#### A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO PSYCHOLOGISTS.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that there is limited 2 access to mental health care treatment services for residents 3 across the State. The delivery of comprehensive, accessible, 4 and affordable mental health care has been demonstrably enhanced 5 by collaborative practice among licensed clinical psychologists with prescriptive authority and medical doctors in federal 6 7 facilities and programs as well as states that have authorized 8 prescriptive authority for psychologists. The legislature finds 9 that providing limited prescriptive authority to qualified, 10 licensed clinical psychologists, subject to supervision by a 11 licensed medical doctor, will make comprehensive mental health 12 care more accessible to medically underserved residents of the 13 State. The legislature acknowledges that the Health Resources and Services Administration of the United States Department of 14 15 Health and Human Services has officially designated much of the 16 State, including isolated rural locations and urban areas with 17 high population densities, as a mental health professional

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shortage area. This designation highlights the critical need
 for expansion of available mental health services and
 development of a corps of mental health professionals to serve
 the currently unmet needs of Hawai'i's population.

5 The legislature has previously authorized prescription privileges for advanced practice registered nurses, 6 7 optometrists, dentists, podiatrists, and physician assistants. 8 These practitioners have been granted prescriptive authority 9 based on demonstration of specific training, education, and 10 practical competency. Education and training criteria, such as 11 degree and minimum experience requirements, and passage of 12 national board examinations have worked well to assure quality 13 of services. Limitations on authority including the use of 14 approved formularies, limited practice areas, and prohibitions 15 on accepting or distributing drug samples have served to deter abuses in the system and to prevent the inappropriate practice 16 of general medicine. Prescriptive authority for non-physician 17 18 practitioners with varying types of limitations and supervision requirements has proven manageable and has expanded access to 19 20 important health care services for patients across the State.



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1 Clinical psychologists with appropriate training have been 2 allowed to prescribe medications to active duty military personnel and their families in federal facilities and the 3 4 federal Indian health service program for years. In recent years, Colorado, Idaho, Illinois, Iowa, Louisiana, and New 5 Mexico have adopted legislation authorizing prescriptive 6 authority for appropriately trained psychologists without regard 7 8 to the service setting.

9 Since 2000, psychologists in Hawai'i have received 10 psychopharmacological training through the Tripler Army Medical Center psychology training program. These psychologists have 11 12 actively collaborated with primary care physicians to provide 13 combined therapy and psychopharmacological care to a medically 14 underserved patient population at eleven federally qualified health centers: Bay Clinic, Hana, Molokai, Kauai, Waianae, 15 16 Kalihi-Palama, Waimanalo, Koolauloa, West Hawai'i, Kokua Kalihi Valley, and Waikiki, as well as a native Hawaiian health care 17 system clinic located in a federally designated medically 18 underserved area on Molokai. 19

20 The American Psychological Association has developed a
21 model curriculum for a master's degree in psychopharmacology for

the education and training of prescribing psychologists. This 1 2 curriculum is currently available within the State at the University of Hawai'i at Hilo's college of pharmacy. Independent 3 4 evaluations of the United States Department of Defense psychopharmacological demonstration project by the United States 5 General Accounting Office, now known as the Government 6 7 Accountability Office, and the American College of 8 Neuropsychopharmacology, as well as the experiences of Idaho, Illinois, Iowa, Louisiana, and New Mexico, have demonstrated 9 that appropriately trained clinical psychologists can prescribe 10 11 psychotropic medications safely and effectively. 12 The purpose of this Act is to create a multi-phase, fiveyear, pilot project to allow qualified psychologists to 13 14 prescribe psychotropic medications for the treatment of mental 15 illness to patients under the psychologist's care at a federally

16 qualified health center.

SECTION 2. (a) There is created a pilot program to be
administered by the board of psychology to allow clinical
psychologists licensed pursuant to chapter 465, Hawaii Revised
Statutes, to prescribe psychotropic medications only to patients

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treated by the psychologist at a federally qualified health
 center.

3 (b) A licensed clinical psychologist shall be eligible to
4 apply to participate in the pilot program created pursuant to
5 this Act if the psychologist:

6 (1) Meets the requirements for licensure set forth in
7 section 465-7, Hawaii Revised Statutes;

8 (2) Completed specialized education and training in
9 preparation for prescriptive practice approved by the
10 American Psychological Association and the board of
11 psychology;

- 12 (3) Passed the Psychopharmacological Examination for
  13 Psychologists or an equivalent national examination
  14 relevant to establishing competence for prescriptive
  15 practice approved by the board of psychology;
- 16 (4) Is employed by, including as a contract provider, a
  17 federally qualified health center in this State; and
  18 (5) Meets any other requirements established by the board
- 19 of psychology.

20 (c) The pilot program created pursuant to this Act shall21 be a five-year program that shall allow participating

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1	psychologists to prescribe psychotropic medications under the		
2	supervision of a licensed physician as follows:		
3	(1)	In the first two years, participating psychologists	
4		shall practice only at Waianae Coast Comprehensive	
5		Health Center and shall receive training and be	
6		directly supervised by a physician at that location;	
7	(2)	After the first year of the pilot program, the	
8		supervising physician at Waianae Coast Comprehensive	
9		Health Center shall continue to train and supervise	
10		participating psychologists and may recruit additional	
11		physicians at other federally qualified health centers	
12		in the State to train and supervise participating	
13		psychologists at those locations;	
14	(3)	Participating psychologists shall be directly	
15		supervised by supervising physicians at a federally	
16		qualified health center for the first two years of the	
17		psychologists' participation in the pilot program; and	
18	(4)	After completing two years of direct supervision,	
19		participating psychologists shall maintain a	
20		collaborative and collegial relationship with a	
21		supervising physician and with the medical doctors who	

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oversee the general medical care of the participating 1 psychologist's patients at a federally qualified 2 health center and shall exercise prescriptive 3 authority only for patients treated by the 4 psychologist at the federally qualified health center. 5 At the end of the fourth year of the pilot program, 6 (d) 7 the board of psychology shall prepare a report, under the direction of the supervising physicians of the pilot program and 8 9 with input from participating psychologists and the physicians and administrators of participating federally qualified health 10 11 centers, to be submitted to the legislature no later than twenty 12 days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2031. The report prepared by the board of psychology shall include: 13 14 (1)The number and type of patients served by participating psychologists; 15 16 Treatment services outcomes of patients treated by (2) 17 participating psychologists; 18 Whether and how the pilot program improved access to (3) mental health care; and 19 Patient satisfaction with mental health care provided 20 (4) 21 by participating psychologists.

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1 SECTION 3. Chapter 465, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 2 amended by adding a new part to be appropriately designated and 3 to read as follows: 4 "PART . PRESCRIPTION CERTIFICATION 5 §465-Definitions. As used in this part, unless the 6 context otherwise requires: 7 "Board" means the board of psychology established under 8 section 465-4. "Clinical experience" means a period of supervised clinical 9 10 training and practice involving clinical diagnoses and 11 interventions that are conducted and supervised as part of a 12 training program. 13 "Laboratory test" means any laboratory blood or urine drug 14 screen test necessary to monitor the general health of a patient 15 receiving psychotropic medication. 16 "Narcotics" means natural and synthetic opioid analgesics, 17 and their derivatives, used to relieve pain. 18 "Prescription" means an order for a drug, laboratory test, 19 or medicine, device, or treatment, as defined by state law. 20 "Prescriptive authority" means the authority to prescribe, 21 administer, discontinue, or distribute without charge, drugs or

17		accepted by the board relevant to establishing			
18		competence for prescribing; and			
19	(3)	Received from the board a current certificate granting			
20		prescriptive authority that has not been revoked or			
21		suspended.			

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"Psychopharmacology" means the use of psychoactive drugs in
 the treatment or control of mental disorders or psychiatric
 disease.

4 "Psychotropic medication" means only those agents related
5 to the diagnosis and treatment of mental and emotional disorders
6 including controlled substances but not including narcotics.

7 "Supervising physician" means a medically trained and
8 licensed physician or psychiatrist who accepts professional
9 responsibility for the provision of psychopharmacology by a
10 psychologist certified to prescribe.

11 §465- Conditional prescription certificate; application.
12 (a) A psychologist who applies for a conditional prescription
13 certificate shall demonstrate all of the following by official
14 transcript or other official evidence satisfactory to the board:

15 (1) A current clinical license in good standing to16 practice psychology in the State;

17 (2) Consistent with established policies of the American
 18 Psychological Association for educating and training
 19 psychologists in preparation for prescriptive

20 authority:



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A master's degree in psychopharmacology that 1 (A) reflects an organized sequence of study in an 2 organized program offering intensive didactic and 3 practical education, and includes the following 4 core areas of instruction: basic life sciences, 5 neurosciences, clinical and research pharmacology 6 and psychopharmacology, clinical medicine and 7 pathophysiology, physical assessment and 8 9 laboratory examinations, clinical pharmacotherapeutics, research, and professional, 10 11 ethical and legal issues; and Relevant clinical experience sufficient to attain 12 (B) 13 competency in the psychopharmacological treatment 14 of a diverse patient population under the 15 direction of a supervising physician that 16 consists of not less than two years and involves 17 at least four hundred hours treating a diverse 18 population of no fewer than one hundred patients 19 with mental disorders including at least two 20 hours of weekly on-site supervision per year by a

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1		supervising physician who is not employed by the
2		psychologist being directed or supervised;
3	(3)	Successful completion of the Psychopharmacological
4		Examination for Psychologists or an equivalent
5		national examination relevant to establishing
6		competence for prescribing and approved by the board;
7	(4)	A federal Drug Enforcement Administration registration
8		number for limited use as restricted by state law;
9	(5)	Malpractice insurance sufficient to satisfy the rules
10		adopted by the board, that covers the applicant during
11		the period the conditional prescription certificate is
12		in effect;
13	(6)	Completion of all other requirements, as determined by
14		rules adopted by the board pursuant to chapter 91, for
15		obtaining a conditional prescription certificate; and
16	(7)	Employment, including by contract, and an intent to
17		practice the prescriptive authority at a federally
18		qualified health center as defined in title 42 United
19		States Code section 1396d.

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1	(b)	The board shall issue a conditional prescription
2	certifica	te if it finds that the applicant has met all of the
3	requireme	ents of subsection (a).
4	(c)	The conditional prescription certificate shall be
5	immediate	ly relinquished by the psychologist if the psychologist
6	no longer	meets the requirements of subsection (a).
7	§465	- Conditional prescription certificate; powers,
8	duties, a	nd responsibilities. (a) A psychologist holding a
9	condition	al prescription certificate shall:
10	(1)	Hold a current license to practice psychology in the
11		State and maintain malpractice insurance;
12	(2)	Complete the first year of practice under a
13		conditional prescription certificate under the
14		direction of a supervising physician who is not
15		employed by the psychologist being directed or
16		supervised; provided that supervision pursuant to this
17		paragraph shall include training in diagnostic
18		laboratory tests, diagnostic imaging, and
19		electroencephalogram tests;
20	(3)	Inform the board of the name of the supervising
21		physician under whose supervision the psychologist

1 will prescribe psychotropic medication; provided that 2 the psychologist shall promptly inform the board of 3 any change of the supervising physician; and 4 (4) Maintain an ongoing collaborative relationship 5 pursuant to subsection (c) with the doctors of 6 medicine who oversee the general medical care of the 7 psychologist's patients.

8 A psychologist holding a conditional prescription (b) 9 certificate shall be authorized to prescribe, administer, 10 discontinue, or distribute without charge, drugs or controlled 11 substances recognized in or customarily used in the diagnosis, 12 treatment, and management of individuals with psychiatric, mental, cognitive, nervous, emotional, or behavioral disorders 13 14 and relevant to the practice of psychology, or other procedures 15 directly related thereto within the scope of practice of 16 psychology in accordance with rules adopted by the board. The 17 authorization to prescribe shall be limited to prescriptions for patients under the care of the psychologist at federally 18 19 qualified health centers as defined in title 42 United States 20 Code section 1396d and identified to the board as the 21 psychologist's practice location.

14		adopted by the board, that will cover the applicant as
15		a prescribing psychologist; and
16	(4)	Completion of all other requirements, as determined by
17		rules adopted by the board pursuant to chapter 91, for
18		obtaining a prescription certificate.
19	(b)	The board shall issue a prescription certificate if it
20	finds tha	t the applicant has met all of the requirements of

9 §465- Administration. (a) The board may adopt rules
10 pursuant to chapter 91 to further implement the procedures set
11 forth in this part to obtain a conditional prescription
12 certificate or a prescription certificate and to renew a
13 conditional prescription certificate or prescription
14 certificate. The board may set reasonable application and
15 renewal fees.

(b) The board shall adopt rules pursuant to chapter 91
establishing the grounds for denial, suspension, or revocation
of conditional prescription certificates and prescription
certificates, including provisions for suspension or revocation
of a license to practice psychology upon suspension or
revocation of a conditional prescription certificate or



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prescription certificate. Actions of denial, suspension, or
 revocation of a conditional prescription certificate or a
 prescription certificate shall be in accordance with this
 chapter.

5 (c) The board shall maintain current records on every
6 prescribing psychologist, including federal Drug Enforcement
7 Administration registration numbers.

8 (d) The board shall provide to the board of pharmacy an
9 annual list of psychologists holding a conditional prescription
10 certificate or prescription certificate that contains the
11 information agreed upon between the board and the board of
12 pharmacy. The board shall promptly provide the board of
13 pharmacy with the names of any psychologists who are added to or
14 deleted from the list.

15 §465- Narcotics and controlled substance samples

18 prescription certificate or prescription certificate shall not
19 administer or prescribe any narcotic and shall not request,

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supervision in a training institution or facility and 1 who is designated by a title as "psychology trainee", 2 3 "psychology student", "psychology intern", or "psychology resident", that indicates the person's 4 training status; provided that the person shall not 5 identify the person's self as a psychologist or imply 6 7 that the person is licensed to practice psychology; Any person who is a member of another profession (5) 8 licensed under the laws of this jurisdiction to render 9 10 or advertise services, including psychotherapy, within 11 the scope of practice as defined in the statutes or 12 rules regulating the person's professional practice; 13 provided that, notwithstanding section 465-1, the 14 person does not represent the person's self to be a 15 psychologist or does not represent that the person is 16 licensed to practice psychology; 17 Any person who is a member of a mental health (6) profession not requiring licensure; provided that the 18

19 person functions only within the person's professional20 capacities; and provided further that the person does



1		not represent the person to be a psychologist, or the
2		person's services as psychological;
3	(7)	Any person who is a duly recognized member of the
4		clergy; provided that the person functions only within
5		the person's capacities as a member of the clergy; and
6		provided further that the person does not represent
7		the person to be a psychologist, or the person's
8		services as psychological;
9	(8)	Any psychologist employed by the United States
10		Department of Defense, while engaged in the discharge
11		of the psychologist's official duty and providing
12		direct telehealth support or services, as defined in
13		section 431:10A-116.3, to neighbor island
14		beneficiaries within a Hawaii National Guard armory on
15		the island of Kauai, Hawaii, Molokai, or Maui;

Nothing in this chapter shall in any way restrict any 1 (b) person from carrying on any of the psychological activities as 2 defined in section 465-1; provided that [such] the person does 3 4 not offer psychological services as defined in this chapter except as [such] the activities are incidental to the person's 5 lawful occupational purpose. 6 7 (C) A person may use the title of 8 industrial/organizational psychologist, provided that the person 9 registers with the board, and: 10 (1)Is professionally competent in the practice of industrial/organizational psychology; [and] 11 12 Holds a doctoral degree from an accredited institution (2) 13 of higher education with training and education in 14 industrial/organizational psychology, satisfactory to the board; and 15 Provides psychological service or consultation to 16 (3) 17 organizations [which] that does not involve the delivery or supervision of direct psychological 18 19 services to individuals or groups of individuals, 20 without regard to the source or extent of payment for 21 services rendered.



(d) Nothing in this chapter shall prevent the provision of
 expert testimony by a psychologist who is otherwise exempted by
 this chapter.

4 [(e) Nothing in this chapter shall be construed as 5 permitting the administration or prescription of drugs, or in 6 any way engaging in the practice of medicine as defined in the 7 laws of the State.]"

8 SECTION 7. Notwithstanding the requirements of chapter 91, 9 Hawaii Revised Statutes, or any other law or rule of this State, 10 the board of psychology shall act expeditiously to adopt rules 11 and to take all other actions necessary to ensure that the pilot 12 program established by this Act shall commence no later than 13 July 1, 2025.

14 SECTION 8. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed 15 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.

16 SECTION 9. This Act shall take effect upon its approval 17 and shall be repealed on June 30, 2030; provided that the 18 definition of "practitioner" in section 329-1 Hawaii Revised 19 Statutes, and section 465-3, Hawaii Revised Statutes, shall be 20
