A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE STATE FIRE MARSHAL.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that Hawaii is the only 2 state in the country without a state fire marshal. The 3 legislature further finds that, without a government agency or 4 specific position tasked with coordinating statewide fire 5 prevention and mitigation efforts, Hawaii's wildfire 6 preparedness lacks cohesion and a statewide strategic plan. The 7 legislature also finds that a state fire marshal would have been 8 helpful in preventing, as well as immediately responding to, the 9 August 8, 2023 wildfires in Lahaina.

10 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to establish the 11 position and office of the state fire marshal.

SECTION 2. Chapter 132, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated and to read as follows:

15 "<u>§132-</u> Office of the state fire marshal; state fire 16 marshal; establishment; responsibilities. (a) There is 17 established within the Hawaii emergency management agency for



1	administrative purposes the office of the state fire marshal,		
2	which shall be headed by a full-time state fire marshal. The		
3	office of	the state fire marshal shall be exempt from section	
4	26-35.		
5	(b)	The state fire marshal shall:	
6	(1)	Develop a statewide wildfire preparedness and	
7		mitigation plan;	
8	(2)	Coordinate with the state fire council established	
9		pursuant to section 132-16 to recommend county-based	
10		fire mitigation plans to increase the fire	
11		preparedness level of each county;	
12	(3)	Aid the fire chiefs of each county in leading	
13		investigations of fire pursuant to section 132-1(b);	
14	(4)	Work with relevant government agencies to address	
15		wildfire hazards through vegetation management	
16		particularly where urban areas border lands prone to	
17		fire and other fire mitigation best practices;	
18	(5)	Support the state fire council's efforts to adopt	
19		rules relating to the protections of persons and	
20		property against fires pursuant to section 132-3 and	



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1 fulfil its functions relating to fire protection 2 pursuant to section 132-16; and (6) Coordinate with county fire departments to develop a 3 4 statewide response to fires and other natural 5 disasters." 6 SECTION 3. Section 132-1, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 7 amended to read as follows: "§132-1 County fire chiefs; powers and duties. 8 (a) The fire chief of each county shall keep in the county 9 Records. 10 fire chief's office a record of all fires occurring in the county and of all facts concerning the same, and shall make such 11 compilations and statistical investigations as the fire chief 12 13 may deem proper, all of which shall be kept as permanent records in the fire chief's office. All records shall be public, except 14 that any evidence in any investigation may, in the discretion of 15 16 the county fire chief, be withheld from the public. 17 (b) Investigations, generally. The fire chief of each 18 county shall: Investigate the cause, origin, and circumstances of 19 (1)20 fires;



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1	(2)	Supervise and make or cause to be made periodically a	
2		thorough inspection of all property which might	
3		constitute a fire hazard within the county;	
4	(3)	Summon and compel the attendance of witnesses and	
5		production of evidence and hold hearings and make	
6		orders in any matter under the fire chief's	
7		jurisdiction;	
8	(4)	Cooperate with any and all other governmental officers	
9		or agencies having jurisdiction in the matters.	
10	<u>(c)</u>	The fire chief of each county shall consult with the	
11	state fire marshal annually to review the fire preparedness		
12	level of their county."		
13	SECTION 4. In accordance with section 9 of article VII of		
14	the Hawaii State Constitution and sections 37-91 and 37-93,		
15	Hawaii Revised Statutes, the legislature has determined that the		
16	appropriations contained in Act 164, Regular Session of 2023,		
17	and this Act will cause the state general fund expenditure		
18	ceiling f	or fiscal year 2024-2025 to be exceeded by	
19	\$	or per cent. This current declaration takes	
20	into acco	unt general fund appropriations authorized for fiscal	

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year 2024-2025 in Act 164, Regular Session of 2023, and this Act
 only. The reasons for exceeding the general fund expenditure
 ceiling are that:

- 4 (1) The appropriation made in this Act is necessary to
 5 serve the public interest; and
- 6 (2) The appropriation made in this Act meets the needs
 7 addressed by this Act.

SECTION 5. There is appropriated out of the general 8 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ 9 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2024-2025 for 10 the establishment of the office of the state fire marshal, 11 pursuant to section 2 of this Act, to be allocated as follows: 12 13 (1) Ś for the establishment of one full-time 14 equivalent (1.0 FTE) state fire marshal; (2) for the establishment of full-time 15 \$ 16 equivalent (FTE) positions within the office of 17 the state fire marshal; and for the establishment, administration, and 18 (3) \$ 19 operation of the office of the state fire marshal.

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The sum appropriated shall be expended by the office of the
 state fire marshal established pursuant to section 2 of this Act
 for the purposes of this Act.
 SECTION 6. New statutory material is underscored.
 SECTION 7. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2024.
