HOUSE RESOLUTION

URGING THE DEPARTMENT OF LAW ENFORCEMENT, FIRE DEPARTMENTS AND POLICE DEPARTMENTS OF EACH COUNTY, HUMANE SOCIETIES IN EACH COUNTY, AND MEDIA ORGANIZATIONS THROUGHOUT THE STATE TO COLLABORATE TO CREATE AND DISSEMINATE PUBLIC SERVICE ANNOUNCEMENTS TO HIGHLIGHT THE DANGERS OF, AND ADVOCATE AGAINST THE USE OF, ILLEGAL FIREWORKS IN ORDER TO PROTECT THE HEALTH AND SAFETY OF THE COMMUNITY, PETS, AND WILDLIFE.

1 WHEREAS, illegal fireworks in Hawaii pose a significant 2 safety, environmental, and health issue and this body finds it necessary for agencies across the islands to place a public 3 service announcement (PSA) concerning fireworks safety; and 4 5 6 WHEREAS, past PSAs have been effective in changing 7 attitudes and behaviors regarding tobacco, and this body seeks to do likewise with a fireworks PSA; and 8 9 10 WHEREAS, fireworks are viewed in many communities in Hawaii as merely harmless fun; and 11 12 WHEREAS, in just one day, from December 31, 2023, to 13 14 January 1, 2024, the Honolulu Fire Department responded to 15 twenty-three fireworks-related fires; and 16 WHEREAS, during this period, Honolulu Emergency Medical 17 18 Services also responded to seven fireworks-related injuries, including to keiki and kupuna, that were disfiguring and will 19 20 have life-long consequences for the injured individuals; and 21 WHEREAS, during December 2023 alone, the Department of Law 22 23 Enforcement confiscated sixteen tons of illegal fireworks and since its inception, the Department has seized 35,000 pounds of 24 fireworks; and 25 26 27 WHEREAS, fireworks can also trigger a military veteran's post traumatic stress disorder (PTSD), as seven percent of all 28

1 veterans on average will suffer from PTSD during their 2 lifetimes; and 3 WHEREAS, however, of the more recent veterans of the 4 5 Persian Gulf war, Operation Iraqi Freedom, and Operation Enduring Freedom, thirty percent will experience PTSD during 6 7 their lifetimes; and 8 9 WHEREAS, according to the United States Department of Veterans Affairs, fireworks may cue memories of combat or 10 explosions and may be reminders of intense fires or qun 11 violence; and 12 13 14 WHEREAS, according to The Humane Society of the United States, during holidays involving fireworks, pet animals are 15 often frightened from the noise and commotion of fireworks, 16 17 causing them to flee from familiar environments, often becoming lost; and 18 19 20 WHEREAS, the bright lights from fireworks frequently cause 21 animals to run into the streets, and wildlife rehabilitation centers are often flooded with all sorts of wildlife affected by 22 23 fireworks; and 24 25 WHEREAS, during the 2022 New Year Celebration, the Hawaiian Humane Society indicated that twenty percent of pets are lost 26 27 during celebrations involving fireworks and that during that 28 time, it received seventy to eighty animals after the New Year; 29 and 30 31 WHEREAS, as an isolated archipelago, Hawaii is home to many 32 unique and endemic species of wildlife, including twenty-six 33 forest bird species, and most of these species are considered 34 vulnerable, near-threatened, threatened, endangered, or 35 critically endangered; and 36 37 WHEREAS, the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration has stated that the trash from fireworks poses 38 39 major risks to animals, because sea birds and marine animals can mistake this debris for food, resulting in malnutrition, 40 41 internal injuries, intestinal blockage, starvation, and even 42 death; and

1 2 WHEREAS, the effects of illegal fireworks are significant 3 and wide-ranging, including the physical injuries to and 4 psychological effects on individuals, to the displacement of 5 pets, and the negative impact on wildlife; now, therefore, 6 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 7 Thirty-second Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular 8 Session of 2024, that the Department of Law Enforcement, fire 9 10 departments and police departments of each county, humane 11 societies in each county, and media organizations throughout the State are urged to collaborate to create and disseminate public 12 13 service announcements to highlight the dangers of, and advocate against the use of, illegal fireworks in order to protect the 14 health and safety of the community, pets, and wildlife; and 15 16 17 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this Resolution be transmitted to the Director of Law Enforcement; 18 Fire Chiefs of the Honolulu Fire Department, Hawaii Fire 19 Department, Maui Fire Department, and Kauai Fire Department; 20 Police Chiefs of the Honolulu Police Department, Hawaii Police 21 22 Department, Maui Police Department, and Kauai Fire Department; 23 President and CEO of the Hawaiian Humane Society; President of 24 the Board of Directors of the Hawaii Island Humane Society; CEO 25 of Maui Humane Society; Executive Director of Kauai Humane 26 Society; President and General Manager of Hawaii News Now; 27 General Manager of KHON2; President & General Manager of KITV; 28 President & General Manager of Hawaii Public Radio; head of iHeartMedia in Honolulu; President & Publisher of the Honolulu 29 30 Star-Advertiser; Editor and General Manager of Honolulu Civil Beat; editor of the Hawaii Tribune Herald; editor of West Hawaii 31 32 Today; Publisher of The Maui News; and Editor of The Garden Island. 33 All 34 35 36 OFFERED BY:
