A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE DEPARTMENT OF LAND AND NATURAL RESOURCES.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the Kaena point 2 state park, Makua and Keawaula sections are known for their 3 beauty, cultural and historical significance, and exceptional 4 value to the Hawaiian community. Historcally, these areas were 5 primarily known for their lawaia, or fishing practices, as well 6 as other traditional Native Hawaiian practices, including lua, or warrior training, and laau lapaau, or medicinal practices. 7 8 These areas are places of cultural enlightenment and healing and 9 are rich in moolelo, or history, encompassing life from 10 beginning to end.

In 2016, due to years of overuse and abuse from illegal driving on the beach, unmanaged camping, harmful fishing and gathering practices, and other recreational uses that resulted in unacceptable, potentially hazardous accumulations of dangerous rubbish and human waste, certain areas within the Kaena point state park, Makua and Keawaula sections were closed to overnight access. The intent was to reopen these areas with

a proper management system in place that encompasses Hawaiian
managagement values in balancing public use with the
preservation of the aina, wildlife, and cultural resources.
However, a proper management system has yet to be implemented.

5 The legislature notes that prioritizing the State's natural 6 resources is an essential component of destination management. 7 Before 2020, annual arrivals to the State exceeded ten million 8 visitors, and according to state economists, by 2025, Hawaii will again return to pre-pandemic tourism levels. Social media 9 10 has only perpetuated this growth. The legislature believes that 11 rising visitor numbers in Hawaii's state parks could be better 12 managed by implementing various types of management systems.

13 The legislature further finds that in 2018, massive 14 flooding on Kauai damaged surrounding bridges, beaches, and 15 roads, thereby forcing Haena state park to close for fourteen 16 months. When the park reopened, the department of land and 17 natural resources worked with the local community to implement a 18 management system that balanced public use with Hawaiian cultural values and the preservation of the aina, wildlife, and 19 20 cultural resources. Furthermore, based on the success of the 21 Haena state park model, House Bill No. 2446, Regular Session of

2022, was introduced to appropriate moneys for the department of
land and natural resources to replicate reservation system
models, including those used at Haena state park. That measure
also appropriated additional moneys from the state parks special
fund for purposes of state park management.

6 Recently implemented management plans and models have been 7 shown to improve and promote a more harmonious relationship 8 between public use and park maintenance and preservation. The 9 Kaena point state park, Makua and Keawaula sections are in dire 10 need of a similar model. Although the needs of each state park 11 may be similar, each park is unique and its needs may vary based 12 on location and useage.

13 Abuse and harmful activities have plaqued the ahupuaa of 14 Makua, Kahanahaiki, and Keawaula for more than a century. The 15 legislature finds that a proper management system for these 16 areas is long overdue and the implementation of a system to 17 improve public safety and environmental protection is necessary. 18 The purpose of this Act is to require the department of 19 land and natural resources to develop and implement an improved 20 management system for the Kaena point state park, Makua and

21 Keawaula sections.

15		county of Honolulu, department of transportation, and	
16		other parties having jurisdiction over the encompassed	
17		land and marine areas;	
18	(3)	Ensure the sustainability and success of the	
19		management system by working with outside partners,	
20		including local non-profit organizations, in a similar

1		manner as has previously been done with other state
2		park management systems; and
3	(4)	Maintain the current limited access requirements in
4		place at the Kaena point state park, Makua and
5		Keawaula sections due to misuse and the lack of
6		staffing for enforcement and management until the
7		department and community stakeholder determine that
8		proper measures have been employed to address and
9		resolve these issues.
10	SECT	TON 3. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 3000.
