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## HOUSE RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN SERVICES TO CONVENE A BABY BONDS WORKING GROUP.

1 2	WHEREAS, intergenerational poverty undermines social and economic wellness; and		
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4	WHEREAS, according to the 2009 paper "Childhood and		
5	Intergenerational Poverty: The Long-Term Consequences of Growing		
6	up Poor" by Robert L. Wagmiller, Jr., and Robert M. Adelman,		
7	"individuals who grow up in poor families are much more likely		
8	to be poor in early adulthood"; and		
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10	WHEREAS, Hawaii's high cost of living makes overcoming		
11	intergenerational poverty difficult for working families; and		
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13	WHEREAS, according to the National Low Income Housing		
14	Coalition's 2023 Out of Reach study, a minimum wage employee		
15	must work one hundred seven hours per week to afford a one-		
16	bedroom rental home at fair market rent in Hawaii; and		
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18	WHEREAS, the same study also found that a worker must earn		
19	\$41.83 per hour to afford a two-bedroom rental unit without		
20	being cost burdened; and		
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22	WHEREAS, the Massachusetts Institute of Technology's living		
23	wage calculator estimates a livable wage for a Hawaii resident		
24	who is a single adult and has no children to be \$27.33 per hour		
25	and a single adult with one child to be \$51.83 per hour; and		
26 27	WHEREAS, longstanding systemic inequality and its continued		
27 28	effect on government policy has created unacceptable outcomes		
20 29	across the spectrum of child well-being for children in		
29 30	communities of color, including but not limited to Native		
30 31	Hawaiian and other Pacific Islander, Filipino, Black, Hispanic,		
32	Asian, and immigrant households; and		
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WHEREAS, the COVID-19 pandemic and its economic fallout 1 further exacerbated entrenched disparities for children of color 2 and their families; and 3 4 WHEREAS, in 2021, Connecticut became the first state to 5 pass an initiative that invests directly in children born into 6 7 poverty known as "baby bonds"; and 8 WHEREAS, the program sets aside funds for each baby born in 9 Connecticut whose birth is covered by Medicaid, with those funds 10 to be held, managed, and invested by the Connecticut Office of 11 the Treasurer; and 12 13 WHEREAS, when participating children reach adulthood, they 14 15 are eligible to claim funds to be used for buying a home, paying for higher education or job training, starting a business, or 16 saving for retirement; and 17 18 19 WHEREAS, Connecticut's baby bonds program is designed to 20 narrow the wealth gap and spur long-term economic growth for Connecticut's families and economy; and 21 22 23 WHEREAS, a baby bonds program could significantly alleviate intergenerational poverty in Hawaii; now, therefore, 24 25 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 26 Thirty-second Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular 27 Session of 2024, that the Department of Human Services is 28 requested to convene a working group to consider the creation of 29 a baby bonds program for Hawaii; and 30 31 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the working group is requested 32 to consist of the following members: 33 34 The Director of Human Services or the Director's (1)35 designee, to serve as Chairperson of the working 36 37 group; 38 39 (2) The Director of Taxation or the Director's designee; 40 (3) The Director of Finance or the Director's designee; 41 42



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- The Chief Executive Officer of the Office of Hawaiian (4)1 2 Affairs or the Chief Executive Officer's designee; 3 4 (5) One member from the Senate, to be appointed by the President of the Senate 5 6 7 (6) One member from the House of Representatives, to be appointed by the Speaker of the House of 8 9 Representatives; 10 The Executive Director of the University of Hawaii (7) 11 Economic Research Organization or the Executive 12 Director's designee; 13 14 15 (8) One representative from a nonprofit public interest organization specializing in public health, as invited 16 by the Chairperson; 17 18 19 (9) One representative from a nonprofit, public interest 20 organization specializing in anti-poverty policies for low-income individuals, as invited by the Chairperson; 21 22 23 (10)One representative from a nonprofit public interest organization specializing in advocacy for children, as 24 invited by the Chairperson; and 25 26 (11)Other relevant stakeholders as recommended by the 27 working group and invited by the Chairperson; and 28 29 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the working group is requested 30 31 to: 32 (1)Develop recommendations for a baby bonds program that 33 reduces intergenerational poverty and wealth 34 inequality in the State; 35 36 37 (2) Suggest eligibility criteria for a baby bonds program 38 operated by the State; 39 40 (3) Coordinate with other stakeholders, agencies, and programs within and outside of the State that are 41
