HOUSE RESOLUTION

URGING THE DEPARTMENT OF LAW ENFORCEMENT TO DEVELOP AND IMPLEMENT A U VISA CERTIFICATION POLICY.

1 WHEREAS, Congress enacted the Victims of Trafficking and 2 Violence Prevention Act of 2000 to encourage immigrant victims 3 to report crimes and contribute to investigations and 4 prosecutions and support law enforcement efforts to investigate 5 and prosecute crimes committed against immigrant victims by 6 creating the U visa certification policy; and

8 WHEREAS, the United States Department of Homeland Security 9 has created the U Visa Law Enforcement Certification Resource 10 Guide to assist local government jurisdictions to create their 11 own U visa certification document; and

13 WHEREAS, the Orange County Sheriff-Coroner Department of 14 the State of California has already implemented a U visa 15 certification policy under Policy 609; and

WHEREAS, the U visa is an immigration benefit for immigrant victims of certain crimes who will assist, are currently assisting, or have previously assisted law enforcement in the investigation or prosecution of a crime; and

22 WHEREAS, the U visa provides eligible immigrant victims 23 with nonimmigrant status to temporarily remain in the United 24 States while assisting law enforcement, allowing these 25 individuals to legally remain and work in the United States; and 26

WHEREAS, immigrant victims who do not have legal
immigration status may be reluctant to help in the investigation
or prosecution of criminal activity for fear of removal from the
United States; and



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1 WHEREAS, immigrants, especially women and children, can be particularly vulnerable to crimes like human trafficking, 2 domestic violence, sexual assault, and other types of abuse; and 3 4 5 WHEREAS, any eligible immigrant victim may apply for a U visa, which must first be certified by a qualifying federal, 6 State, or certifying agency, such as the Department of Law 7 Enforcement, before being reviewed and acted upon by the United 8 9 States Citizenship and Immigration Services; and 10 11 WHEREAS, while the certifying law enforcement agency does not have the authority to grant or guarantee a U visa, this step 12 13 is necessary for a U visa, as the certification verifies that a qualifying criminal activity occurred and that the victim was 14 helpful or will be helpful in the investigation or prosecution 15 of the qualifying crime; and 16 17 18 WHEREAS, the State currently does not have a U visa 19 certification policy in place; and 20 21 WHEREAS, the State would benefit from having a U visa certification policy to ensure that victims of certain crimes 22 have a safe opportunity to report these crimes without fear of 23 24 deportation; now, therefore, 25 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 26 Thirty-second Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular 27 Session of 2024, that the Department of Law Enforcement is urged 28 29 to develop and implement a U visa certification policy; and 30 31 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Law Enforcement is requested to submit: 32 33 34 (1)An interim report on the development of a U visa certification policy, including any proposed 35 legislation, to the Legislature no later than twenty 36 days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 37 2025; and 38 39 A final report on the implementation of the U visa 40 (2) policy, including any proposed legislation, to the 41



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Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2026; and BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this Resolution be transmitted to the Governor and Director of Law Enforcement.

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
