 State with the purpose to continuously pursue the betterment of 6 conditions of Native Hawaiians, is the most appropriate entity 7 to identify the scope of Native Hawaiian cultural 8 appropriateness in policy processes in the State; now, 9 10 therefore, 11 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 12 13 Thirty-second Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2024, that the Office of Hawaiian Affairs is 14 requested to identify the scope of Native Hawaiian cultural 15 appropriateness for the purpose of addressing Native Hawaiian 16 disparities with emphasis on the following priority areas: 17 18 19 (1) Native Hawaiian economic development needs; 20 (2) Native Hawaiian education needs; 21 22 (3) Native Hawaiian health needs; and 23 24 25 (4) Native Hawaiian housing needs; and 26 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Office of Hawaiian Affairs 27 28 is requested to consult with agencies of the State and relevant stakeholders, in addition to other Native Hawaiian communities 29 and organizations deemed appropriate; and 30 31 32 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Office of Hawaiian Affairs is requested to submit a report of its findings and 33 34 recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of 35 the Regular Sessions of 2025 and 2027; and 36 37 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 38 Resolution be transmitted to the Governor; Chairperson of the 39 Board of Trustees of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs; Chairperson 40 of the Board of Agriculture; Director of Business, Economic 41 Development, and Tourism; Chairperson of the Board of Education; 42

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Superintendent of Education; Director of Health; Director of
Human Services; Chairperson of the Board of Land and Natural
Resources; President of the University of Hawaii; and
Chairperson of the State Council on Developmental Disabilities.
